In connection with the destruction of channelizing memoranda, the information contained on the serials listed below was incorporated in a report \mathbf{x} behavior and memorandum dated <u>5/19/72</u>. Where the serial is accompanied by the file and serial number of the original informant report, the information was not used because it was of no value to the report. The review for the communication checked above was made from <u>serial 429</u> through <u>serial 469</u>.

SUBJECT: RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER RM - KLAN; IS - MINUTEMEN

> The following is a correlation of information re subject as located in serials in this file, which serials may be destroyed:

Serial 430 On 7/7/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised RED GLOVER was supposedly approached by DON WILKINSON on 6/22/69, and at that time was advised by WILKINSON to try to get 5,000 more White Sentinel pamphlets. GLOVER's wife, POLLIE, has moved back to Kentwood, La., and GLOVER has moved from the residence located at Oak and Rankin in Natchez. GLOVER was overheard to tell WILKINSON to keep the name H. T. HARDIN, Vidalia, La., in his memory as he might be needed. HARDIN is allegedly a commercial pilot who lives in Vidalia.

On 7/11/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) **advised that on** Serial 432 7/3/69, RED GLOVER met DON WILKINSON at the Bar-B-Que Pit and GLOVER was accompanied by a white male, 5'11", 225 lbs., black hair, with pockmark on the left side of his face, using first name of BUCK. WILKINSON furnished several Minutemen pamphlets to GLOVER. In the conversation, C. B. TODD came in and GLOVER wanted WILKINSON's permission for TODD to meet a man at the airport in Vidalia, La., on 7/4/69. WILKINSON gave his permission and on 7/4/69, TODD went to the airport at Vidalia, and RED GLOVER was there. On 7/10/69, GLOVER told WILKINSON that he had obtained info to the effect that on 7/7/69, while riding around Natchez, the COP, J. T. ROBINSON, had seen him and had put out several broadcasts about him over the police radio. On 7/9/69, GLOVER called WILKINSON and stated he had borrowed his step-son's, JAMES WATTS', automobile and had been down at his (GLOVER's) home μ_{GPA}

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in Kentwood, La., and was returning when the automobile got hot at Meadville, Miss. WILKINSON took GLOVER down to pick up the car but WATTS had already reclaimed it and had the radiator fixed. WILKINSON asked GLOVER if he had obtained any dynamite caps for him but GLOVER told him he had not and that he did not want to get involved in any jobs being planned, if any were being planned, at the present time. On 7/2/69, GLOVER was observed driving a Cadillac with Louisiana license plates in and around the neighborhood of DON WILKINSON.

On 7/22/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised that on Serial 433 7/15/69, RED GLOVER left 5,000 copies of the "White Sentinel" on the truck belonging to DON WILKINSON. On 7/17/69, WILKINSON allegedly left several copies of the Sentinel with E. D. MORACE, Vidalia, and at that time was overheard to mention to MORACE and RED GLOVER that he was desirous of putting some of the material on the lawn of J. T. ROBINSON. GLOVER was against that, stating ROBINSON was stirred up enough already. Source stated GLOVER continues to live at the rear of 722 N. Rankin, Natchez, and his wife, POLLY, is still in Kentwood, La. On 7/17/69. GLOVER was overheard to say that the "old dog", which term he uses to refer to the Russian TPSH machine gun is no longer in the possession of JAMES SCAROBOROUGH. GLOVER is allegedly very nervous about the Natchez PD radio transmissions concerning him and does not want to get in any trouble. 0n 7/21/69, he asked DON WILKINSON about the primer cord at the graveyard near Fenwick, Miss., and WILKINSON told him he had been out there twice to pick it up with JEWEL LEE BURT, but there were several people in the area and furthermore, the graveyard had been clipped. GLOVER told WILKINSON maybe he should not go out there anymore, inasmuch as it might be some sort of trap.

Serial 436 On 8/5/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised it was rumored that RED GLOVER and an unidentified man went to Ferriday, ¥OIA(b)(6) ¥OIA(b)(7) - (C)

La., on 7/23/69, looking for dynamite. GLOVER allegedly broke into a storehouse belonging to a ranch just off the Ferriday - Vidalia Highway but obtained no dynamite. He did supposedly steal several miscellaneous wrenches and other tools. On 8/4/69, GLOVER and DON WILKINSON were overheard at the Bar-B-Oue Pit in Natchez and were discussing the recent apprehension of ROBERT DE PUGH and PATRICK PEYSON. GLOVER stated he had one man who was to go to Norborne, Missouri, to help out and WILKINSON told him it was useless to go to Missouri because he had received info that DE PUGH was now at Leavenworth Prison in Kansas. Source advised GLOVER has been out of touch with quite a few of the local klan members. and Minutemen members. DON WILKINSON left a letter at the Bar-B-Que Pit for GLOVER to pick up and it was unclaimed for several days, indicating GLOVER had not been by. GLOVER's residence where he is staying in Natchez, while his wife stays at the Kentwood, La., farm, has been unoccupied for several days. GLOVER told WILKINSON and others he was being followed all the time by "Feds" and he was spending a good part of his time with his girl friend, in Vidalia.

On 9/6/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised subject Serial 441 has been selling tickets in Ouachita Parish, La., for the American Party barbecue to be held there in the near future. GLOVER approached several individuals, among whom was; DONALD WILKINSON, and invited WILKINSON to go to Tallulah, La., the next week or so, stating he wanted to introduce WILKINSON to "some good people up there". GLOVER did not show up to meet WILKINSON and WILKINSON has expressed disgust with GLOVER's suspicions of everybody and everything. GLOVER advised WILKINSON on 8/22/69, that E. D. MORACE had been interviewed by Federal Alcohol, Tobacco, and Firearms men re a Russian machine gun. GLOVER told WILKINSON that MORACE had allegedly had the gun in his possession and showed it to KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and HEAD's son-in-law, who works at the Gibson's Store in Natchez, probably saw it and turned the info in to the Federal authorities.

GLOVER told WILKINSON that he had gone into the weeds behind HEAD's house where HEAD had the gun stashed and had taken it out and hidden it. On 8/26/69, GLOVER came by the Bar-B-Oue Pit in Natchez and was talking to E. L. LEWIS, DON WILKINSON and others. GLOVER had in his possession several small circular objects approximately 1/4 inch in diameter and 2 inches long with two small copper wires running out of one end. GLOVER told WILKINSON that they were electrical blasting caps and WILKINSON allegedly asked GLOVER to get him some but GLOVER refused, saying he would do so at a later date. GLOVER said he was going to Kentwood, La., to stay down there for awhile because his wife was down there and he had moved from his residence at 722 N. Rankin St., Natchez, and was living temporarily with his step-son, JAMES WATTS. He indicated this was not a permanent residence.

FOIA(b)7 - (D) On 9/19/69. Serial 445 advised that on 9/11/69, RED GLOVER and TOM LEE JONES allegedly visited the residence of DON WILKINSON to inquire into his health. The next day, 9/12/69, GLOVER contacted WILKINSON in the presence of E. L. TINY LEWIS and others at the Bar-B-Que Pit, Natchez. Chief topic of conversation was brought up by RED GLOVER at which time he indicated he had heard that some man working at the tie plant had been "fooling around with a colored woman" and he had determined this information was false. GLOVER was asked by WILKINSON if he still had those "young quail" and GLOVER answered in the affirmative. WILKINSON was later heard to state to the group after GLOVER left that GLOVER had some dynamite caps for him and that was why he wanted to call them young quail. On 9/19/69, GLOVER, TINY LEWIS and others met at the Bar-B-Que Pit and were discussing the arrest of BILL WALTON at Eayette, Miss. All of the men indicated they did not know BILL WALTON and also that they did not have any idea whether or not CLYDE DAVIS was an ex-klansman. GLOVER indicated it was his thought that DAVIS was actually living with a Negro woman under the hill at Natchez and was probably mad at the kids or would not have shot at them.

On 10/23/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D)/ advised that Serial 448 on 9/26/69, DON WILKINSON had a klan-type pamphlet thrown on his front yard. He was very upset about this and mada because it had apparently come from Concordia Parish, La., and he had not been notified that it was to be put out in Natchez. He was later told at the Bar-B-Que Pit that GLOVER had done it and GLOVER later verified this. On 10/12/69, GLOVER, DON WILKINSON and others met at the Bar-B-Que Pit and at that time, GLOVER advised WILKINSON that he had not been able to get the papers WILKINSON had wanted because he was worried about the security of SAM BLACKMAN. It was decided the group would call on JOE LEE HARDY and discuss the matter with him. GLOVER made a statement to the effect that BUCK, who lives at 413 Lynn St., Vidalia, and who drives a car with Louisiana license 52E309, might possibly be a Silver Dollar Group member as well as ERNEST PARKER, L. C. MURRAY, and JAMES SEALE. WILKINSON asked GLOVER about "the little quail hunt" and at that time, he went with GLOVER apparently to Vidalia. to the residence of and picked up two dynamite caps. On 10/13/69, GLOVER came by the residence of WILKINSON sometime in the early morning and they went to see BUCK in Vidalia. At that time, GLOVER regained the tape recorder which he had loaned to BUCK. On 10/14/69, several individuals, including GLOVER, went out to the cemetery near Finwick, Miss., to obtain the primer cord. It was discovered that the primer cord was missing and WILKINSON was very worried. On 10/12/69, JOHN BOSTICK turned over to DON WILKINSON, who in turn furnished to RED GLOVER, a rough draft copy of a pamphlet to be put out in Natchez.

FOIA(b)(6) FOIA(b)(7) - (C)

<u>Serial 454</u> On 11/12/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised during a conversation between DON WILKINSON, RED GLOVER, JULIE BURT and TINY LEWIS at the Bar-B-Que Pit, the statement was made that GORDON VINES and GORDON JETER, both of Woodville, Miss., are allegedly "pretty good men". On 11/6/69, GLOVER called

DON WILKINSON and made arrangements to pick up the dynamite that WILKINSON had. He went to the Bar-B-Que Pit and picked up the dynamite and then immediately left, allegedly en route to the Armstrong Tire Plant to go to work. The next day he gave some primer cord and dynamite fuse to WILKINSON to transfer to JIMMY SCAROBOROUGH inasmuch as SCAROBOROUGH had some sort of an idea to mount the primer cord on an arrow to test to see that when the arrow was shot if it would explode upon impact. WILKINSON was overheard to say to GLOVER that he thought it would "throw the Feds off to have the boys across the river do the printing of the next pamphlet", and GLOVER indicated he thought this would be a good idea. GLOVER brought up the Silver Dollar Group and said that a man who was unnamed holds a special dollar and is the head man of the outfit. GLOVER said he wanted WILKINSON to swap silver dollars with him and he was to instruct WILKINSON to take his, GLOVER's, silver dollar and show it to a particular individual. GLOVER also said he wanted WILKINSON to "meet some people who really counted in the future" and stated these people knew where some primer cord was buried about 100 miles from here. GLOVER said there were several people who got silver dollars at the beginning of the organization who did not deserve it and it does not really mean anything.

Serial 458 On 12/1/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised that on 11/24/69, WILKINSON was overheard to tell JOHN BARBER that the dynamite was ready to go. BARBER indicated that he had, at the instruction of RED GLOVER, mixed the dynamite with diesel fuel and sodium nitrate in order to "really set off a bang". Several ex-klansmen are allegedly contacting prominent oil men in Natchez and requesting the oil men to contribute at least \$1,000 apiece for the formulation of a private school in the Natchez area. JOHN BARBER was told by RED GLOVER they had collected several hundred thousand dollars to date and were trying to collect at least one million dollars. BARBER indicated to WILKINSON that he had access to several electric dynamite caps which were actually in the possession of RED GLOVER.

FOIA(b)(6) FOIA(b)(7) - (C)

On 12/10-11/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised DON Serial 460 WILKINSON spoke to RED GLOVER at the Bar-B-Oue Pit and was overheard to say he was ready to test the package of dynamite. GLOVER indicated he had changed his mind about where and when and told WILKINSON he would leave a note for him at the Bar-B-Que Pit indicating where and when they could meet. He also brought by some sodium nitrate fertilizer on 12/6/69, and indicated to WILKINSON that Fayette, Miss., would be a good place to test the material. WILKINSON was heard arguing with GLOVER over E. D. MORACE saying something to him about the "quail getting away". WILKINSON told GLOVER that he and GLOVER were the only two people who knew about the quail and that if MORACE knew about it, GLOVER must have told him because he did not and he was very upset about it. On 2/10/69, GLOVER recontacted DON WILKINSON at the Bar-B-Que Pit and told him it was possible they would test the dynamite package for Sunday, 12/14/69. WILKINSON later admitted to friends of his that he was in doubt about getting GLOVER to attend but he hopes he could.

Serial 461 On 12/23/69, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised that on 12/17/69, GLOVER, JOHN BARBER and DON H. WILKINSON had tested a stick of dynamite with ammonium nitrate drenched in diesel fuel the night of 12/16/69, in a remote area off Highway 84 in Adams County, Miss., but the dynamite was inoperative. On 12/19/69, source advised that BARBER had returned two sticks of dynamite to GLOVER and is now afraid to associate with GLOVER. On 12/22/69, GLOVER was in the process of putting out two leaflets, one of which contains rough language re the desegregation of the public school system in Adams County, Miss., and the other in mild language with religious overtones.

Serial 463 On 1/13/70, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised he has been unable to determine exact location of GLOVER the night of 12/26/69. He advised that according to info furnished him and from things that <u>GLOVER had said</u>, he believes he was probably "shacked up with " in Vidalia, La.

On 1/3/70, JOHN WILLIAM BARBER and DON WILKINSON were overheard talking in the Bar-B-Que Pit in Natchez. GLOVER later came in and was talking to BARBER and WILKINSON and gave to WILKINSON two leaflets which he said he would like to have prepared and handed out.

On 2/9/70 FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised during a Serial 466 conversation GLOVER was overheard to discuss the fire at Bude, Miss., with DON WILKINSON, JOHN BARBER and others and indicated he did not know anything about it. He further mentioned that a CARY MORGAN, who is allegedly a full-time gunsmith in the New Mexico area would do any kind of conversion work from M-1 carbines to M-2 carbines. On 1/31/70, source advised WILKINSON mentioned he had heard from RED GLOVER that E. D. MORACE had had a stroke and was paralyzed. RED GLOVERFmet DON WILKINSON and other individuals at the Bar-B-Que Pit on 2/6 and 7/70, and they discussed the recent arrest of JOHN BARBER and others. GLOVER mentioned he thought they would have to start stealing televisions and guns but he was afraid to do too much because the FBI had been following him and had been at his residence in Natchez as well as at Kentwood, La.

Serial 467 On 3/5/70, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised that on 2/18/70, RED GLOVER was overheard to make the statement that he had "crawled through plenty to get some tools" but did not presently have them. GLOVER recently had a grass fire at his residence in Kentwood, La., and has stated he thinks some of his neighbors tried to burn him out. He thinks this because he had previously burned the grass from around his house and then when he later checked on the residence, he found that part of the house had been burned.

Serial 468 On 4/2/70, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised that on 3/8/70, DON WILKINSON and RED GLOVER were heard talking at the Bar-B-Que Pit in Natchez and RED GLOVER indicated to WILKINSON

that he was broke and wanted to sell to him a tape deck to put in his car. WILKINSON refused saying that he did not need it and would try to find someone who wanted the tape deck and advise GLOVER. GLOVER mentioned that they gave an SDG funeral to E. D. MORACE and just before the coffin was closed, they put in his klan robes. Source advised RED GLOVER indicated to several individuals on 4/1/70, he was going back to Kentwood, La., to check on his home there. He and POLLY have been living at a trailer park located on North Highway 61 in Natchez but are supposed to move back to Kentwood just any day.

On 4/20/70, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised that Serial 469 on 4/11/70, a group of individuals met at the Temple Auto Parts, Vidalia, La., at the request of GLOVER and proceeded to the Good Hope Hunting Club near the levee between Ferriday and Vidalia, La. During the meeting, PAUL TOLBERT and GLOVER indicated they wanted to discuss the formation of a new klan unit and were to consider whether they wanted to become part of the Original Knights of the KKK or the UKA. The EC of the unit elected by the group was PAUL TOLBERT. GLOVER was elected the Investigator and THOMAS YOUNG was elected secretary. On 4/18/70, another meeting was held on the levee near the Hunting Club inasmuch as there was approximately five feet of water over the road. GLOVER was present at the meeting. Source advised DONALD WILKINSON was talking to RED GLOVER at the Bar-B-Que Pit on N. Highway 61 at Natchez, and indicated to GLOVER that he had written a letter to the Minutemen and advised them he will begin to send dues into them when they begin to correspond with him. He stated he has not heard from them since the first part of May other than the material that was sent to him and further indicated that he intends to keep his unit intact. GLOVER discussed trying to find a clip for a "grease gun", stating he knew where one was or where he could get a hold of one.

E. D. MORACE, R. J. GLOVER and KENNETH NORMAN HEAD continue to get together and discuss the obtaining of automatic weapons and additional explosives. This is still in the talking stage.

MORACE told KENNETH NORMAN HEAD that he had been hunting with JAMES "Red" LEE during the past week. LEE continues to express his loyalty to SDG, but does not meet regularly or function as a group.

#### WILLIAM LOUIS WOOD

The background on WILLIAM LOUIS WOOD remains the same. Source stated that there has been no Klan activity in Vidalia, Louisiana-Natchez, Mississippi area for the past two years, and source believes WOOD is completely inactive.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP AND MINUTEMEN

On Friday, January 16, 1970, R. J. GLOVER was observed to contact E. D. MORACE at MORACE's home in Ferriday, Louisiana, about 8:15 P.M. GLOVER asked if MORACE and KENNETH HEAD had buried the metal box which GLOVER had furnished HEAD. MORACE said he had not seen the box and thought they were going to bury explosives in the metal barrel which he obtained at the bakery in Natchez. GLOVER said the box was much better. He said the box was about 5½ feet long, 3½ feet wide, 3½ feet deep, and the inside was covered with black colored insulation. He said the seams of the box have been sordered to make it waterproof.

GLOVER suggested that MORACE and HEAD bury the box at the deer hunting camp near the levee at Ferriday, so it will be ready when HEAD and MORACE steal explosives in the near future. GLOVER said a lot of explosives will be needed to take care of needs shortly. GLOVER said that although all three men are Minutemen members, this was an SDG operation. On January 17, 1970, HEAD was visited by MORACE and the two men evidently made plans for burying the metal box. HEAD was overheard to say that his son-in-law JAMES WATTS was away for about three weeks and upon his return explosives would be stolen.

On Sunday, January 18, 1970, MORACE was observed to dig a metal container from the ground in his back yard and drive to HEAD's house on Lake Concordia near Ferriday. MORACE was also carrying a cardboard box with the words, "primercord" on the box. HEAD and MORACE drove to the deer hunting camp near the lev at Ferriday, and drove some 14 miles toward the river to the top of a small ridge. They buried the large metal box which GLOVER bad furnished HEAD. MORACE showed HEAD inside the cardboard box he had and inside was a 500 foot roll of black colored primercord. MORACE said you could wrap three feet of this around a tree and it would blow the tree completely down. This primercord was placed inside the large metal box.

MORACE buried his home built explosive container about thirty feet from the metal box. He showed HEAD the contents of the container. Later HEAD and MORACE reported to a friend that the explosive container had a large number of sticks of dynamite in it and some other explosive divices.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP

On 12/11/69, KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and E. D. MORACE were overheard talking at the Hughes and New Oil Co., Shop at Natchez, Miss., where they are both employed. HEAD said he was making a trip on the afternoon of 12/12/69, to south Louisiana, to see a buddy who works for Slumber Jay Co. This buddy wig being transferred and had obtained some electric blasting caps for HEAD which he wanted to pick up before the man left.

HEAD was observed to be back at work on 12/15/69 (Monday), but MORACE was off from work sick on the 15th and 16th and the two men were not observed to talk.

HEAD told MORACE on 12/11/69, that he still intends to steal the explosives he had previously mentioned. MORACE said he was available to help, but felt they should have a storage place so immediately after the explosives are stolen they could be buried.

On 12/12/69, E. D. MORACE was observed to go to J. B. TEMPLE Auto Parts at Vidalia, La., and ELTON HESTER of near Meadville, Miss., was at the business. MORACE

MORACE and HESTER obviously had not seen each other in months and talked of old times. HESTER said he had seen R. J. GLOVER on 12/8/69, and that GLOVER had told HESTER to keep the explosives he had stored handy for a project. Also that HESTER might be needed to help on a project soon. HESTER asked MORACE what was going on and MORACE did not answer. About that time J. B. TEMPLE, an ex-klansman, but not a SDG member walked up and the two men quit talking.

On 12/13/69 (Saturday) during the morning R. J. GLOVER was observed to contact E. D. MORACE at the Hughes and New Oil Co. GLOVER said he had been to MORACE's home in Ferriday, to see him. MORACE said he had to work every Saturday morning. GLOVER asked MORACE how many alarm clocks he could pick up. MORACE said the only place he knew to obtain them was at the store. GLOVER said he did not want them purchased as they might be traced and he wanted to make some time bombs. GLOVER said he needs at least four more alarm clocks to go with the one MORACE had already furnished him.

MORACE asked the purpose of the time bombs and GLOVER said there were two white schools and two Negro

schools at Natchez, Miss. (evidently meaning high schools, and junior high schools). GLOVER said that starting in January, 1970, these schools will be fully integrated and therefore Negro schools should be blown up. GLOVER asked MORACE if he had the dynamite and primercord stored by him readily available and MORACE said it could be obtained quickly.

JAMES HORACE "Sonny" TAYLOR of Harrisonburg, La., contacted E. MORACE on Sunday (12/14/69). TAYLOR said he was working at Kentwood, La. for a short time and was home only weekends. He said that R. J. GLOVER had been to his home earlier that week and had left word for TAYLOR to see him. MORACE said he felt sure GLOVER spent the weekend in Natchez, but did not know how to contact him. TAYLOR said he would try to contact GLOVER through his stepson in Natchez.

#### MINUTEMEN

DON WILKENSON, Network Commander, Minutemen Unit 1733, Natchez, Miss., was contacted by E. D. MORACE, Squad Leader for La., about 4:00 PM, on 12/1/69. WILKENSON said he had been working overtime and had not had time for Minutemen activity. He said he had received a letter from Minutemen headquarters and that he had a project to be undertaken in the next two weeks. WILKENSON did not reveal the nature of the project to MORACE.

MORACE asked WILKENSON if he had found any of the missing quail. WILKENSON asked what MORACE meant. MORACE said he understood a man had given WILKENSON a sack of quail and WILKENSON untied the sack and let the quail escape. WILKENSON then understood MORACE was talking about the missing primer cord which GLOVER had given him. WILKENSON said that one sack of quail had been found, but the other was lost in a graveyard.

WILKENSON was complaining about his new neighbor, a retired military man who moved into a trailer nearby. WILKENSON said he felt the man is just a "Fed" undercover.

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#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP

JAMES F. LEE of Natchez, Miss., and E. D. MORACE of Ferriday, La., met on 12/1/69, at LEE's home. They discussed the general racial situation. LEE said he had been to see SONNY TAYLOR at Harrisonburg, La., recently but TAYLOR is working out of the area much of the time. MORACE asked LEE for some baloney-type dynamite to give to FOUNT MC NEELY. LEE said he had none left as GLOVER took all that was left over. He said that was several years ago, so the dynamite is probably no good.

LEE talked of R. J. GLOVER and said GLOVER is as crazy as ever and would like to just blow up the schools in Natchez, rather than face integration. LEE said he was through with explosives and would have nothing more to do with explosives. He said diesel fuel and gasoline could be used if it was necessary to destroy a building.

LEE stated that GLOVER came by his house recently and had some fertilizer and diesel fuel which he said would make an explosive if mixed. GLOVER wanted to go and test it, but LEE was not interested. MORACE asked LEE to see DON WILKENSON whom LEE barely knows, and ask WILKENSON about the missing explosives.

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#### KNIGHTS OF WHITE CAMELLIA NO File 100-14953

Source has no information as to the identity of the person or group writing letters signed Knights of the White Camellia. Source stated the Knights of the White Camellia are 2nd Degree klansmen. He noted there were only three klansmen in the Ferriday - Clayton Unit of the OKKKK who had been accepted into the 2nd Degree. These were PETE WARDELL, JAMES SCAROBROUGH, and E. D. MORACE. He said there is no organization of Knights of the White Camellia, but any klansman active for a long time and recommended can become a member, much like a degree in the Masonic Lodge.

#### RALEIGH JACKSON CLOVER

On November 4, 1969, a confidential source who has furnished reliable information in the past advised that a store owner, not further identified, in the vicinity of Kentwood, Louisiana, had contacted Raleigh Jackson Glover, who is also known as Red Glover and who is employed as a tire builder at the Armstrong Tire and Rubber Company, Natchez, Mississippi. Glover has a house on small acreage north of Kentwood near the Mississippi line.

According to the confidential source, the unknown store owner informed Glover that a Negro grandparent in that area had started to send his grandchildren to a public school on a school bus used entirely by white children. The unidentified store owner reportedly knew of Glover's propensity for violence in racial matters and suggested that he take some action. Glover was overheard to state that he would burn the house of the Negroes involved.

On November 18, 1969, Captain Charles Binder, Tangipahoa Parish Sheriff's Office (TPSO), was advised of the above information. He stated that the identity of the Negroes and the store owner were unknown to him, but he would make a discreet investigation into the matter, take appropriate action, and advise the FBI of the results, if any.

#### RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER

On December 3, 1969, Deputy Sheriff Roger Dale Sanders TPSO; advised that he had conducted an investigation as a result of information furnished to him by Captain Binder. He stated that his inquiry and personal knowledge of the community indicated that the details apparently applied to Leroy Dickerson, a Negro who resides within sight of Sanders' residence. Deputy Sheriff Sanders stated that he would remain alert for any possible violence.

LEROY DICKERSON, Route 3, Box 350, Kentwood, Louisiana, was contacted at his residence. He volunteered the following information:

His married daughter MYRTLE MAE DICKERSON. a resident of New Orleans, Louisiana, has two sons who reside with him. At the beginning of school this fall, they began riding a public school bus carrying mostly Negro children. 14 A neighbor, AUBREY SANDERS, a white school bus operator, advised DICKERSON that he was disappointed that DICKERSON had not chosen to send his grandchildren to the newly integrated public school on his bus. DICKERSON stated that SANDERS is not paid on the basis of the number of pupils carried, but he seemed genuinely hurt that DICKERSON did not send his grandchildren on his bus. Therefore, DICKERSON, at some inconvenience because of the earlier time that SANDERS' bus left that area, started sending TERRY and REGINALD, ages 8 and 6 years respectively, on SANDERS' bus. DICKERSON said he had not received any threats from anyone for any reason. He knew of no one who would burn his house down.

DICKERSON stated that he knew RALEIGH GLOVER as a distant neighbor and had heard of GLOVER's alleged involvement in racial violence in the Natchez area, but they did not know each other personally.

DICKERSON stated that the only store in that area for a great distance is IVY MC GEHEE's store, where he has been a customer for many years. MC GEHEE has never expressed any concern or opposition to DICKERSON's grandchildren riding the school bus.

DICKERSON stated that he would advise the FBI should he receive any threats or pertinent information. He voluntcered the following description of himself and personal data:

IVY M. MC GEHEE was contacted at his store/residence. He was apprised that an inquiry was being made as a result of information received that a conspiracy possibly in violation of Federal law had been reported. He was apprised of his rights at the outset by form entitled "Interrogation; Advice of Rights." He executed the waiver portion of that form.

MC GEHEE agreed to orally furnish the following information:

He had not heard of any conspiracy to burn anyone's house down and was not a party to any such plot. He was of the opinion that the desegregation of public schools had been accomplished in that area and he was pleased that no violence had taken place as a result. He added that he is opposed to violence and would have no part in it directly or indirectly.

He stated that he had not seen RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER to talk with since he was last contacted by the FBI about five months ago in connection with an inquiry concerning GLOVER's residence in that area. He has, however, observed GLOVER passing by his store since he (MC GEHEE) was contacted.

#### SLIVER DOLLAR GROUP

On 11/17/69, R. J. GLOVER and E. D. MORACE met at MORACE's house at Ferriday, La. GLOVER was upset and would talk only about DON WILKENSON of Natohez, Miss. GLOVER said he had given WILKENSON explosives to keep for him and WILKENSON buried the explosives in a sack in a cemetery. When he recently asked WILKENSON for the explosives WILKENSON said they were gone.

GLOVER stated he wanted MORACE to help him put pressure on WILKENSON and suggested that MORACE make contact with WILKENSON or have someone else do it. He should tell WILKENSON he understands a man brought him a sack of birds and that WILKENSON let the sack open up and the birds got out. Also that the birds better not turn up in the wrong hands. GLOVER said that this will shake WILKENSON up.

WILKENSON said that a while back he took WILKENSON out with him to put out klan literature and that WILKENSON is always bragging. He said he thinks he will give WILKENSON some klan literature and tell him to put it out in Fayett, Mississippi, where there is a Negro mayor and police. Then he will see if WILKENSON is a brave as he talks. MORACE told GLOVER that he, MORACE had been trying to see JAMES F. LEE to ask him for some dynamite for a man down on Black River. GLOVER said LEE's father died recently and LEE has been away from home. MORACE said he might ask LEE to make the contact with WILKENSON as GLOVER wanted.

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and E. D. MORACE met at HEAD's home on Lake Concordia, Ferriday, Louisiana, on the afternoon of 11/16/69. HEAD had a plan to make explosives which he had found in a hunting magazine. According to HEAD you could use fifty pounds of Nitrate Sodium, a fertilizer, and add two gallons of deisel fuel. By using a blasting cap this mixture would blow a large hole in the ground. HEAD said this would be much safer than using regular explosives as no one could trace it to the source.

#### UNSUB; DISTRIBUTION OF INFLAMMATORY PAMPHLET, NATCHEZ, MISSISSIPPI, SEPTEMBER 12 - 16, 1969

SDG and Minutemen members in the Ferriday, Louisiana, area feel that the pamphlets distributed about a month ago, pretending to be SDS and BPP publications were distributed by someone wanting to scare people. They feel there is no SDS or BPP in the Natchez area. The feeling among SDG members is that a Negro at Natchez, Mississippi, is responsible for the pamphlets.

Source has no information about HAROLD LEE FRANCISCO and SPIRO ALEXANDER TALAMBAS and doubts they are members of the Minutemen in Louisiana.

#### **REGGIE CARTER**.

On 11/14/69, REGGIE CARTER, a former klansman at Natchez, Mississippi, was observed talking to E. D. MORACE at a cafe on Highway 61, South in Natchez, Mississippi, which cafe is on the right side of the road past the Bellemont Motel going south. CARTER was upset over impending school integration at Natchez, Mississippi. He was talking about getting ROBERT SHELTON to come in and help reorganize the klan. MORACE said he thought SHLETON was in prison, but CARTER felt SHELTON was already out of prison. CARTER said that the way people feel about the integration which must take place next month they might back the klan now.

GLOVER said that the only thing holding him back from burning the Negro house was that he did not completely trust the man at the store in Kentwood, La., who had told GLOVER about the Negroes and requested that GLOVER take action GLOVER, suggested that two of his men should go talk

to this man and let him know that if they burned the Negro house, and this man revealed it, that he would suffer. GLOVER said the man could be tested by having two of the men go by and see him and tell him they are friends of GLOVER and see what the man says.

HEAD said that if the four-men were going to burn the house at Kentwood, they should-not be seen in the area WILKENSON suggested that they could get some other men from the Natchez area to go to Kentwood, and handle seeing the man at the store. The man at the store who had furnished information about the Negro children to GLOVER was not further identified.

WILKENSON suggested that instead of burning the Negro house, they could use the timebomb clock built by MORACE and have it go off hours later. GLOVER said that the "Feds" investigate bombings so they will burn the house. WILKENSON was in a hurry to get home to watch the football game on T. V. and GLOVER said he was going to Kentwood, La., for the weekend.

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and E. D. MORACE were observed talking together at the Hughes and New Oil Company Shop on U. S. Highway 61, South, Natchez, Mississippi, on 11/3/69. They were discussing the school situation and the possibility of HEW forcing further integration. HEAD was overheard to say that the answer was to find out where an HEW man was staying when in the Ferriday-Natchez area and then just let him come up missing.

GLOVER told HEAD to tell MORACE he wants to see him next Saturday afternoon and may want MORACE to go to Kentwood, La., with him "to take care of the matter he had discussed." GLOVER told HEAD he would like to hold a meeting of SDG members in the near future.

READ told MORACE later that day of GLOVER's request. MORACE told HEAD that GLOVER is wanting him to travel to Kentwood, with him and burn a Negro house.

HEAD told MORACE he wants to get his explosive container built. MORACE pointed out a piece of five inch steel pipe in the Hughes and New Oil Company Shop and told HEAD to get a piece of that, a piece of flat steel, and a nipple for the top, and that he would do the welding for HEAD. HEAD said he did not want GLOVER to know about the explosive container or the explosives that HEAD has, as GLOVER would want to take the explosives to Mississippi.

On 10/22/69, in the late afternoon MORACE and HEAD were talking about the racial situation at Monterey, La. MORACE said that things were very quiet in Monterey, and that there were no meetings of former members of the klan unit there. MORACE said he had received a telephone call that day from FOUNT MC NEELY, the former leader of the klan at Monterey, and MC NEELY requested that MORACE come to see him on Sunday, 10/26/69. MORACE indicated he would go and see if the "boys" at Monterey need help.

#### RACIAL SITUATION, FERRIDAY, LOUISIANA.

The racial situation at Ferriday, La., is very quiet. There have not been any meetings of the Citizens for Quality Education or the Committee for Constitutional Government.

#### MINUTEMEN AND SILVER DOLLAR GROUP

There has been no Minutemen activity by the Ferriday-Natchez Unit during the past week.

R. J. GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE of Ferriday, Louisiana, on October 3, 1969. MORACE showed GLOVER the copies of the one page circular printed by the Citizens for Constitutional Government. GLOVER liked the circular and took twenty copies to distribute in Natchez, Mississippi.

GLOVER talked of an old Negro man and woman who live in Kentwood, Louisiana. Their daughter in New Orleans, Louisiana, brought her children to stay with the old couple. The children rode the Negro school bus two days and then started riding the white school bus. GLOVER said that maybe their house needs burning while they are away or even when they are in the house. He said he will look into the situation further before making plans.

GLOVER said he thinks a young man who runs around with DON WILKENSON, Network Commander of the Minutemen at Natchez, is an FBI informant. Some time ago GLOVER, WILKENSON, and this young man made a trip to Woodville, Mississippi, and contacted the deputy there who is a SDG member. Soon afterward the deputy told GLOVER that the FBI had been to see him and told him GLOVER was no good. The deputy said that either WILKENSON or the young man had told the FBI. GLOVER stated he feels the young friend of WILKENSON is the FBI "Plant".

GLOVER talked of TOMMIE JONES and the allegations that JONES is running around with a Negro woman in Natchez. An Armstrong Tire Company employee told GLOVER recently that he tried to catch JONES picking up the woman, but failed GLOVER talked to JONES and he denied he was seeing a Negro woman. GLOVER believed JONES and told the employee to leave JONES alone.

PAUL TOLBERT and E. D. MORACE met on October 5, 1969. TOLBERT told MORACE to tell R. J. GLOVER he had obtained some explosives for him. TOLBERT said he had dynamite, dynamite fuses, dynamite caps, and electric caps. MORACE later told a friend of this and said he bet the explosives came from the bridge construction job at Clayton, Louisiana, where a bridge is being built on Highway 15, across the river. He said FRANK DE LAUGHTER is a friend of TOLBERT and of the foreman at the bridge construction site.

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and E. D. MORACE were observed in conversation at the Hughes and New Oil Company, garage in Natchez, Mississippi, on October 8, 1969. HEAD said he had six boxes of .38 caliber ammunition for

MORACE. HEAD stated he also had obtained a lot of carbine ammunition, some 30-06 tracer ammunition, and some explosive putty.

MORACE asked HEAD if HEAD's son-in-law furnished him the ammunition and explosives as the son-in-law had told MORACE he had a supply of 30-06 tracer ammunition. HEAD did not say where he obtained it.

#### VIRGIL G. WRIGHT

VIRGIL G. WRIGHT continues to reside at Star Route A, Box 69C, Jonesville, Louisiana, and continues to work as a State Drivers License Examiner in Concordia Parish; Louisiana. He still has the same 1968 blue Dodge Dart and the 1960 red Chevrolet pickup truck with the same 1969-70 licenses.

WRIGHT is completely inactive in the Minutemen and will not be active again. He was active in the Minutemen for only a few months in 1967-68, because of his activity in the Concordia Parish Rifle Club. He has not been a member of the Minutemen since the Fall of 1968, and has had no assiciation with current Minutemen members.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP AND MINUTEMEN

R. J. GLOVER and E. D. MORACE met on October 10, 1969, about 9:30 A. M., at the Barbeque Pit, Natchez, Mississippi. GLOVER said he had been to Kentwood, Louisiana, the previous weekend and had scouted the Negro family he had previously discussed who had children in the white school. He said he had not yet decided what action should be taken, but he wanted MORACE to help him later.

CLOVER and MORACE were observed to walk to GLOVER's white Oldsmobile and GLOVER took what appeared to be a rifle barrel from under the driver's seat of his car. GLOVER said it was the barrel to the Russian "Burp Gun", and that the barrel did not fit properly on the gun. He said he was going to get a friend to work on the barrel.

E. D. MORACE was observed to talk to KENNETH NORMAN HEAD on October 15, 1969. The men discussed explosives and HEAD said he needed to build an explosive container something like MORACE had built. He then wanted MORACE to help him bury the container in the ground along a levee. MORACE said the levee near HEAD's house would not be safe, as the container might be dug up by road repairmen. HEAD said he would use the levee along the Mississippi River where there was no road.

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The Minutemen held no meetings and there was no activity by Minutemen Unit 1733, the Ferriday-Natchez Unit.

# RACIAL SITUATION-FERRIDAY, LOUISIANA

The racial situation in Ferriday, Louisiana, is very quiet. There were no meetings by the Citizens for Constitutional Government or by the Citizens for Quality Education. There was a movie shown at the local theater on about October 9, 1969, sponsored by the Concerned Parents. The movie concerned sex education in the schools and was allegedly the film which backers of sex education wanted to be shown to school children. The American Party leaders are trying to use this film to arouse parents for

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political reasons and there does not appear to be any danger of violence in this activity.

# JAMES FOUNT MC NEELY

JAMES FOUNT MC NEELY still has the same residence, employment, car and Louisiana license he had six months ago. MC NEELY has not been active in the Klan for at least three years. Source is not aware of Silver Dollar Group membership on the part of MC NEELY, but will determine if MC NEELY is a member.

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Source is not familiar with the name K. ENSINK and can furnish no information at this time as to the meaning of the numbers "A=50357".

# SILVER DOLLAR GROUP AND RACIAL SITUATION, FERRIDAY, LOUISIANA

R. J. GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE at the MORACE home in Ferriday, Louisiana about 10:00 AM, September 30, 1969. GLOVER said he was in a hurry and could not stay and talk. He furnished MORACE three explosive devices, which he stated were "booby traps," and asked MORACE to keep them. GLOVER said he would tell MORACE later his plan for the "booby traps."

The above-mentioned explosive device is about seven inches long and consists of a ring attached to a wire and attached to a small metal piece which looks something like a blasting cap. Between the metal piece and the ring is a salmon-colored piece of cardboard which the wire runs through. There is a sleeve separate.

GLOVER stated the sleeve can be attached over the metal end of the device, and a wire can be attached to that end also. Then the device can be hung between two pieces of wire, and anyone who walks into it will set off the device.

There was an American Party rally held at the rodeo grounds near Ferriday, Louisiana on the night of September 26, 1969. ERSHEL BOYD was in charge of the meeting, and about 270 persons attended. Dr. GERALD TROSCLAIR spoke at the meeting and explained why the Citizens' Committee for Quality Education (CCQE) had called off the school boycott.

Another rally was held at the same place on Sunday afternoon, October 5, 1969. The following circular was passed out at the meeting:

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and E. D. MORACE met at the MORACE home on September 27, 1969, and discussed the circular which HEAD was preparing for the Constitutional Crusaders. HEAD exhibited the one-page circular he had written, and MORACE read it. They decided to have it printed for distribution.

MORACE and HEAD drove to the Concordia Parish Hospital, Ferriday, and visited FOUNT MC NEELY, who was in the hospital for treatment of ulcers. They showed the circular to MC NEELY, and he said it was just what they needed. He requested 500 copies of circulars so he could distribute it in the Monterey, Louisiana area.

On September 28, 1969, MORACE took the circular to PAUL TOLBERT, Clayton, Louisiana, and requested that he get 2000 of the circulars printed. TOLBERT, on September 30, 1969, brought MORACE the circulars. He had four bundles of 500 circulars each. TOLBERT and MORACE agreed to meet at the MORACE house on the night of October 1, 1969, to roll the circulars and prepare them for distribution.

On the afternoon of October 1, 1969, MORACE drove to Monterey, Louisiana to see MC NEELY, who had been released from the hospital, but who was still in bed. MORACE furnished MC NEELY a bundle of 500 circulars.

MC MEELY inquired about the way the circulars were signed Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, 2nd Battalion, 1st Division, North Louisiana. MORACE said that he and HEAD had decided to sign the circular KKKK, but HEAD, being a Minutemen member, had also put a military title on it. MORACE said that anyone ever connected with the Klan would realize there was no such thing as a battalion or division in the Klan.

The circular is as follows:

# J. B. CALHOUN, AFA (NEW ORLEANS FILE 89-96)

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On the afternoon of October 1, 1969, FOUNT MC NEELY and E. D. MORACE discussed the matter of J. B. CALHOUN's assault on and arrest by an FBI agent. MORACE questioned MC NEELY about any plan to take action against the FBI agent. MC NEELY said he had discussed the matter with the other men in the area, and they had decided to take no action on the agent.

#### DONNIE CRAFT

DONNIE CRAFT has not been active in the Minutemen during the past year and quit the Minutemen in the Fall of 1968, because he was mad at former Minutemen Commander JAMES SCAROBROUGH. CRAFT was contacted by Minutemen Squad Leader E. D. MORACE about becoming active in the Minutemen again but declined to join the Minutemen again.

#### E. D. MORACE

E. D. MORACE quit his job as a mechanic with Hinton-McCoy Ford Company, Ferriday, Louisiana, on September 22, 1969. MORACE got into an argument with the shop foreman at the Ford Company, HAROLD SPIVY. A school bus had been brought in by a white school bus driver who told MORACE to fix the

brakes. MORACE found that the two rear brake drums were worn out. SPIVY wanted to replace the drums with two used drums from Brown Wrecking Yard, which cost \$15.00 a drum. MORACE insisted on using new drums, which cost about \$20.00 each. MORACE said it was dangerous to use the old drums, and SPIVY said it would not hurt for the bus to have a wreck, as it hauled some Negroes anyway. MORACE said the driver was white, and there were some white children on the bus.

MORACE finished fixing the school bus and quit his job. His house is located across the street from the Ford garage, and it was noted that he remained at home the rest of the week.

MORACE and KENNETH NORMAN HEAD were observed to go to the Hughes and New Oil Company, Highway 61, South, Natchez, Mississippi, on September 23, 1969. HEAD is employed as a mechanic for this company. MORACE inquired about a job and was hired as a mechanic. He was to start to work on October 6, 1969. The telephone at the Hughes and New Oil Company is 442-1607.

The attached FD-397 is being submitted by New Orleans, recently designated as 00, with the following resume recommending RALEICH JACKSON GLOVER for inclusion on the Agitator Index:

The subject has been reported by numerous sources who have furnished reliable information in the past to have been a member of Klan units, both in the vicinity of Natchez, Miss., and in the adjacent Louisiana parish. He was the organizer and leader of the Silver Dollar Group, an association of members of various Klan groups, which individuals have a reputation for violence. While the subject's principal motivation is based on hatred for persons of the Negro race, his violent acts and lawlessness have also been directed towards personal gain. He is reported to have participated in numerous thefts and is immoral.

GLOVER is the primary suspect in the bombing murder of WHARLEST JACKSON, a Negro who was among the first of his race to be assigned a job formerly held only by persons of the white race at GLOVER's place of employment. He is also a suspect in several other bombings, murders, and acts of violence.

The subject reportedly possesses fully automatic weapons, dynamite, and other explosives. He allegedly possesses knowledge in the handling and detonation of explosive devices.

The subject takes pride in his anti-Negro and violent endeavors, and has encouraged others to follow his example. He is extremely hostile to Bureau Agents. GLOVER has also suggested violence to punish or intimidate judges of courts of law. NO 157-3489

By the above acts, the subject has demonstrated a propensity for fomenting violence and racial disorder. He has also attracted attention of the national press to racial discord in Natchez, Miss., and personal notoriety to the people in Natchez and vicinity.

Therefore, he has been mentioned in the several bombings which have occurred in the past in Natchez, Miss.

Subject maintains an active membership in Unit 1733 of the Minutemen and also claims membership in the Silver Dollar Group, an organization formulated from and by hard core Klan members. Subject has mentioned to various confidential sources on several occasions that he has access to explosives, blasting caps, and possibly automatic weapons. It is therefore recommended that he be considered for inclusion on the Agitator Index.

## SILVER DOLLAR GRUP AND RACIAL SITUATION, FERRIDAY, LA.

There was a meeting of the Citizens for Constitutional Government at the home of E. D. MORACE, at Ferriday, La., on the night of 9/4/69. Attending were FOUNT MC NEELY, WESLEY WARREN, E. D. MORACE, J. B. TEMPLE, PAUL TOLBERT, and two employees of the Ford Garage at Ferriday, BUSTER ROWE, and HAROLD SPIVY.

During the meeting MC NEELY was seen to approach MORACE confidentially and say that he was having trouble with a Negro family in the Monterey, La., area. This family has children attending the white school and riding on a school bus either driven by one of the CALHOUN boys or on which the CALHOUN children were riding. MORACE told MC NEELY not to mention the matter there as ROWE, TEMPLE and SPIVY thought the meeting was non-violent.

The men discussed the first issue of their newspaper and decided to make the first issue a one page sheet. They placed some part of the constitution in the paper and an advertisement about a rally of the Committee for Quality Education at the ball park in Ferriday, on 9/7/69.

It was decided that PAUL TOLBERT would have the paper printed on the mimeograph machine at Natchez, Miss., and all of the men would

return to MORACE's home on the afternoon of 9/6/69, to pick up copies and distribute them.

On 9/6/69, about 5:00 PM, TOLBERT brought about 2500 copies of the one page newspaper to the home of MORACE. These were given out to MORACE, TOLBERT, BUSTER ROWE, and SPIVY.

About 8:30 PM, FOUNT MC NEELY came to MORACE's home and got 500 copies of the newspaper to distribute in the Monterey, La., area. MC NEELY told MORACE he had taken care of the Negro family and they had moved out of the Monterey, La., school area. MORACE asked how he accomplished this and MC NEELY said he got the owner of the property where the Negro lived totalk to the Negro family.

On 9/6/69 after 8:30 PM, E. D. MORACE and NORMAN HEAD were observed to distribute copies of the one page newspaper in the Ferrid: La., area. That night about 10:00 PM, HEAD called his son-in-law and had him to come to MORACE's house. There HEAD and MORACE got the son-in-law in a car and confronted him with information that the son-in-law had turned in MORACE to the "Feds" for having a Russian "burp gun."

On 9/8/69, R. J. GLOVER and E. D. MORACE met at the home of MORACE. GLOVER has talked to HEAD and was aware that MORACE and HEAD had confronted HEAD's son-in-law. GLOVER said the wife of JAMES LEE told him that a man who works at Gibson's in Natchez, worked for the

"Feds". GLOVER said he is sure this is HEAD's son-in-law.

MORACE and GLOVER talked of the vandalism at schools in Ferriday, the previous night. They said that none of their men were involved and it must have been done by juveniles.

There was a rally of the Citizens for Quality Education at the ballpark in Ferriday, at 2:00 PM, on 9/7/69. About 2000 people were there. There was a vote as to whether or not to boycott the schools and all but about eleven people voted for the boycott. Dr. TROSCLAIR was in charge of the meeting. A Methodist minister opposed boycott, but was booed from the speaker's stand.

There was an emergency meeting of the Citizens for Quality Education held at the School Board Office at Vidalia, La., from about 3:30 to 5:00 PM, on 9/9/69. This meeting was announced over the local radio station, but Dr. TROSCLAIR, who was in attendance said he did not call the meeting. There were many women and about ten men there. TROSCLAIR said the boycott would have to be called off because of the vandalism at the school in Ferriday, the night before. The women objected to calling off the boycott. It was decided to meet on 9/10/69, at a time and place to be announced by radio on 9/19/69.

There was no Minutemen activity during the past week.

#### MINUTEMEN

The Ferriday-Natchez Unit of the Minutemen has been completely inactive during the past week.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP (SDG) AND MINUTEMEN

E. D. MORACE and KENNETH NORMAN HEAD met at the home of HEAD near Ferriday, Louisiana, on the night of August 22, 1969, and discussed the son-in-law of HEAD, who is employed at Gibson's, Natches, Mississippi, and whose name is KAHL. They discussed why the son-in-law told authorities about MORACE having possession of the Russian "Burp Gun." HEAD said he thinks his son-in-law has been working for the FBI for a long time. HEAD said that several years ago, R. J. GLOVER, THOR TORGESON, TOMMIE JONES, and HEAD took the picture of JEFFERSON DAVIS at the Jefferson Davis Hospital, Natchez, Mississippi, and replaced it with a picture of MARTIN LUTHER KING. Later the FBI interviewed HEAD and HEAD now knows that his son-in-law told the FBI.

HEAD said that his son-in-law recently tried to set a trap for CHARLES D. SMITH, by telling SMITH the identity of a white man and Negro woman in Natchez, who were meeting, and where they were meeting. SMITH drove by the place and saw an FBI car so knew it was a trap. HEAD said there was one thing his son-in-law did not tell the FBI and that was about the time R. J. GLOVER, HEAD, and his son-in-law burned down the train depot at Roxie, or Meadville, Mississippi. MORACE asked why the depot was burned and HEAD said it was one of GLOVER's ideas. HEAD said that all his son-in-law did was to drive the car.

On Saturday, August 23, 1969, R. J. GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE at the Ford Garage in Ferriday, Louisiana. GLOVER inquired about the son-in-law of HEAD and MORACE told GLOVER of the son-in-law turning him, MORACE, in for having the Russian "Burp Gun." GLOVER said he now had the Russian "Burp Gun" back in his possession. He said they would watch the son-in-law of HEAD in the future and not trust him.

#### CITIZENS FOR CONSTITUTIONAL GOVERNMENT

On the night of August 25, 1969, R. J. GLOVER, E. D. MORACE, J. B. TEMPLE, and an unidentified man who was with TEMPLE met at the home of E. D. MORACE at Ferriday, Louisiana. The purpose of the meeting was to print the first issue of the newspaper planned by the organization.

MORACE said he had received work from a son of PAUL TOLBERT that day and PAUL said the material did not come in and they could not print the first issue until the material arrived. MORACE said he contacted FOUNT

MC NEELY of the Monterey-Black River area on August 24, 1969, and MC NEELY said he could not attend the meeting the next night. MORACE said he thinks MC NEELY favors a more violent approach to the school integration problem.

GLOVER said the group did not have to wait for material as he could get the man in Mississippi, who wrote "The White Sentinel" to write the first issue of the newspaper on a stencil. TEMPLE then explained to GLOVER what they wanted in the first issue. He said it should set forth the constitution and amendments and then work into the school integration being illegal. TEMPLE told GLOVER to stick to facts and not to urge violence or illegal action or they all might be arrested.

R. J. GLOVER is again staying with his stepson in Natchez, Mississippi, during the week and going home to his wife in Kentwood, Louisiana, on weekends.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP AND MINUTEMEN

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and E. D. MORACE, Minutemen and SDC members met on the night of August 30, 1969. HEAD said that he and R. J. GLOVER have obtained a new automatic weapon that will work if they can find one part for it. HEAD said he has set a trap for his sonin-law by telling him that he, HEAD, now had the Russian Machine Gun under his bed and that it was rebored into a .45 caliber gun and was working good. HEAD said if he is interviewed by the "Feds" he will know his son-in-law is working for the "Féds".

HEAD spoke of the time about four years ago, when he helped R. J. CLOVER and THOR TORCESON of Natchez, Mississippi, burglarize an oil field supply place and they obtained dynamite, caps, and primercord. HEAD said GLOVER took all of the explosives and he is tired of all of the explosives being taken to Mississippi. HEAD suggested that a place be fixed to hide explosives in Louisiana.

MORACE spoke of the Minutemen and said he was not even receiving mail from the organization now.

HEAD said it was better to have no activity for awhile.

R. J. GLOVER was observed to drive to the home of E. D. MORACE at Ferriday, Louisiana, on September 1, 1969, about 7:30 PM. GLOVER would not leave his pickup truck as he said he could not lock it. MORACE entered the truck and was shown a book or pamphlet which pictured automatic weapons for sale. GLOVER was overheard to say that he and KENNETH HEAD had already bought a Thompson .45 caliber sub-machine gun from this source. He said it had a part missing, but he and HEAD fixed it and now only needed a clip. He told MORACE to obtain one and MORACE said he would if he could use the gun for awhile.

GLOVER suggested that MORACE could steal a clip from the home of BUD SPINKS, Chief of Police, Vidalia, Louisiana, as SPINKS had two weapons and four clips at his home. GLOVER said he wanted MORACE to accompany him to obtain explosives which he and DON WILKENSON had buried in a cemetery near Natchez.

#### RACIAL SITUATION, FERRIDAY, LOUISIANA

R. J. GLOVER asked E. D. MORACE on September 1,

1969, if the Citizens for Constitutional Government was holding the weekly meeting that night. MORACE said that PAUL TOLBERT had called and did not have any literature to print as yet. Also J. B. TEMPLE had called and said that he had obtained some good literature at Mobile, Alabama, and wanted a meeting called for the night of September 4, 1969, to print the first newspaper.

There was a meeting of the Citizens for Quality Education at the REA Building, Ferriday, Louisiana, on the night of September 2, 1969, and there were about 300 people there. Dr. GERALD TROSCLAIR made a talk. Some members of the crowd urged a boycott of the schools, but TROSCLAIR said wait until after the state meeting of leaders at Alexandria, Louisiana, on September 6, 1969. TROSCLAIR called for a rally at the ball park in Ferriday, on Sunday afternoon September 7, 1969 at 2:30 PM.

After the meeting TROSCLAIR was observed to talk to E. D. MORACE. TROSCLAIR asked MORACE about .... meetings he had been holding and inquired if the "lan was involved. MORACE said his organization was the Constitutional Crusaders and was made up of former

klansmen. MORACE and TROSCLAIR agreed that to have 3 NW 5013 DocId:59161006 Page 86 the klan openly connected with the present organizations would not be good. TROSCLAIR asked MORACE to print some handbills announcing the rally on September 7, 1969, and to distribute them. MORACE said he would discuss it with his organization on the night of September 4, 1969, and if his organization agreed they would do it. TROSCLAIR furnished MORACE with a sample handbill to be printed, but source was not near enough to read the handbill.

Relet set out a lead for Jackson to submit an upto-date report and recommendations to the Bureau concerning the inclusion of subject on the Security Index as well as the Agitator Index. Since the date of relet, Jackson has submitted report but has not submitted recommendations as requested by re New Orleans letter. The Bureau desires that Jackson and New Orleans submit appropriate recommendations regarding captioned subject for his inclusion on the Agitator Index. The Bureau does not desire that a recommendation be made for Glover's inclusion on the Security Index.

Jackson promptly advise the Bureau and New Orleans, after which New Orleans should submit the requested recommendation for the Agitator Index.

# SILVER DOLLAR GROUP AND KLAN

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD and E. D. MORACE met at MORACE's residence at Ferriday, Louisiana, on the night of August 12, 1969. HEAD said he had been on vacation and MORACE said he was gone for three days the week before on a vacation trip to Houston, Texas. HEAD said he had talked to R. J. GLOVER and GLOVER told him that he had in fact obtained the Russian Machine Gun from where it was hidden at HEAD's house. HEAD said he told GLOVER the gun was no good and should be dumped in the lake before someone got into trouble with it. GLOVER answered that the gun had proved out many a good man and he would keep it to test his men.

HEAD said that it appears that GLOVER can have the newspaper printed for only the cost of the paper. As soon as J. B. TEMPLETON is well the group will get together and make further plans to start the newspaper.

HEAD furnished MORACE with about 1500 copies of "The White Sentite" and told him that a good man would come by and wich these copies up and distribute them in Concordia Parish.

On August 13, 1969, about 11:30 AM, FOUNT MC NEELY from the Black River-Monterey, Louisiana area contacted E. D. MORACE and stated he had been told he could obtain reading material from him. MORACE furnished him with the literature left by HEAD and MC NEELY said he would distribute it in the Monterey, Louisiana area. MC NEELY said he had talked to J. B. TEMPLETON about the newspaper they planned to print and he wanted to MORACE agreed to let MC NEELY know when the help. next meeting would be held. MC NEELY told MORACE not to telephone him, but to drive to his home and let MC NEELY said the newspaper could help to him know. reorganize the klan in the Monterey, Louisiana area.

#### MINUTEMEN

There has been no Minutemen activity in the Vidalia-Ferriday, Louisiana area in the past two weeks.

Source has no information about any Minutemen contacts in the New Orleans, Louisiana area. DON WILKENSON, Commander, Ferriday-Natchez unit of the Minutemen was once heard to say he thought there was once a unit of the Minutemen in New Orleans.

RACIAL SITUATION, FERRIDAY, LA. 2

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The opposition to school integration in the Ferriday, Louisiana area remains unorganized, except for political opposition. The Committee for Quality Education is active and will take part in a rally at Baton Rouge, Louisiana, at 2:00 PM, Saturday, August 16, 1969.

On August 13, 1969, Dr. GERALD B. TROSCLAIR, a physician at Ferriday, Louisiana, was observed to contact E. D. MORACE at the Ford Garage, Ferriday. TROSCLAIR was overheard to tell MORACE he needed some circulars put out that date and he had heard that MORACE had an organization that could do this. MORACE told TROSCLAIR he could get the circulars out, but not on TROSCLAIR was observed to give MORACE short notice. about 25 circulars and TROSCLAIR said he would hire some boys to put out the rest.

TROSCLAIR and MORACE talked of the rally in Baton Rouge, and MORACE said he had to work until noon and could not leave Ferriday, at 10:00 AM. MORACE and Dr. TROSCLAIR went to see the manager of the Fort Garage and when they returned said all employees of the garage would be released for the rally in Baton Rouge.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP AND MINUTEMEN

R. J. GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE at the Ford Garage, Ferriday, Louisiana, at bout 3:00 PM, on Thursday, July 17, 1969. GLOVER wanted to know if the copies of "The White Sentinel" he had left with MORACE and HEAD had been delivered. MORACE stated he had his copies rolled up ready for delivery and that they filled a large plastic garbage sack. He said they had not been delivered because of rain.

GLOVER asked MORACE to accompany him some evening to pick up explosives and MORACE agreed.

GLOVER exhibited some literature from Minutemen headquarters asking for contributions for the defense of ROBERT DE PUGH. For each ten cent or twenty-five cent contribution instructions would be sent from Minutemen headquarters as to how to make gunpowder or some kind of explosive. For a fifty cent contribution, Minutemen headquarters would furnish the address of where to order parts to convert a carbin into a automatic weapon.

GLOVER was upset over the CHARLES EVERS inauguration. He had been told by the son-in-law of NORMAN HEAD that a Negro group of "rangers" had been at the inauguration carring sawed-off shotguns and other weapons. HEAD's son-inlaw was a member of the auxiliary police in Natchez.

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GLOVER had read an account in the Natchez Newspaper of a speech made by a policeman about efforts to disrupt the EVERS inauguration, but did not feel this indicated a leak in his organization. GLOVER stated that he was told of the Natchez Police following him and talking of him on the police radio on the night of the inauguration. He said that two sisters or sisters-in-law of the former sheriff ODELL ANDERS have police radio receivers and one of them works at the time plant and told him.

EXENNETH NORMAN HEAD was visited by E. D. MORACE on the evening of July 22, 1969, after HEAD told MORACE he wanted to see him at that time. HEAD spoke of the Russian Machine Gum belonging to GLOVER. He said he had hidden the gum in the weeds behind his house and when he went to get it on July 21, 1969, it was gone. HEAD did not know if GLOVER got it from the hiding place or if someone found it.

About 8:45 PM, J. B. TEMPLETON, Vidalia, Louisiana, the former Eralted Cyclops of the klan in Vidalia, arrived

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at the HEAD residence. TEMPLETON said that they should start printing a newspaper against the Negroes and communists. TEMPLETON told MORACE to locate the old khan Mimeograph machine and some paper while he and HEAD would start finding some anti-communist literature to copy. It was agreed that the men would meet again at HEAD's residence on the night of July 27, 1969, and that each would bring two or more men. HEAD was to bring men from Ferriday, Louisiana, TEMPLETON would bring men from Vidalia, Louisiana, while MORACE would get two or more men from nearby Monterey, Louisiana, area.

R. J. GLOVER was observed to drive to the residence of KENNETH NORMAN HEAD on Lake Concordia, Ferriday, Louisiana, on the afternoon of July 15, 1969. GLOVER had a large amount of anti-Negro literature. This literature was a one page sheet called "The White Sentinel." It was similar to, but not identical to the one page sheet that GLOVER had distributed two weeks earlier. GLOVER said he had 15,000 copies of this literature and gave HEAD a large supply, probably 5,000 copies.

After GLOVER had been at the HEAD residence a short time E. D. MORACE was observed to arrive. GLOVER gave MORACE about 5,000 copies of the literature and suggested that both HEAD and MORACE distribute the sheets by rolling them up, placing a rubber band on them and throwing them out of a moving car. GLOVER said he had two other persons to see and left.

The one page literature was as follows:

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THE WHITE SENTINEL .

What is our condition today?...eIf we attempt to move forward we art literally chained to the body of a festering Black Death! The bureaucratic dictatorship of HEW has put all Anglo-Saxons under the heel of the Negro; and all our Southern States in his clutches. Our city, county and parish governments are debauched by his vote. His insolence threatens our womanhood, and our children are on the doorstep to the next to greatest loss the world has ever known. EXTERMINATION... Shall we allow Negro toughs to beat, cut and assault our children??? Shall ve longer tolerate Negro inspectors of white schools, and Negroes in charge of white institutions? Shall we longer tolerate the arrest of white women by Negro officers and their trial before Negro magistrates?

Let the manhood of the Aryan race with its four thousand years of authentic history answer that question! It is no longer a question of bad government. It is a question of impossible government. We lag behind the age dragging the decaying corpse to which we are chained. "WHO SHALL DELIVER US FROM THE BODY OF THIS DEATH?"

Hear me, men of my race, Norman and Celt, Angle and Saxon, Dane and Frank, Huguenot and German martyr blood! The hour has struck when we must rise in our might, break the chains that bind us to this corruption, strike down the Negro as a ruling poser, and restore to our children their birthright, which we received, a priceless legacy, from I believe in God's call to our race to do His work in our fathers! history. What other races failed to do, you wrought in this continental wilderness, fighting pestilence, hunger, cold, wild beasts, and savage hordes, until out of it all has grown the mightiest nation of "IS THE NEGRO WORTHY TO RULE OVER YOU?" Ask history. the carth. The African has held one fourth of this globe for 3000 years. He has never taken one step in progress or rescued one jungle from the ape and the adder, except as the slave of a superior race ....

The corruption of his presence in our body politic is beyond the power of reckoning. We drove the Carpet-bagger from our midst, but the Scalawag, our native product, is always with us to fatten on this corruption and breed death to society. The Carpet-bagger was a wolf, the Scalawag is a hyena. The one was a highwayman, the other a sneak...

Shall our future be Anglo-Saxon or Mulatto? That is the question before you. Nations are made by men, not by paper constitutions and paper ballots. We are not free because we have a Constitution. We have a Constitution because our ploneer fathers who cleared the wilderness and dared the might of kings, were freemen ... If you can make men out of paper, then it is possible with a scratch of a pen in the hand of a madman to transform by its magic a millon slaves into a million kings. We grant the Negro the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness if he can be happy without exercising kingship over the Anglo-Saxon race; or dragging us down to his level. But if he can not find happiness except in lording it over a superior race, let hin look for another world in which to rule. There is not room for both of us . . on this continent! It took Spain 800 years to expell the Moors. When the time comes the Anglo-Saxon can do in one century what the Spaniard did in eight. We have been congratulated on our selfrestraint under the awful provacation of the past hundred and four years. There is a limit beyond which we dare not go, for at this point, self-restraint becomes pusillanimous and means the loss of manhood ...

I ask you, my people freemen...to rise today and make good your right to live! The time for platitudes is past. Let us as men face the world and say what we mean.

"This is a white man's government, conceived by white men, and maintained by white men through every year of its history...and by the God of our Fathers it shall be ruled by white men until the Arch-angel shall call the end of time."

# SCHOOL INTEGRATION, CONCORDIA PARISH, LOUISIANA

Feelings are running high among the white people of Concordia Parish, Louisiana. Some persons have been heard to remark they will kill every Negro they see rather than accept the HEW plan for school integration.

Source inquired of E. D. MORACE, Squad Leader for Louisiana Minutemen Unit 1733, Ferriday, Louisiana -Natchez, Mississippi, about GEORGE MILO CLEVELAND and MYRON J. LANCON of the Morgan City, Louisiana area. MORACE said that these men are unknown to officers of Minutemen Unit 1733.

CHARLES EVERS INAUGURAL BALL NATCHEZ, MISSISSIPPI, 7/7/69

On Saturday morning, July 5, 1969, R. J. GLOVER, came by the Ford Garage, Ferriday, Louisiana, where E. D. MORACE was working. GLOVER was in a green Cadillac belonging to ______ and _____ was with him. While ______ went to a local store GLOVER and MORACE talked. GLOVER asked MORACE if he had the time bomb device built yet and MORACE said it would be ready by 5:00 P.M. GLOVER said he would contact MORACE at home later that day.

On the same day about 1:00 P.M., R. J. GLOVER and CHARLES D. SMITH of Natchez, Mississippi, arrived at the home of E. D. MORACE at Vidalia, Louisiana, in the 1953 blue-green colored Mercury, of SMITH. The three men went for a ride in the Mercury. They drove to Natchez,

Mississippi, and out the steam plant road which goes by the steam plant, an electric booster station to the home of SMITH and drove it in a little less than four minutes. They also drove the distance in SMITH's 1969 white Chevrolet. GLOVER said they could shoot the transformers on the station and black out all of Natchez, including the inaugural ball of CHARLES EVERS. Then they could hold up at SMITH's house for a few hours.

GLOVER mentioned that if this plan failed they could always go to near Ferriday, Louisiana, where the electric power line crosses the Mississippi River into Natchez. He said that one time these wires fell and all of Natchez, was without electric power. He noted that the wres cross the levee near the hunting camp of MORACE.

GLOVER needed a car to drive to Kentwood, Louisiana, and SMITH loaned him the 1953 Mercury. SMITH was later overheard to say that GLOVER left the car parked by Sears in Natchez, after it quit running and GLOVER had to get his step-son to drive him to Kentwood, Louisiana, where his wife was.

On July 7, 1969, about 8:45 A.M., R. J. GLOVER and CHARLES D. SMITH contacted E. D. MORACE at the Ford Garage in Natchez. They were in GLOVER's 1963 white colored Oldsmobile bearing Louisiana License Number 23 L 289. MORACE handed GLOVER the time bomb device and GLOVER placed it in the rear seat of his car and looked at it. The device was made from an old standard sized home alarm clock which had two small bells on the top and a small hanmer between the bells which caused the clock to alarm. MORACE had attached a six wolt battery to the clock. There were two wires running from the battery. One wire was attached to a bell on the clock and the other wire was attached to the hammer. Both wires extended on past the bell and hammer. MORACE said that all GLOVER had to do was attach the ends of the two wires to an electric blasting cap and when the clock started to alarm the current would reach the cap and set it off. MORACE Sald GLOVER would have to furnish the cap and dynamite. GLOVER said that 4,000 National Guardsmen were called to Natchez, and it would be hard to do anything.

About 5:45 P.M., on July 7, 1969, GLOVER picked MORACE up at his home in GLOVER's white Oldsmobile and they drove to Natchez, Mississippi. GLOVER stopped at the James Ammoco Station on the bypass and asked Mr. JAMES if he could find him four or five good men for that night. JAMES said it would take several hours. They then drove to the home of THOR TORGESON, but TORGESON was working that night. GLOVER said he would try TOMMIE JONES, but JONES would probably be too chicken.

MORACE and GLOVER were observed to enter Tiny Lewis Barbeque Place in Natchez, and stay for about one half hour. They then drove to the home of CHARLES D. SMITH and picked up SMITH.

SMITH said that three "Feds" had visited him that day and told him he better keep the peace. The three men drove by the booster station in Natchez, and talked of how they should have had a man in the woods behind the station. They saw many police cars and cars with what GLOVER said were "Feds". SMITH said the men he intended to get to help them that night were called on duty as National Guards and that every road was crawling with officers and National Guardsmen.

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ション さめ 行 きちょう SMITH said that it appeared that there were too many officers to try anything in Natchez, so they had better use the other plan and drive to the levee in Natchez. so they had better use the other plan and drive to the levee in Louisiana, and shoot the electric lines down. The men were afraid to carry guns in the car and GLOVER suggested they go to MORACE's home and get a rifle. MORACE said he knew the "Feds" would be watching there. They decided to go to the home of KENNETH NORMAN HEAD where GLOVER had two guns. They drove to HEAD's home on Lake Concordia near Ferriday, Louisiana, arriving there about 8:30 P.M. GLOVER got out and talked to HEAD, but returned to the car without any guns. GLOVER said he saw a car parked on the levee nearby so the "Feds" were watching there also. The threemen left and on the way away from HEAD's house met a car which was parked with a man and woman in it. GLOVER said these were "Feds" and there would be another car waiting when they reached the highway. Sure enough when they reached the Vidalia-Ferriday Highway

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7. ] 24 there was a car with a whip Antenna parked. GLOVER let MORACE off at his home and drove SMITH to his home in Natchez. GLOVER let SMITH off and said that he had to get ready to go to work on the Midnight shift. SMITH said he was on the night shift also. GLOVER said that at least they had given the "Feds" a scare.

Synopsis: RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER maintains a permanent residence at Kentwood, Louisiana, and lives at various places during the week at Natchez, Mississippi. He is employed by Armstrong Tire and Rubber Company, Natchez. GLOVER maintains membership with the Silver Dollar Group (SDG) and also in Unit 1733 of the Minutemen. <u>GLOVER HAS BEEN</u> <u>DESCRIBED AS OUALIFIED IN THE USE OF EXPLOSIVES AND</u>, THEREFORE, SHOULD BE CONSIDERED ARMED AND DANGEROUS.

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#### DETAILS:

#### BACKGROUND

#### A. Residence

Permanent address is maintained at Route 3, Kentwood, Louisiana. GLOVER maintains temporary residence during the weekdays at Natchez, Mississippi, but at no one particular place. At the present time, he is living at Oak and Rankin, Natchez, Mississippi.

#### B. Employment

Armstrong Tire and Rubber Company, Natchez, Mississippi.

#### C. Position in Klan

GLOVER is one of the organizers and is considered the leader of the Silver Dollar Group (SDG), a super Klanaction group operating in Vidalia - Ferriday, Louisiana, and Natchez, Mississippi.

#### D. Automobile

A 1960 four-door white Oldsmobile bearing 1968-69 Louisiana License 23L289. GLOVER has also been observed in a green 1964 Ford pickup.

#### E. Description

#### II. AFFILIATION WITH KLAN OR OTHER HATE-TYPE GROUPS

Married

On July 8, 1968, the subject was observed driving a 1960 white Oldsmobile bearing 1968-69 Louisiana License 23L289. He was also observed driving this automobile on June 10, 1969.

On March 14, 1968, JN T-3 advised that the burning of the Head Start Center at Roxie, Mississippi, may have been done by GLOVER. GLOVER and DON WILKINSON had driven to Roxie, Mississippi, in a borrowed pickup truck and the truck subsequently got stuck.

JN T-6 advised on March 18, 1968, that the subject and DON WILKINSON had contacted E. D. MORACE on March 14, 1968, to pull the pickup out of the mud where it was stuck near Roxie, Mississippi. GLOVER said that he and WILKINSON were on a mission when the truck got stuck but did not identify the mission.

On March 27, 1968, JN T-1 advised that although GLOVER is not a known member of the Minutemen, the present leader, JAMES SCAROBOROUGH, has been making regular contacts with GLOVER. GLOVER allegedly was told by SCAROBOROUGH that the Minutemen were in need of a Mimeograph machine and a typewriter.

On April 9, 1968, JN T-5 advised that the subject visited E. D. MORACE on April 2, 1968, and during the course of the conversation, said there were sure to be riots all summer and they must be ready to fight the Negroes.

On April 16, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had met the previous day and had discussed the Klan and the SDG. GLOVER furnished information regarding the Town Marshal at Kentwood, Louisiana, having trouble with a Negro recently who had shot at him. GLOVER also asked MORACE if he wanted to go to Meadville, Mississippi, while a certain Negro was in church and steal a .30-06 rifle from him.

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On April 24, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER met with eight other persons at Morgan's Restaurant in Natchez, Mississippi, for an informal gathering of Minutemen. GLOVER said he found a buyer for an air conditioner that he plans to steal.

On June 10, 1968, JN T-3 advised that GLOVER had contacted DONALD WILKINSON shortly after the racial disturbance in Natchez, Mississippi, on June 2, 1968, and told WILKINSON he wanted him to find out how often and at what times the freight trains traveled through Natchez. GLOVER mentioned that the train goes through the Negro section of Natchez where the riot recently occurred and then proceeds to Armstrong Tire and Rubber Company. GLOVER believes that he can ride the train through the Negro section, commit an act of violence, and get out without being seen. WILKINSON told GLOVER that he would assign JOHN BOSTIC and JAMES SWILLEY to check out the train and see if this could be done.

On June 25, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE discussed a plan to confuse local authorities in Natchez, Mississippi. GLOVER told MORACE to get nine to fifteen men together and have them purchase khaki uniforms, black ties, and black shoes and on Sunday, July 7, 1968, a private airplane would land at the airport in Natchez and a friend of GLOVER's in full uniform of a Nazi Lieutenant would get off the plane. MORACE's men would give the man in the Nazi uniform a salute and all the men would get into two cars. As they were driving away from the airport and before they reached the highway, they would stop and all the men would change clothes.

On July 16, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER was trying to sell 400 rounds of new .30-06 ammunition for \$12 a hundred rounds. GLOVER did not say where he got the ammunition except that he was trying to sell it for a friend. GLOVER further advised that the uniforms had not come in and that if they did not come in soon, they would go ahead with the project of having a man in a Nazi uniform land at the Natchez airport. Glover said that the SDG should carry out two other projects soon; one of these is the burglary of the house of a white man who has several rifles and the other is the burglary of the house of an un-named Negro.

On July 9, 1968, GLOVER said the plot concerning the uniforms would have to be postponed as the arm bands and caps had not arrived and he had re-ordered them.

On July 22, 1968, JN T-3 advised that GLOVER had contacted DON WILKINSON and E. D. MORACE and advised them that their plan to land an unidentified individual dressed in a Nazi uniform at the Natchez - Adams County Airport would have to be postponed inasmuch as the pilot who was to fly this man to Natchez was not available.

Further, GLOVER gave WILKINSON two pamphlets he had obtained from some Nazi and on July 6, 1968, GLOVER gave WILKINSON a silver dollar, making WILKINSON a member of the SDG.

On July 24, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had met in Natchez, Mississippi, and GLOVER said that they should hold a regular SDG meeting soon.

On August 13, 1968, JN T-2 advised that the majority of the individuals involved in the activities of Unit 1733 of the Minutemen have a very good opinion of GLOVER. He is being considered for membership in Unit 1733 and will probably be accepted.

On September 19, 1968, JN T-6 advised that DON WILKINSON, Network Commander of the Minutemen, Unit 1733, had stated that he wanted E. D. MORACE and RED GLOVER to be his Squad Leaders. WILKINSON told GLOVER on September 18, 1968, that he wanted him to handle an eight-man squad in Natchez and be in charge of searches and seizures.

On September 17, 1968, JN T-2 advised that GLOVER had been designated Officer in Charge of Searches and Seizures in Unit 1733 of the Minutemen under the leadership of DON WILKINSON. On September 24, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER had furnished DON WILKINSON his membership application for the Minutemen. He also furnished WILKINSON at that time a \$10 initiation fee.

On October 8, 1968, JN T-4 advised GLOVER still has misgivings regarding the Minutemen and did not fully trust DON WILKINSON but wanted to test WILKINSON soon by having him help move some explosives.

On October 15, 1968, JN T-6 advised that on October 11, 1968, RED GLOVER showed up at the residence of E. D. MORACE with a Russian-made burp gun, GPSH-1941, bearing Serial Number AL1514. The right side of the wooden stock had two crossed dueling pistols and the left side of the stock had a circle enclosing an arrowhead. GLOVER did not state where he obtained the firearm or what he planned to do with it. He left the gun with E. D. MORACE.

On October 28, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER had recently contacted DON WILKINSON and advised him that since he was in charge of the searches and seizures for the Minutemen, he would need at least one man to help him. WILKINSON advised GLOVER that he could have JAMES SWILLEY and GLOVER was satisfied. Although GLOVER was satisfied with the choice of SWILLEY, SWILLEY declined and later advised WILKINSON he did not want to work with GLOVER because he was afraid of him.

On October 25, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER had not recontacted DON WILKINSON regarding moving some dynamite and had returned to Kentwood, Louisiana, with his wife.

On October 29, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER asked E. D. MORACE if he still had the Russian burp gun, to which MORACE answered in the affirmative. GLOVER told MORACE that the Russian gun had been stolen "up the road," nodding his head toward Natchez, Mississippi.

On November 15, 1968, JN T-2 advised GLOVER had contacted DON WILKINSON three times during the first two weeks of November, stating that he wanted him to get two men from Unit 1733 of the Minutemen to move a machine gun he had hidden. GLOVER told WILKINSON they might have to

"fight the Feds" and that he should get two of his best men. GLOVER is still having problems with his wife and said that he wanted her to stay in Kentwood, Louisiana, and GLOVER is presently seeing of Vidalia, Louisiana.

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On November 20, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER refused to attend a Minutemen meeting at the Bar-B-Que Pit in Natchez, Mississippi, on November 19, 1968, since the FBI watches that location at all times.

On November 28, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER was in attendance at a meeting of Unit 1733 of the Minutemen on November 16, 1968, conducted at the Shamrock Motel, Vidalia, Louisiana. GLOVER is moving to Kentwood, Louisiana, and will probably be living at his present location for another 30 days. GLOVER will probably spend the weekends in Kentwood with his wife and the work week in Natchez, Mississippi, in a rooming house.

On December 11, 1968, JN T-5 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had discussed the Minutemen situation. GLOVER said that he now trusted the Network Commander, DON WILKINSON, because he had been tested and found to be all right. GLOVER exhibited a "come-along" and said it could be used to lift a safe and if a Minutemen or SDG member needs help financially, they could always burglarize the feed store south of Natchez and use the come-along to haul away the safe.

GLOVER was at the Bar-B-Que Pit on December 1, 1968, and was talking to ERNEST AVANTS and at that time, GLOVER asked AVANTS if he knew the name of the judge who had recently ruled against AVANTS and where he lived. He said most judges and lawyers own a plantation and he wondered how the judge would feel if his cattle ate nitrate of sodium and died. GLOVER said they would not take any action against the judge at that time but would wait and see. On December 11, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER had contacted E. D. MORACE at MORACE's home in Vidalia, Louisiana, and had picked up the Russian burp gun since he had heard that the FBI would be searching for guns. GLOVER said he was taking the gun to a safer place.

On December 23, 1968, JN T-6 advised that DON WILKINSON had helped the subject move his personal effects from Natchez, Mississippi, to Kentwood, Louisiana.

On January 6, 1969, JN T-2 advised that GLOVER had contacted DON WILKINSON regarding the keeping of a machine gun but had not left it with him as of yet.

On January 15, 1969, JN T-2 advised that GLOVER had met with DON WILKINSON and had furnished to him three coils of dynamite wire, which were immediately hidden in an isolated Negro cemetery off Highway 61 North. At that time, GLOVER also apparently had two carbines and several shotguns and rifles in the trunk of his car. GLOVER is presently active in Unit 1733 of the Minutemen.

On January 14, 1969, JN T-5 advised R. J. GLOVER had attended a meeting at the Bar-B-Que Pit, Natchez, Mississippi, with Minutemen Network Commander DON WILKINSON.

On January 7, 1969, GLOVER had met with E. D. MORACE and had furnished to MORACE two carbines and a cardboard box with a roll of dynamite wire in it.

On February 10, 1969, JN T-1 advised that DON WILKINSON had met with E. D. MORACE on February 7, 1969, and advised him that he had received orders from the National Minutemen Headquarters to detonate three mortarlike devices in the area to distribute Minutemen literature and commented that he had notified Minutemen headquarters that these orders would be carried out. GLOVER was to be in attendance at this meeting but was not present.

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WILKINSON had said that GLOVER would be responsible for obtaining the dynamite fuse and the black powder.

On February 9, 1969, JN T-2 advised that WILKINSON again contacted MORACE, at which time MORACE said he had been contacted by GLOVER and MORACE had briefed GLOVER of his responsibility regarding the project. GLOVER advised that he would obtain the powder and fuse as soon as possible.

On February 5, 1969, JN T-6 advised that R. J. GLOVER and KENNETH HEAD had discussed the Minutemen organization and at that time, GLOVER said he did not think WILKINSON, the Network Commander, had been accepted by Minutemen Headquarters. GLOVER exhibited a silver dollar and said there were enough men with silver dollars to get the job done and they did not really need the Minutemen. GLOVER discussed weapons available and said that he had two rifles with scopes hidden and was afraid they would rust. GLOVER also spoke of the Russian burp gun and said he was now testing another man, name unknown, by having this man keep the burp gun. GLOVER said there was a man at the mill who would trade a Thompson submachine gun for a pump shotgun and two carbines and GLOVER intended to trade for it.

On March 4, 1969, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER had been unable to obtain any black powder and since none was readily obtainable, he was reluctant to buy any.

On October 10, 1968, JN T-4 advised that SONNY TAYLOR recently saw R. J. GLOVER, SDG leader, at Natchez, Mississippi, on October 9, 1968, and spoke to him for a few minutes. At that time, TAYLOR was overheard to ask GLOVER about the Minutemen and GLOVER answered that he and E. D. MORACE were now Minutemen Squad Leaders and that MORACE was in charge of the Minutemen in Louisiana.

On January 21, 1969, JN T-5 advised that GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE at Ferriday, Louisiana, and had asked about the M-1 carbines he had left with him. GLOVER then went by on January 17, 1969, and picked up these two carbines.

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GLOVER told MORACE that the Minutemen Network Commander, DON WILKINSON, was quiting the Minutemen and folding up the unit. GLOVER said he figured WILKINSON would quit now that he had gotten his (GLOVER's) name on a Minutemen application. GLOVER said that if he and MORACE were arrested as a result of joining the Minutemen, he had men who would take care of WILKINSON. GLOVER then said that maybe WILKINSON was quiting because MORACE had brought pressure on him to take more action with the Minutemen and he was scared. Discussion was further held between GLOVER and MORACE as to whether to continue the Minutemen or to let the organization die but no decision was made.

GLOVER said that he wants about ten SDG members to get together soon.

On March 4, 1969, JN T-4 advised that E. D. MORACE and DON WILKINSON had met and MORACE had shown WILKINSON two rockets he had recently built. The purpose of these rockets is to shoot Minutemen material and WILKINSON wanted to know if the Mimeograph machine was available. MORACE said that the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan at Ferriday, Louisiana, had such a machine but it was probably in the possession of a WILLIAM GUTHRIE and MORACE did not want to ask for it.

WILKINSON produced five small cherry bombs and he and MORACE discussed whether or not the powder from those bombs would propel the rockets. WILKINSON told MORACE he wanted the two rockets shot on either the early morning or the night of March 10, 1969. He said he would handle one shooting at Natchez, Mississippi, and MORACE could handle the other at Vidalia, Louisiana, and RED GLOVER would be his partner.

On March 24, 1969, JN T-3 advised that DON WILKINSON, E. D. MORACE, and RED GLOVER had met on the levee at Vidalia, Louisiana, and tested the devices that MORACE had made to fire the Minutemen pamphlets. On March 10, 1969, WILKINSON and JEWEL LEE BURT had gone to the Natchez - Adams High School in order to set off the device but later set it off at the Morgantown Junior High School. E. D. MORACE set off his device at Vidalia, Louisiana, but RED GLOVER did not show up to assist.

On March 21, 1969, MORACE told WILKINSON that he has not seen GLOVER since the night of the testing approximately two weeks ago and also that he (MORACE) had fired the device on the courthouse lawn rather than at the school as he was instructed.

Unit 1733 of the Minutemen presently has as members the following individuals:

JEWEL LEE BURT EDWIN LAMAR LEWIS JOHN COLLINGER BOSTIC E. D. MORACE RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER C. B. TODD DONALD HOUSTON WILKINSON.

On April 8, 1969, JN T-6 advised that RED GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had gotten together and talked about the Minutemen Sidewalk Project #51 and GLOVER told MORACE he had been sick or he would have helped shoot the rocket. MORACE asked GLOVER how he felt about the Minutemen and GLOVER said he was disappointed. MORACE said the Minutemen organization was all they had left but GLOVER said they still had the SDG. He further stated he would like to have a weekly meeting of the SDG called. R. J. GLOVER advised MORACE that his wife has moved back to Natchez from Kentwood, Louisiana, and is now working in a drug store in downtown Natchez, Mississippi, on a part-time basis. He stated they still visit their old home place in Kentwood, Louisiana, on the weekends. On April 15, 1969, JN T-5 advised that GLOVER and MORACE had gone to Woodville and Centreville, Mississippi, to see an SDG member who had been shot and was in the hospital at Centreville. GLOVER left 38 sticks of ditching dynamite with E. D. MORACE, which MORACE later confided to a friend was, no doubt, the property of JEWEL LEE BURT.

On May 1, 1969, JN T-1 advised that DONALD WILKINSON was speaking to RED GLOVER and his wife the previous week and at that time, GLOVER told WILKINSON he is maintaining his permanent residence in Kentwood, Louisiana, due to a tax situation and this is the reason he is not living at any one place during the week in Natchez, Mississippi, and returns to Louisiana on the weekends.

On April 12, 1969, JN T-3 advised that GLOVER and JEWEL LEE BURT brought to the residence of DON WILKINSON fourteen sticks of dynamite marked ditching dynamite on the side. When they prepared to leave, GLOVER indicated he was returning to Kentwood, Louisiana. WILKINSON is considering the distribution of Minutemen material to local law enforcement officers as well as local citizens.

On April 15, 1969, DON WILKINSON contacted JEWEL LEE BURT and advised him he was going to move the dynamite to the Slay Cemetery where the **primer** cord is buried but BURT did not show up to assist.

On May 3, 1969, DON WILKINSON and E. D. MORACE were discussing the school situation in Concordia Parish, Louisiana, and WILKINSON told MORACE that the Minutemen would assist in any way the Klan in Concordia Parish wanted them to.

On May 13, 1969, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER told E. D. MORACE that in case anything happened to him he could go to his girl friend, who had two fast-talking guns, and would furnish them to anyone who exhibited a silver dollar to her.

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On June 10, 1969, a 1964 white Oldsmobile, bearing Louisiana License 23L289, was observed at Oak and Rankin, Natchez, Mississippi.

On June 18, 1969, JN T-6 advised that SDG members had distributed Minutemen literature.

The "Minutemen" was organized in June, 1960. Its present headquarters are Norborne, Missouri. Robert B. DePugh, Norborne, Missouri, has been publicly identified as the founder and National Coordinator of the organization since its inception. Membership of the "Minutemen" is claimed by DePugh to be in excess of 35,000 members; however, confidential sources state this figure is greatly exaggerated and that a more true estimate would be between 500 to 1,000 members. Statements by DePugh and literature distributed bythe organization indicate its purpose to be the resistance to, and exposure of, the spread of Communist influence within the United States; for the formation of a guerrilla or underground organization to combat the troops of any foreign powers which might eventually occupy this country; to resist passage of laws which would regulate private ownership of firearms.

In April, 1966, DePugh stated the "Minutemen" organization was then dividing itself into two bodies: one group to be members who have been able to maintain their identity in complete secrecy from the public and government investigative agencies, and the other group to be made up of members who have been publicly identified and who will become active in the Patriotic Party. National conventions of the Patriotic Party were held in July, 1966, at Kansas City, Missouri, and July, 1967, at Kansas City, Kansas.

Members of the "Minutemen" organization, including Robert B. DePugh and his close associate, Walter P. Peyson, have been arrested in the past on charges of violation of the Federal Firearms Act, Bank Robbert - Conspiracy, Illegal

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A source advised on October 25, 1963, that an organization known as the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan (OKKKK) had been organized in the State of Louisiana at Shreveport, Louisiana, in December of 1960.

A second source advised on August 12, 1966, that the OKKKK continues to be active within the State of Louisiana, and that the aims and purposes of this organization continue to be to promote Americanism, the supremacy of the white race, and the furtherance of segregation between the races.

#### APPENDIX

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP

A source on April 4, 1967, and a second source on May 3, 1967, characterized the Silver Dollar Group as a hard-core action group made up of present and former members of the White Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi (WKKKKOM); the United Klans of America, Inc. (UKA); and Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi and Louisiana.

On August 15, 1967, a third source advised that the Silver Dollar Group was formed approximately in May or June, 1964. The secret group within the Klan was formed to further Klan activities involving the promotion of Americanism, white supremacy, and maintaining total segregation. Klansmen were dissatisfied with the inactivity in their respective Klan groups. The members of the new secret action unit had to be trusted Klansmen and had to vouch for each other.

No formal organization format has been adopted but group membership is obtained by invitation only and upon receipt of a silver dollar coin from the group organizer Raleigh Jackson Glover.

#### APPENDIX

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#### UNITED KLANS OF AMERICA, INC., KNIGHTS OF THE KU KLUX KLAN (UKA)

Records of Superior Court of Fulton County, Georgia, reflect that this Klan organization was granted a corporate charter on February 21, 1961, at Atlanta, Georgia, under the name United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of America, Inc.

A source advised on February 27, 1961, that United Klans was formed as a result of a split in the U. S. Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc. According to the source, the split resulted from a leadership dispute and United Klans has the same aims and objectives as the parent group. These are the promotion of Americanism, white supremacy, and segregation of the races.

The first source and a second source advised in July, 1961, that United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of America, Inc., merged with Alabama Knights, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. The merged organization established headquarters in Suite 401, Alston Building, Tuscaloosa, Alabama. (The organization is directed by ROBERT SHELTON, Imperial Wizard, and is the dominant Klan group in the South, with Units in several Southern states.)

Second source advised that at a meeting in Prattville, Alabama, on October 22, 1961, the U. S. Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, merged with the United Klans of America, Inc., Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Third source advised on May 25, 1966, that the UKA is currently an active organization, with Klaverns in several states. This source said that ROBERT M. SHELTON is the Imperial Wizard of this organization and was elected to this position on September 5, 1964, at a National Klonvocation in Birmingham, Alabama. Source stated that during April, 1966, the National office was moved from Suite 401, Alston Building, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, to the carport of SHELTON's residence, #18 Lake Sherwood, Star Route, Northport, Alabama, which space he had converted into a room.

#### WHITE KNIGHTS OF THE KU KLUX KLAN OF MISSISSIPPI (WKKKKOM)

A source advised that on February 15, 1964, approximately 200 members of the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan from the State of Mississippi met at Brookhaven, Mississippi. Those present decided to defect from the Original Knights and to form their own Klan group in Mississippi to be known as the White Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi.

This source advised that the aims and purposes of the WKKKKOM are to preserve Christian civilization, protect and promote white supremacy and the segregation of the races, to fight Communism and to extend the dignity, heritage, and rights of the white race of America.

This source advised on May 12, 1969, that the WKKKKOM is an unincorporated, secret organization existing in the State of Mississippi and formed for the purpose of preserving white supremacy regardless of the cost and including the use of force and violence. The WKKKKOM is controlled by the Imperial Wizard and state officers. The state is divided into districts and provinces. There is an estimated membership as of May 12, 1969, of 100 members of this organization. The aims and purposes of the organization continue to be the same as when the organization was created in February, 1964. L. E. Matthews, Jr., of Florence, Mississippi, was elected February 11, 1968, at a state meeting to succeed Sam Holloway Bowers, Jr., as Imperial Wizard.

Permanent address is maintained at Route 3, Kentwood, Louisiana. GLOVER maintains temporary residence during the weekdays at Natchez, Mississippi, but at no one particular place. At the present time, he is living at Oak and Rankin, Natchez, Mississippi.

#### C. Position in Klan

GLOVER is one of the organizers and is considered the leader of the Silver Dollar Group (SDG), a super Klanaction group operating in Vidalia - Ferriday, Louisiana, and Natchez, Mississippi.

A 1960 four-door white Oldsmobile bearing 1968-69 Louisiana License 23L289. GLOVER has also been observed in a green 1964 Ford pickup.

#### II. AFFILIATION WITH KLAN OR OTHER HATE-TYPE GROUPS

On July 8, 1968, the subject was observed driving a 1960 white Oldsmobile bearing 1968-69 Louisiana License 23L289. He was also observed driving this automobile on June 10, 1969.

On March 14, 1968, JN T-3 advised that the burning of the Head Start Center at Roxie, Mississippi, may have been done by GLOVER. GLOVER and DON WILKINSON had driven to Roxie, Mississippi, in a borrowed pickup truck and the truck subsequently got stuck.

JN T-6 advised on March 18, 1968, that the subject and DON WILKINSON had contacted E. D. MORACE on March 14, 1968, to pull the pickup out of the mud where it was stuck near Roxie, Mississippi. GLOVER said that he and WILKINSON were on a mission when the truck got stuck but did not identify the mission.

On March 27, 1968, JN T-1 advised that although GLOVER is not a known member of the Minutemen, the present leader, JAMES SCAROBOROUGH, has been making regular contacts with GLOVER. GLOVER allegedly was told by SCAROBOROUGH that the Minutemen were in need of a Mimeograph machine and a typewriter.

On April 9, 1968, JN T-5 advised that the subject visited E. D. MORACE on April 2, 1968, and during the course of the conversation, said there were sure to be riots all summer and they must be ready to fight the Negroes.

On April 16, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had met the previous day and had discussed the Klan and the SDG. GLOVER furnished information regarding the Town Marshal at Kentwood, Louisiana, having trouble with a Negro recently who had shot at him. GLOVER also asked MORACE if he wanted to go to Meadville, Mississippi, while a certain Negro was in church and steal a .30-06 rifle from him.

On April 24, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER met with eight other persons at Morgan's Restaurant in Natchez, Mississippi, for an informal gathering of Minutemen. GLOVER said he found a buyer for an air conditioner that he plans to steal.

On June 10, 1968, JN T-3 advised that GLOVER had contacted DONALD WILKINSON shortly after the racial disturbance in Natchez, Mississippi, on June 2, 1968, and told WILKINSON he wanted him to find out how often and at what times the freight trains traveled through Natchez. GLOVER

mentioned that the train goes through the Negro section of Natchez where the riot recently occurred and then proceeds to Armstrong Tire and Rubber Company. GLOVER believes that he can ride the train through the Negro section, commit an act of violence, and get out without being seen. WILKINSON told GLOVER that he would assign JOHN BOSTIC and JAMES SWILLEY to check out the train and see if this could be done.

On June 25, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE discussed a plan to confuse local authorities in Natchez, Mississippi. GLOVER told MORACE to get nine to fifteen men together and have them purchase khaki uniforms, black ties, and black shoes and on Sunday, July 7, 1968, a private airplane would land at the airport in Natchez and a friend of GLOVER's in full uniform of a Nazi Lieutenant would get off the plane. MORACE's men would give the man in the Nazi uniform a salute and all the men would get into two cars. As they were driving away from the airport and before they reached the highway, they would stop and all the men would change clothes.

On July 16, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER was trying to sell 400 rounds of new .30-06 ammunition for \$12 a hundred rounds. GLOVER did not say where he got the ammunition except that he was trying to sell it for a friend. GLOVER further advised that the uniforms had not come in and that if they did not come in soon, they would go ahead with the project of having a man in a Nazi uniform land at the Natchez airport. Glover said that the SDG should carry out two other projects soon; one of these is the burglary of the house of a white man who has several rifles and the other is the burglary of the house of an un-named Negro.

On July 9, 1968, GLOVER said the plot concerning the uniforms would have to be postponed as the arm bands and caps had not arrived and he had re-ordered them.

On July 22, 1968, JN T-3 advised that GLOVER had contacted DON WILKINSON and E. D. MORACE and advised them that their plan to land an unidentified individual dressed in a Nazi uniform at the Natchez - Adams County Airport would have to be postponed inasmuch as the pilot who was to fly this man to Natchez was not available.

Further, GLOVER gave WILKINSON two pamphlets he had obtained from some Nazi and on July 6, 1968, GLOVER gave WILKINSON a silver dollar, making WILKINSON a member of the SDG.

On July 24, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had met in Natchez, Mississippi, and GLOVER said that they should hold a regular SDG meeting soon.

On August 13, 1968, JN T-2 advised that the majority of the individuals involved in the activities of Unit 1733 of the Minutemen have a very good opinion of GLOVER. He is being considered for membership in Unit 1733 and will probably be accepted.

On September 19, 1968, JN T-6 advised that DON WILKINSON, Network Commander of the Minutemen, Unit 1733, had stated that he wanted E. D. MORACE and RED GLOVER to be his Squad Leaders. WILKINSON told GLOVER on September 18, 1968, that he wanted him to handle an eight-man squad in Natchez and be in charge of searches and seizures.

On September 17, 1968, JN T-2 advised that GLOVER had been designated Officer in Charge of Searches and Seizures in Unit 1733 of the Minutemen under the leadership of DON WILKINSON. On September 24, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER had furnished DON WILKINSON his membership application for the Minutemen. He also furnished WILKINSON at that time a \$10 initiation fee.

On October 8, 1968, JN T-4 advised GLOVER still has misgivings regarding the Minutemen and did not fully trust DON WILKINSON but wanted to test WILKINSON soon by having him help move some explosives.

On October 15, 1968, JN T-6 advised that on October 11, 1968, RED GLOVER showed up at the residence of E. D. MORACE with a Russian-made burp gun, GPSH-1941, bearing Serial Number AL1514. The right side of the wooden stock had two crossed dueling pistols and the left side of the stock had a circle enclosing an arrowhead. GLOVER did not state where he obtained the firearm or what he planned to do with it. He left the gun with E. D. MORACE.

On October 28, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER had recently contacted DON WILKINSON and advised him that since he was in charge of the searches and seizures for the Minutemen, he would need at least one man to help him. WILKINSON advised GLOVER that he could have JAMES SWILLEY and GLOVER was satisfied. Although GLOVER was satisfied with the choice of SWILLEY, SWILLEY declined and later advised WILKINSON he did not want to work with GLOVER because he was afraid of him.

On October 25, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER had not recontacted DON WILKINSON regarding moving some dynamite and had returned to Kentwood, Louisiana, with his wife.

On October 29, 1968, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER asked E. D. MORACE if he still had the Russian burp gun, to which MORACE answered in the affirmative. GLOVER told MORACE that the Russian gun had been stolen "up the road," nodding his head toward Natchez, Mississippi.

On November 15, 1968, JN T-2 advised GLOVER had contacted DON WILKINSON three times during the first two weeks of November, stating that he wanted him to get two men from Unit 1733 of the Minutemen to move a machine gun he had hidden. GLOVER told WILKINSON they might have to

"fight the Feds" and that he should get two of his best men. GLOVER is still having problems with his wife and said that he wanted her to stav in Kentwood, Louisiana, and GLOVER is presently seeing of Vidalia, Louisiana.

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On November 20, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER refused to attend a Minutemen meeting at the Bar-B-Que Pit in Natchez, Mississippi, on November 19, 1968, since the FBI watches that location at all times.

On November 28, 1968, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER was in attendance at a meeting of Unit 1733 of the Minutemen on November 16, 1968, conducted at the Shamrock Motel, Vidalia, Louisiana. GLOVER is moving to Kentwood, Louisiana, and will probably be living at his present location for another 30 days. GLOVER will probably spend the weekends in Kentwood with his wife and the work week in Natchez, Mississippi, in a rooming house.

On December 11, 1968, JN T-5 advised that GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had discussed the Minutemen situation. GLOVER said that he now trusted the Network Commander, DON WILKINSON, because he had been tested and found to be all right. GLOVER exhibited a "come-along" and said it could be used to lift a safe and if a Minutemen or SDG member needs help financially, they could always burglarize the feed store south of Natchez and use the come-along to haul away the safe.

GLOVER was at the Bar-B-Que Pit on December 1, 1968, and was talking to ERNEST AVANTS and at that time, GLOVER asked AVANTS if he knew the name of the judge who had recently ruled against AVANTS and where he lived. He said most judges and lawyers own a plantation and he wondered how the judge would feel if his cattle ate nitrate of sodium and died. GLOVER said they would not take any action against the judge at that time but would wait and see.

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On December 11, 1968, JN T-6 advised that GLOVER had contacted E. D. MORACE at MORACE's home in Vidalia, Louisiana, and had picked up the Russian burp gun since he had heard that the FBI would be searching for guns. GLOVER said he was taking the gun to a safer place.

On December 23, 1968, JN T-6 advised that DON WILKINSON had helped the subject move his personal effects from Natchez, Mississippi, to Kentwood, Louisiana.

On January 6, 1969, JN T-2 advised that GLOVER had contacted DON WILKINSON regarding the keeping of a machine gun but had not left it with him as of yet.

On January 15, 1969, JN T-2 advised that GLOVER had met with DON WILKINSON and had furnished to him three coils of dynamite wire, which were immediately hidden in an isolated Negro cemetery off Highway 61 North. At that time, GLOVER also apparently had two carbines and several shotguns and rifles in the trunk of his car. GLOVER is presently active in Unit 1733 of the Minutemen.

On January 14, 1969, JN T-5 advised R. J. GLOVER had attended a meeting at the Bar-B-Que Pit, Natchez, Mississippi, with Minutemen Network Commander DON WILKINSON.

On January 7, 1969, GLOVER had met with E. D. MORACE and had furnished to MORACE two carbines and a cardboard box with a roll of dynamite wire in it.

On February 10, 1969, JN T-1 advised that DON WILKINSON had met with E. D. MORACE on February 7, 1969, and advised him that he had received orders from the National Minutemen Headquarters to detonate three mortarlike devices in the area to distribute Minutemen literature and commented that he had notified Minutemen headquarters that these orders would be carried out. GLOVER was to be in attendance at this meeting but was not present.

WILKINSON had said that GLOVER would be responsible for obtaining the dynamite fuse and the black powder.

On February 9, 1969, JN T-2 advised that WILKINSON again contacted MORACE, at which time MORACE said he had been contacted by GLOVER and MORACE had briefed GLOVER of his responsibility regarding the project. GLOVER advised that he would obtain the powder and fuse as soon as possible.

On February 5, 1969, JN T-6 advised that R. J. GLOVER and KENNETH HEAD had discussed the Minutemen organization and at that time, GLOVER said he did not think WILKINSON, the Network Commander, had been accepted by Minutemen Headquarters. GLOVER exhibited a silver dollar and said there were enough men with silver dollars to get the job done and they did not really need the Minutemen. GLOVER discussed weapons available and said that he had two rifles with scopes hidden and was afraid they would rust. GLOVER also spoke of the Russian burp gun and said he was now testing another man, name unknown, by having this man keep the burp gun. GLOVER said there was a man at the mill who would trade a Thompson submachine gun for a pump shotgun and two carbines and GLOVER intended to trade for it.

On March 4, 1969, JN T-1 advised that GLOVER had been unable to obtain any black powder and since none was readily obtainable, he was reluctant to buy any.

On October 10, 1968, JN T-4 advised that SONNY TAYLOR recently saw R. J. GLOVER, SDG leader, at Natchez, Mississippi, on October 9, 1968, and spoke to him for a few minutes. At that time, TAYLOR was overheard to ask GLOVER about the Minutemen and GLOVER answered that he and E. D. MORACE were now Minutemen Squad Leaders and that MORACE was in charge of the Minutemen in Louisiana.

On January 21, 1969, JN T-5 advised that GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE at Ferriday, Louisiana, and had asked about the M-1 carbines he had left with him. GLOVER then went by on January 17, 1969, and picked up these two carbines.

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#### JN 157-2444

GLOVER told MORACE that the Minutemen Network Commander, DON WILKINSON, was quiting the Minutemen and folding up the unit. GLOVER said he figured WILKINSON would quit now that he had gotten his (GLOVER's) name on a Minutemen application. GLOVER said that if he and MORACE were arrested as a result of joining the Minutemen, he had men who would take care of WILKINSON. GLOVER then said that maybe WILKINSON was quiting because MORACE had brought pressure on him to take more action with the Minutemen and he was scared. Discussion was further held between GLOVER and MORACE as to whether to continue the Minutemen or to let the organization die but no decision was made.

GLOVER said that he wants about ten SDG members to get together soon.

On March 4, 1969, JN T-4 advised that E. D. MORACE and DON WILKINSON had met and MORACE had shown WILKINSON two rockets he had recently built. The purpose of these rockets is to shoot Minutemen material and WILKINSON wanted to know if the Mimeograph machine was available. MORACE said that the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan at Ferriday, Louisiana, had such a machine but it was probably in the possession of a WILLIAM GUTHRIE and MORACE did not want to ask for it.

WILKINSON produced five small cherry bombs and he and MORACE discussed whether or not the powder from those bombs would propel the rockets. WILKINSON told MORACE he wanted the two rockets shot on either the early morning or the night of March 10, 1969. He said he would handle one shooting at Natchez, Mississippi, and MORACE could handle the other at Vidalia, Louisiana, and RED GLOVER would be his partner.

On March 24, 1969, JN T-3 advised that DON WILKINSON, E. D. MORACE, and RED GLOVER had met on the levee at Vidalia, Louisiana, and tested the devices that MORACE had made to fire the Minutemen pamphlets.

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On March 10, 1969, WILKINSON and JEWEL LEE BURT had gone to the Natchez - Adams High School in order to set off the device but later set it off at the Morgantown Junior High School. E. D. MORACE set off his device at Vidalia, Louisiana, but RED GLOVER did not show up to assist.

On March 21, 1969, MORACE told WILKINSON that he has not seen GLOVER since the night of the testing approximately two weeks ago and also that he (MORACE) had fired the device on the courthouse lawn rather than at the school as he was instructed.

Unit 1733 of the Minutemen presently has as members the following individuals:

JEWEL LEE BURT EDWIN LAMAR LEWIS JOHN COLLINGER BOSTIC E. D. MORACE RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER C. B. TODD DONALD HOUSTON WILKINSON.

On April 8, 1969, JN T-6 advised that RED GLOVER and E. D. MORACE had gotten together and talked about the Minutemen Sidewalk Project #51 and GLOVER told MORACE he had been sick or he would have helped shoot the rocket. MORACE asked GLOVER how he felt about the Minutemen and GLOVER said he was disappointed. MORACE said the Minutemen organization was all they had left but GLOVER said they still had the SDG. He further stated he would like to have a weekly meeting of the SDG called. R. J. GLOVER advised MORACE that his wife has moved back to Natchez from Kentwood, Louisiana, and is now working in a drug store in downtown Natchez, Mississippi, on a part-time basis. He stated they still visit their old home place in Kentwood, Louisiana, on the weekends.

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On April 15, 1969, JN T-5 advised that GLOVER and MORACE had gone to Woodville and Centreville, Mississippi, to see an SDG member who had been shot and was in the hospital at Centreville. GLOVER left 38 sticks of ditching dynamite with E. D. MORACE, which MORACE later confided to a friend was, no doubt, the property of JEWEL LEE BURT.

On May 1, 1969, JN T-1 advised that DONALD WILKINSON was speaking to RED GLOVER and his wife the previous week and at that time, GLOVER told WILKINSON he is maintaining his permanent residence in Kentwood, Louisiana, due to a tax situation and this is the reason he is not living at any one place during the week in Natchez, Mississippi, and returns to Louisiana on the weekends.

On April 12, 1969, JN T-3 advised that GLOVER and JEWEL LEE BURT brought to the residence of DON WILKINSON fourteen sticks of dynamite marked ditching dynamite on the side. When they prepared to leave, GLOVER indicated he was returning to Kentwood, Louisiana. WILKINSON is considering the distribution of Minutemen material to local law enforcement officers as well as local citizens.

On April 15, 1969, DON WILKINSON contacted JEWEL LEE BURT and advised him he was going to move the dynamite to the Slay Cemetery where the primer cord is buried but BURT did not show up to assist.

On May 3, 1969, DON WILKINSON and E. D. MORACE were discussing the school situation in Concordia Parish, Louisiana, and WILKINSON told MORACE that the Minutemen would assist in any way the Klan in Concordia Parish wanted them to.

On May 13, 1969, JN T-4 advised that GLOVER told E. D. MORACE that in case anything happened to him he could go to his girl friend, who had two fast-talking guns, and would furnish them to anyone who exhibited a silver dollar to her.

On June 10, 1969, a 1964 white Oldsmobile, bearing Louisiana License 23L289, was observed at Oak and Rankin, Natchez, Mississippi.

On June 18, 1969, JN T-6 advised that SDG members had distributed Minutemen literature.

### "MINUTEMEN"

APPENDIX

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The "Minutemen" was organized in June, 1960. Its present headquarters are Norborne, Missouri. Robert B. DePugh, Norborne, Missouri, has been publicly identified as the founder and National Coordinator of the organization since its inception. Membership of the "Minutemen" is claimed by DePugh to be in excess of 35,000 members; however, confidential sources state this figure is greatly exaggerated and that a more true estimate would be between 500 to 1,000 members. Statements by DePugh and literature distributed bythe organization indicate its purpose to be the resistance to, and exposure of, the spread of Communist influence within the United States; for the formation of a guerrilla or underground organization to combat the troops of any foreign powers which might eventually occupy this country; to resist passage of laws which would regulate private ownership of firearms.

In April, 1966, DePugh stated the "Minutemen" organization was then dividing itself into two bodies: one group to be members who have been able to maintain their identity in complete secrecy from the public and government investigative agencies, and the other group to be made up of members who have been publicly identified and who will become active in the Patriotic Party. National conventions of the Patriotic Party were held in July, 1966, at Kansas City, Missouri, and July, 1967, at Kansas City, Kansas.

Members of the "Minutemen" organization, including Robert B. DePugh and his close associate, Walter P. Peyson, have been arrested in the past on charges of violation of the Federal Firearms Act, Bank Robbert - Conspiracy, Illegal

Possession of Firearms and Conspiracy to Commit Arson. They have also engaged in maneuvers utilizing guerrilla tactics wherein machine guns, mortars, grenades, and other firearms were employed.

# ORIGINAL KNIGHTS OF THE KU KLUX KLAN (LOUISIANA) (OKKKK)

A source advised on October 25, 1963, that an organization known as the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan (OKKKK) had been organized in the State of Louisiana at Shreveport, Louisiana, in December of 1960.

A second source advised on August 12, 1966, that the OKKKK continues to be active within the State of Louisiana, and that the aims and purposes of this organization continue to be to promote Americanism, the supremacy of the white race, and the furtherance of segregation between the races.

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### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP

A source on April 4, 1967, and a second source on May 3, 1967, characterized the Silver Dollar Group as a hard-core action group made up of present and former members of the White Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi (WKKKKOM); the United Klans of America, Inc. (UKA); and Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi and Louisiana.

On August 15, 1967, a third source advised that the Silver Dollar Group was formed approximately in May or June, 1964. The secret group within the Klan was formed to further Klan activities involving the promotion of Americanism, white supremacy, and maintaining total segregation. Klansmen were dissatisfied with the inactivity in their respective Klan groups. The members of the new secret action unit had to be trusted Klansmen and had to vouch for each other.

No formal organization format has been adopted but group membership is obtained by invitation only and upon receipt of a silver dollar coin from the group organizer Raleigh Jackson Glover.

# APPENDIX

# UNITED KLANS OF AMERICA, INC., KNIGHTS OF THE KU_KLUX KLAN (UKA)

Records of Superior Court of Fulton County, Georgia, reflect that this Klan organization was granted a corporate charter on February 21, 1961, at Atlanta, Georgia, under the name United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of America, Inc.

A source advised on February 27, 1961, that United Klans was formed as a result of a split in the U. S. Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Inc. According to the source, the split resulted from a leadership dispute and United Klans has the same aims and objectives as the parent group. These are the promotion of Americanism, white supremacy, and segregation of the races.

The first source and a second source advised in July, 1961, that United Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of America, Inc., merged with Alabama Knights, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan. The merged organization established headquarters in Suite 401, Alston Building, Tuscaloosa, Alabama. (The organization is directed by ROBERT SHELTON, Imperial Wizard, and is the dominant Klan group in the South, with Units in several Southern states.)

Second source advised that at a meeting in Prattville, Alabama, on October 22, 1961, the U. S. Klans, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, merged with the United Klans of America, Inc., Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Third source advised on May 25, 1966, that the UKA is currently an active organization, with Klaverns in several states. This source said that ROBERT M. SHELTON is the Imperial Wizard of this organization and was elected to this position on September 5, 1964, at a National Klonvocation in Birmingham, Alabama. Source stated that during April, 1966, the National office was moved from Suite 401, Alston Building, Tuscaloosa, Alabama, to the carport of SHELTON's residence, #18 Lake Sherwood, Star Route, Northport, Alabama, which space he had converted into a room.

#### APPENDIX

# WHITE KNIGHTS OF THE KU KLUX KLAN OF MISSISSIPPI (WKKKKOM)

A source advised that on February 15, 1964, approximately 200 members of the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan from the State of Mississippi met at Brookhaven, Mississippi. Those present decided to defect from the Original Knights and to form their own Klan group in Mississippi to be known as the White Knights of the Ku Klux Klan of Mississippi.

This source advised that the aims and purposes of the WKKKKOM are to preserve Christian civilization, protect and promote white supremacy and the segregation of the races, to fight Communism and to extend the dignity, heritage, and rights of the white race of America.

This source advised on May 12, 1969, that the WKKKKOM is an unincorporated, secret organization existing in the State of Mississippi and formed for the purpose of preserving white supremacy regardless of the cost and including the use of force and violence. The WKKKKOM is controlled by the Imperial Wizard and state officers. The state is divided into districts and provinces. There is an estimated membership as of May 12, 1969, of 100 members of this organization. The aims and purposes of the organization continue to be the same as when the organization was created in February, 1964. L. E. Matthews, Jr., of Florence, Mississippi, was elected February 11, 1968, at a state meeting to succeed Sam Holloway Bowers, Jr., as Imperial Wizard.

#### CHARLES EVERS INAUGURAL BALL

On Thursday, 6/26/69, about 1:00 PM, R. J. GLOVER of Natchez, Miss., contacted E. D. MORACE of Vidalia, La., at the Ford Garage, Ferriday, La. The two men were observed to have lunch together at Brocado's Cafe. GLOVER told MORACE that the two plans previously discussed to disrupt the inaugural ball of CHARLES EVERS at Natchez, Miss., on 7/7/69, had been discarded. These plans were to pour gasoline in the storm drainage ditch near the City Auditorium and to string primacord on the sidewalk and set it off.

GLOVER said he had decided on the following action:

1) Have two men to pour five gallons of gasoline each on the two bridges across St. Catherine Creek on U. S. Highway 61, North, and U. S. Highway 61, South, in Natchez, and light fires during the ball. This would not cause much damage, but would be something for the Negroes to remember.

2) Have someone with a rifle shoot out the transformer which furnished electric power to the City Auditorium in Natchez, during the ball. GLOVER does not know where the transformer is located and this action is a thought rather than a plan.

3) Build a time bomb with two or three sticks of dynamite and an old alarm clock and set it off about two blocks west of the City Auditorium on the bluff where there are no houses or people.

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GLOVER stated he had the men to do the gasoline job, but he and MORACE would have to set the time bomb. GLOVER said he would be on vacation until 7/6/69, and would work on 7/6/69 and 7/7/69, from 10:00 PM to 7:00 AM.

On Saturday, 6/28/69, R. J. GLOVER and E. D.MORACE went to the residence of KENNETH NORMAN HEAD on Lake Concordia, near Ferriday, La. GLOVER told HEAD about the time bomb he needed and asked how to rig a blasting cap, alarm clock and dynamite. HEAD explained how to build the bomb, but GLOVER could not understand it. HEAD told GLOVER to come over some evening and they would build one and test it on the river levee. On the way back to MORACE's house, GLOVER instructed MORACE to obtain an old alarm clock, not to buy a new one as it might be traced, and to build a time bomb. MORACE said he could build the bomb, but he was not an explosives expert and was afraid of dynamite.

GLOVER told MORACE he would be in Kentwood, La., on vacation for several days, but would recontact MORACE by 7/7/69.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP & MINUTEMEN

On 6/28/69, E. D. MORACE and R. J. GLOVER went to the home of JAMES SCAROBROUGH in Ferriday, La. SAMMY BUTLER, a former klansman, was there, but was to one side during the conversation. GLOVER asked SCAROBROUGH if he still had the item he sent to him, indicating that it was the Russian Burp gun. SCAROBROUGH said he had the item, but had not been able

to get it to function properly. GLOVER asked if SCAROBROUGH still had his fast-talking weapon, meaning his automatic carbine, and SCAROBROUGH said he did. GLOVER told him to pass both of these on to a friend. GLOVER said this was the way to build trust, that he has passed his Russian Burp gun to several people and all had proven trustworthy.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP

On 6/28/69, about 5:00 PM, R. J. GLOVER telephoned E. D. MORACE and asked him to come to the home of SDG member BUCK HORTON in Vidalia, La., as HORTON was sick. MORACE and GLOVER took HORTON to Jeff Davis Hospital in Natchez, where it was found he had a very sore throat and a virus. They took HORTON back home that night. HORTON asked MORACE and GLOVER to go to the Concordia airport, Vidalia, La., and put his airplane in a hanger. HORTON said that he has been having some trouble with JAMES SEALE, a former klansman and SDG member from Mississippi. A Jackson, Miss., company has the lease on the Vidalia airport and SEALE is working for that company. The company that operates the Alexandria, La., airport wants to get the lease and HORTON is helping that company.

GLOVER and MORACE went to the airport after dark on 6/28/69, and told JAMES SEALE they wanted to put HORTON's airplane in a hanger. SEALE said he did not know about that and GLOVER exhibited a .38 caliber revolver with a two inch barrel, which was tucked inside his belt. SEALE then became easy to get along with and the plane was put in the hanger.

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On the night of 6/30/69, GLOVER and MORACE attended a meeting of the Concordia Parish Police Jury at the request of BUCK HORTON. The police jury was considering whether to give the lease to the airport to the Jackson, Miss., company or to the Alexandria, La., company. JAMES SEALE was present with ERNEST PARKER, a klansman from Natchez, Miss., and about ten other former klan members from the Natchez area. PARKER appeared mad and asked MORACE if he was there for BUCK HORTON. MORACE said that he was and also were his five friends, exhibiting a Smith and Wesson five shot revolver. PARKER told MORACE he was there only as an observer and soon left.

#### SDG & MINUTEMEN

On Saturday, June 14, 1969, about 10:00 A.M., R. J. GLOVER and DON WILKENSON visited E. D. MORACE at MORACE's home at Vidalia, Louisiana. WILKENSON had a bag of Minutemen literature with the following types of literature:

1. Small sticker with photo of a minuteman and words, "We will never surrender".

2. Small sticker with an American flag and, "We will never surrender".

3. Larger pamphlet, "Join the Minutemen".

4. Small sticker with half of a ten dollar bill on one side and accusing the U.N. of Communism on the other side.

5. Small sticker with half of a ten dollar bill on one side and accusing the U.S. Government for trading with Communist countries on the other side.



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WILKENSON furnished MORACE with about forty copies of each of the above described.

GLOVER had a paper sack containing about 300 copies of a mimeographed one page sheet called, "The White Sentinel". This sheet is as follows:

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#### THE WHITE SENTINEL

What is our condition today?...If we attempt to move forward we are literally chained to the body of a festering Black Drath! Our country id under the heel of the Nagro; and all our Southern States in his slutches. Our city, county and parish governments are debauched by his vote. His insolence threatens our womanhood, and our children are beaten by Negro toughs on the way to school while we pay his taxes. Shall we longer tolerate Negro inspectors of white schools, and Negroes in charge of white institutions? Shall we longer tolerate the arrest of white women by Negro officers and their trial before Negro magistrates?

Let the manhood of the Aryan race with its four thousand years of authentic history answer that question. It is no longer a question of bad government. It is a question of impossible government. We hag behind the age dragging the decaying corpse to which we are chained. "WHO SHALL DELIVER US FROM THE BODY OF THIS DEATH?"

"Hear me, men of my race, Norman and Celt, Angle and Saxon, Dane and Frank, Huguenot and German martyr Blood."

"The hour has struck when we must rise in our might, break the chains that bind us to this corruption, strike down the Negro as a ruling poser and restore to our children their birthright, which we received, a priceless legacy, from our fathers." I believe in God's call to our race to d His work in history. What other races failed to do, you wrought in this continental wilderness, fighting pestilence, hunger, cold, wild beasts, and savage hordes, until out of it all has grown the mightiest nation of the earth. "IS THE NEGRO WORTHY TO RULE OVER YOU? Ask history. The African has held one fourth of this globe for SOCO years. He has never taken one step in progress or rescued one jungle from the ape and the adder, except as the slave of a superior race...

"The corruption of his presence in our body politic is beyond the power of reckoning. We drove the Carpet-bagger from our midst, but the Scalawag, our native product, is always with us to fatten on this corrup tion and breed death to society. The Carpet-bagger was a wolf, the Scalawag is a hyena. The one was a highwayman, the other a sneek.

"Shall the future be Anglo-Sexon or Mulatto? That is the question before you. Nations are made by men, not by paper constitutions and paper ballots. We are not free because we have a Constitution. We have a Constitution because our pioneer fathers who cleared the wilderness and dared the might of kings, were freemen... If you can make men out of paper, then it is possible with a scratch of a pen in the hand of a madmaw to transform by its magic a million slaves into a million kings,

We grant the Negro the right to life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness if he can be happy without exercising kingship over the Anglo-Saxon race, or dragging us down to his level. But if he can not find happiness except in lording it over a superior race, let him look for another world in which to rule. There is not room for both of us on this continents. It took Spain 800 years to expel the Moors. When the time compa the Anglo-Saxon can do in one century what the Spaniard did in eight tion of the past hundred and four years. There is a limit beyond which we dare not go, for at this point, self-restraint becomes pusillenimous SN.

"I ask you, my people freemen...to rise today and make good your right to live: The time for platitudes is past. Let us as men face the world and say what we mean. This is a white man's government, conceived by white men, and maintained by white men through every year of its history, and by the God of our Fathers it shall be ruled by white men until the Arch-ange

GLOVER told MORACE to go to the levee between Ferriday, and Clayton, Louisiana, at 5:00 P.M., that day and some SDG men would meet him. MORACE was to pass out the literature and have the men to distribute it at Ferriday-Vidalia-Clayton, Louisiana, and the vicinity. GLOVER said he had some men from Natchez, Mississippi, to come over and help, but told them not to come as the FBI might make something of the men crossing the State line. GLOVER said that he and WILKENSON could not help as they had to remain in Natchez, because of expected trouble there. GLOVER stated that there was a riot squad in Natchez, checking all cars and expecting trouble from the Negroes. (It was later determined that there had been a routine traffic check station set up in Natchez, where authorities checked drivers licenses of drivers).

GLOVER and WILKENSON talked of the inaugration meeting at the City Auditorium, Natchez, set for about July 2, 1969 or July 7, 1969. CHARLES EVERS, a Negro, who was elected as Mayor of Fayette, Mississippi, was to be inauguarated at this time at Natchez, and had invited many prominent persons. GLOVER said that there was a large storm

sewer in front of the auditorium and he wondered how big an explosion it would make if they poured barrels of gasoline into the sewer two blocks away andlit it after it ran down to the auditorium. WILKENSON said a better idea would be to string the 500 feet of primercord on the sidewalk in front of the auditorium and set it off. It was decided that no action would be taken unless the three men met again and decided on a plan of action.

About 4:45 P.M., on June 14, 1969, the following persons met at the extrance to the hunting camp on the levee between Ferriday, and Clayton, Louisiana:

JAMES BILL BLANEY

his brother, GERALD BLANEY (both SDG members)

JAMES HORACE "SONNY" TAYLOR, Harrisonburg, Louisiana and SDG and Minutemen member

JAMES SCAROBROUGH, SDG member, along with WILLIAM GUTHRIE, a friend of SCAROBROUGH and former Minutemen member

JOHN MC CLERKIN, former Exalted Cyclops of the Klan at Ferriday, Louisiana

E. D. MORACE

PAUL TOLBERT, SDG member, showed up with his son-inlaw, who is not a member of any organization.

None of the men knew why they were there, except that GLOVER has told them there was a project, until MORACE told the group that GLOVER had sent literature for them to pass out. Some of the men, the BLANEY boys in particular, did not like the idea of being called out just to pass out literature. MORACE gave each man literature and told them to distribute it in the area that night,

About 8:00 or 9:00 P.M., June 14, 1969, E. D. MORACE received a call from an unknown man from Woodville, Louisiana. As MORACE later related it to a friend the man said he was a mutual friend and wanted to let the man who runs Red's Anti-Pest Control (R. J. GLOVER) know what had just happened at Woodville, This man, who MORACE said was one of the SDG members he had met at Centerville, Mississippi, probably GORDON VINES or DUB JETER, said that some Negroes had just been shot by the Highway Patrol and for MORACE to have SDG members to stand by in the event they were needed. MORACE said he tried to reach R, J, GLOVER and found he had gone to his old home place in Kentwood, Louisiana.

# JAMES BILL BLANEY

BILL BLANEY has moved from Natchez, Mississippi, back to the old BLANEY home on Cash Bayou which is away out in the country from Clayton, Louisiana. BLANEY is employed out in the Gulf and is home only now and them.

#### MINUTEMEN AND SILVER DOLLAB GROUP

There was no activity by members of Unit 1733, Ferriday-Natchez Unit of the Minutemen. E. D. MORACE, Squad Lender for Louisiana, made efforts to contact Network Commander DON BILKENSON of Natchez, Mississippi, on June 20, 1969, with negative results.

On June 21,1969, R. J. GLOVER took a pair of post hole diggers to E. D. MORACE at MORACE's home in Vidalia, Louisiana. MORACE used these post hole diggers to attempt to dig a hole to bury his explosive container in his back yard. MOBACE guit after a short time and was heard to say later that the ground was too hard and he would have to wait for a rain to soften the ground.

GLOVER spoke of the innuguration of CHARLES EVERS set for July 7,1969, at Matchez, Hississippi. He said he had been in contact with a group of men in Matchez, and also with a person from out of town and they wanted to do something about the innuguration. GLOVER said the men did not like his ideas of having an explosize with gasoline or primercord. GLOVER said he would meet with the men again and would let MORACE know of any plan made.

GLOVER speke of the meeting of citizens of Concordin Farish at the City Auditorium in Ferriday, Louisanz, on the night of June 19,1969. MORACE told GLOVER he had been at the meeting, which was conducted by school authorities. MORACE said a committee had been appointed to study a school desegregation plan to submit to the Federal court. MORACE sold that WESLEY WARREN was the only Klansmon appointed and they would have to just wait and see what would happen.

### WESLEY WARREN

UESLEY WARBER continues to live at Boute 2, Box 36, Joncsville, Louisiana, in the Lismore Community and to operate a small grocery store and cafe there. He continues part-time employment by Hinton-Mc Coy Ford Garage, Ferriday, Louisiana, as a new car salesman. He continues to drive a 1969 Ford demonstrator and a 1964 Ford Falcon sedan, blue in color.

WARREN has not been active in the Klan or any hate-type group in the past six months. WARREN was appointed on June 19,1969, as the Liemoro Community representative on a committee for Concordia Parish to study and report a school desegregation plan.

### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP (SDG)

On 6/13/69, RED GLOVER called DON WILKINSON at his home and told him that he wanted to see him but did not come by. The next day he called and told WILKINSON that he wanted to see him and met him at the Barbeque Pit located in Natchez, Miss. While there he told WILKINSON that they were going to a meeting in Vidalia, La., at the residence of E. D. MORACE and while en route they stopped at the residence of JIMMY SCAROBOROUGH, but he was not at home. At the meeting at E. D. MORACE's home, RED GLOVER, E. D. MORACE and DON WILKINSON discussed a SDG meeting to be held at 5:00 p.m. that afternoon at Clayton, La. The items to be discussed at the SDG member meeting later on that afternoon was the fact that CHARLES EVERS was to use the Natchez City Auditorium for his Inaugural Ball, the fact that the Mississippi Highway Patrol were checking licenses and traffic violators at Natchez, Miss., and the distribution of White Sentinel pamphlets.

Regarding the White Sentinel pamphlets, WILKINSON told the group that he wanted the Minutemen material to be submitted with this information, but no conclusion was reached regarding it. It was decided that E. D. MORACE would conduct a meeting that afternoon at Clayton, La., and RED GLOVER had to go to Kentwood, La., to his residence there and therefore he and DON WILKINSON could not attend.

While leaving the meeting held at MORACE's home, WILKINSON and GLOVER were en route to Natchez, Miss., but during the trip RED GLOVER saw Deputy Sheriff DE LAUGHTER of Concordia Parish and stopped and talked to him for a few minutes. He introduced DON WILKINSON to DE LAUGHTER and during the course of the conversation DE LAUGHTER was overheard to tell WILKINSON and GLOVER that a license identification check had been run on him on 6/10/69, from Natchez, Miss., and this upset GLOVER considerably.

After they left the City of Vidalia, La., GLOVER told WILKINSON to contact E. D. MORACE at approximately 8:00 p.m. to determine if JIMMY SCAROBOROUGH showed up at the SDG meeting to be held. WILKINSON telephoned MORACE later on that afternoon as instructed and found out that SCAROBOROUGH did not show up.

The meeting that was held at E. D. MORACE's home resulted in RED GLOVER stating that the poor showing of the membership at E. D. MORACE's home was because the Mississippi Highway Patrol was presently conducting a search of automobiles and such at Natchez, Miss., and therefore many of the men were scared to go out and come to Louisiana. Also during the meeting was discussed the fact that the City Auditorium Building at Natchez, Miss., had to go. However, MORACE. GLOVER and WILKINSON all decided that anything that would be done to the building had to be done at a later date due to their being a two-block cordon of police officers around the auditorium during the Inaugural Ball and also since special surveillance teams would be cruising the area. RED GLOVER suggested that gasoline be poured in the sewer lines and then set on fire. E. D. MORACE suggested burning the City Auditorium itself, but DON WILKINSON stated that he had not practiced his trade in quite sometime and that he wanted to blow the place up. No definite conclusion was reached and no plan of action was set.

On 6/15/69, DON WILKINSON called RED GLOVER and told him to get an electric cap for him and that he and RED GLOVER would carry out the actual blowing up of the City Auditorium. GLOVER said he did not want any part of it and told WILKINSON that he would get them both caught. GLOVER told WILKINSON that POLLY, his wife, had quit her job at Wilson's Drugstore and had moved back to Kentwood and that he was planning on moving back shortly.

#### MINUTEMEN

On 6/15/69, DON WILKINSON talked to JOHN COLLINGER BOSTICK in the presence of RED GLOVER at the Barbeque Pit and at that time furnished to him numerous copies of the White Sentinel and Minutemen material. He told BOSTICK to put out the material on the next night after 10:00 p.m. and that BOSTICK was responsible for putting out the material in the Brooklyn Subdivision and as far down Morgantown Road as the material held out.

The next day DON WILKINSON met JEWEL LEE BURT at the Barbeque Pit and asked him about his \$3.00 dues. BURT told WILKINSON that he would pay it, although he had been off work, but WILKINSON told him just to forget it and he would pay it for him this month, but BURT had to pay him next month. WILKINSON gave BURT numerous copies of the White Sentinel and Minutemen literature and told him to put out the literature in Jefferson County and particularly in the city of Fayette, Miss., after 10:00 p.m. Also a definite date was made to go see JIMMY SCAROBOROUGH on 6/24/69, with JEWEL LEE BURT, JOHN BOSTICK and RED GLOVER regarding SCAROBOROUGH's apparent reluctance to cooperate with the SDG.

#### DONNIE CRAFT

DONNIE CRAFT was overhead to make a statement to the effect that he got out of the Minutemen organization due to his having several arguments with JIMMY SCAROBOROUGH, particularly over a girl and also because CRAFT thought SCAROBOROUGH had been furnishing information to the FBI. He thought this because CRAFT was interviewed by the FBI after he became a member of the Minutemen and further he suspected SCAROBOROUGH of embezzling funds that belonged to the Minutemen group.

On 6/16/69, RED GLOVER contacted DON WILKINSON and was overheard to tell him over the phone that a man was to come by at 8:15 a.m. on 6/17/69, but he would not tell WILKINSON what for. On 6/17/69, RED GLOVER called and to WILKINSON to meet him at the Barbeque Pit which WILKINSON did. At that time GLOVER turned over to WILKINSON a Russian .30 caliber machine gun, bearing SN AL1514 and stamped with crossed flintlike pistols on the right side

of the buttstock and with an arrowhead on the left side of the buttstock. WILKINSON was instructed to turn the machine gun over to JIMMY SCAROBOROUGH in Vidalia because he has another gun and is keeping it for GLOVER.

During the late night of 6/16/69,DON WILKINSON went to the Fountain Lounge and got JOHN BOSTICK and rolled several copies of the White Sentinel with Minutemen literature. They put out 150 copies down MonteBella Road, went to the Barbeque Pit, rolled 200 more and put out those down Old Washington Road and Baker Drive. JEWEL LEE BURT told WILKINSON at this meeting that he had put the White Sentinel copies that he had in the mailboxes at Fayette, Miss.

### C. B. TODD

DON WILKINSON saw C. B. TODD at the Barbeque Pit at 11:30 p.m. on 6/13/69, and at that time collected \$3 in dues from him. C. B. TODD was overheard to rant to WILKINSON that he wife had been gone two or three days and that he had someone that he wanted the Minutemento beat up on. WILKINSON would not discuss the matter with him and apparently walked away without giving him an answer.

There is presently no information available to indicate that JULIUS LEE CARTER and/or his wife AMY CARTER is now or ever have been members of the Klan in Natchez, Miss.

# MISCELLANEOUS

DON WILKINSON was overheard to say that he furnished on 6/16/69, Minutemen information and an application to PAUL S. CREECH, but that he did not know whether CREECH would really be interested in it or not. He stated that CREECH had attempted to get into the Klan several times in the past, but it was his, WILKINSON's, feeling that nobody could get along with him and that is why the Klan never had accepted him.

#### SILVER DOLLAR GROUP AND MINUTEMEN

There were no Minutemen meetings or activity during the past week.

R. J. GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE on June 6, 1969, and stated the meeting of Silver Dollar Group (SDG) members which he had called for Saturday, June 8, 1969, was postponed. GLOVER said he wanted to keep the FBI guessing so would change his meeting times often. He told MORACE that there would be a meeting soon and he would let him know on the morning before the meeting. MORACE asked GLOVER for his posthole diggers in order to dig a hole to bury his explosive container and GLOVER said he would bring them to MORACE soon.

GLOVER inquired of MORACE about the school situation in Louisiana, and MORACE thought there might be trouble since freedom of choice had been thrown out. GLOVER said that was good and maybe they would get some backing from the people and when they see a man doing something they will not be so quick to tell authorities. GLOVER said he and two other men had a plan and he would let MORACE know when the time comes.

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD telephonically advised E. D. MORACE on June 11, 1969, that R. J. GLOVER had been by and told him there would be a meeting on the afternoon or evening of June 14, 1969.

#### PRIMER CORD

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The spool on which the Cordalon cord is wound is made of cardboard. One side of the spool is plain and has no writing on it and is grey in color. The other side is red in color, except for a black circle inside the red. Printed on this side are the following words:

> "CORDALON Nylon Covered Detonating Cord

From America's Oldest Explosive Company Come the Newest Explosive Ideas

#### ERSHEL BOYD

ERSHEL BOYD, who is also known as Preacher Boyd, was observed to contact E. D. MORACE at the Ford Garage at Ferriday, Louisiana, on June 6, 1969. BOYD was talking of trouble at the Armstrong Tire Company, Natchez, Mississippi. BOYD said there were two Negroes who need taking care of at the tire plant, but that he and R. J. GLOVER would handle it. During this conversation, BOYD was flipping a silver dollar into the air indicating he was a member of the SDG.

MORACE later said he had not known BOYD was a Silver Dollar member, but knew BOYD and GLOVER had been thick. MORACE told a friend that when GLOVER gives a man a silver dollar to show membership in the SDG the man has to give GLOVER a paper dollar in return.

#### KENNETH NORMAN HEAD

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD continues to live in the same place on Lake Concordia, near Ferriday, Louisiana. HEAD is now a mechanic for Hughes and New Oil Company, Natchez, Mississippi. He no longer has a 1959 white Ford station wagon and now owns a 1963 or 1964 dark

blue Buick. HEAD is active in the SDG and the Minutemen, but is not active in any Klan group.

### PAUL TOLBERT

TOLBERT continues to live in the same place at Clayton, Louisiana, and continues to be unemployed and on disability retirement. TOLBERT no longer has his 1962 light green Chevrolet sedan as this car was wrecked by his son. TOLBERT no longer has a 1965 Ford pickup and now owns a 1969 Ford pickup, white over green in color.

TOLBERT has not yet submitted a Minutemen application and is not active in the Klan. He continues to have close contact with SDG members, although he has not attended meetings in the past six months.

Roll number two is the same size and type of spool; however, it has a clear plastic container with a white filler. There are no markings on the reverse of the spool. It is noted that this spool is completely full of the material.

Spool number three is the same size as the other two spools and contains the same type of primercord as spool number one. The front of the spool shows the numbers written at the top 9 then a smudged place then 410 cr 413. This is written above the words Ensign-Bickford Co. Under the word 500 feet is a splotch and then the numbers 8492E; to the left of the word 500 feet are the numbers RDXHYCAR. No other numbers are readily readable on the front of the spool The reverse of the spool is broken and shows the printed letters GRP-14-Y and contains approximately five layers of black rubbery explosive.

A location suitable for the detonation of this material has been located.
