[redacted] Monroe, Louisiana, was interviewed at his place of employment, New York Life Insurance Company, 18th Street Business Center, where he was advised of the nature of the investigation. [redacted] furnished the following information:

[redacted] advised that in approximately April, 1966, he had occasion to patronize the Marville Lounge located in Deer Park, Louisiana. [redacted] stated that he had heard from a friend in Bastrop, Louisiana, that there was prostitution in operation at the Marville Lounge and decided, through curiosity, to see the operation for himself.

[redacted] advised that shortly after entering the Marville Lounge, he was propositioned by a girl at the bar; however, he declined her services. [redacted] stated that after having one or two drinks, he departed the Marville Lounge and since that time, has not had occasion to again patronize the establishment. [redacted] stated that the above instance was the only occasion where he had been at the Marville Lounge.

[redacted] stated that at the time he patronized the Marville, he and his wife were visiting relatives in Natchez, Mississippi. He stated that he is employed as a sales agent for the New York Life Insurance Company at Monroe, Louisiana.

[redacted] owner and operator of the [redacted] Company, Idabel, Oklahoma, advised that he is in the business of buying and selling new and used airplanes.

[redacted] stated that he was the former owner of a 1956 Cessna 182, Airplane Identification Number N5355B, white and red in color. [redacted] stated that he had purchased this airplane from [redacted] of Moore, Oklahoma, and had further repaired it. He believed it was in May when he advertised this airplane in the Trade-A-Plane Bulletin, which he stated was a national bulletin for the advertising of airplanes. He stated that in the early part of July, 1966, he received a phone call from a man who gave his name as [redacted] of Hatcher, Mississippi, who stated he was interested in the Cessna airplane that he had seen advertised in the Trade-A-Plane Bulletin. [redacted] stated he had a Piper Tri-Pacer airplane he wanted to trade in on the Cessna.

[redacted] stated that on July 17, 1966, [redacted] appeared at the Idabel, Oklahoma airport, flying a 1955 Piper PA-22 identifying number 2372-P. [redacted] stated he had his Cessna priced at \$2075.00 and after some conversation with [redacted] a trade was made. He stated he allowed [redacted] \$3420.00 for his Tri-Pacer airplane. [redacted] stated [redacted] put a \$100.00 deposit and returned to Hatcher, Mississippi in his Tri-Pacer as [redacted] stated he had to do some work on the Cessna before he could sell it. The agreement with [redacted] was that when he delivered his Cessna, the difference was to be paid in cash.

[redacted] stated that he immediately made the necessary repairs to his Cessna and on July 24, 1966, he flew the Cessna to the Hardy Andrews Airport in Hatcher, Mississippi, where he delivered the Cessna to [redacted] as agreed. He stated that [redacted] gave him a cashiers check for payment of the Cessna in the amount of \$4575.00 which was the price agreed upon.

[ ] stated that he had not seen [ ] or the unknown man before and did not know anything regarding their activities and stated he did not recall what Bank the cashiers check was obtained from. [ ] stated that he could not identify the photograph of CURT HEWITT as anyone he has ever seen and could furnish no other information regarding this matter. He stated he has resold the Piper Tri-Pacer airplane he obtained from [ ]

The following investigation was conducted

AT MARSHAL, TEXAS

[REDACTED] operator of an aircraft repair and maintenance shop at Marshal Airport, advised he does not recall any strange young men or women flying into Marshal and he is at the airport every day. There is very little activity at this airport as they no longer have commercial airline service.

Photographs of [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] were displayed to [REDACTED] and he said neither of these individuals was familiar to him. He advised the only other airport located in Harrison County is at the Flying Fish Lodge located at Uncertain, Texas, which is now closed.

On October 20, 1966, [REDACTED] a former deputy sheriff in Harrison County [REDACTED] [REDACTED] advised that [REDACTED] and [REDACTED] are both unknown to him. He further advised he has not heard of any prostitutes being flown into the Marshall Airport.

On October 20, 1966, [REDACTED] a deputy sheriff of Harrison County who resides at [REDACTED] Texas, advised [REDACTED] operated the Flying Fish Lodge at Uncertain, Texas, in about 1963 for approximately six months. There were rumors at that time that someone was landing prostitutes on the private airstrip at this lodge on weekends but this rumor was never confirmed. The lodge has been closed most of the time since 1963 and is closed at the present time.

They disclaimed all knowledge of activities of their son, [redacted] and denied they ever received any money from him in the form of a gift, or assistance or any other reason. They disclaimed any knowledge of activities of [redacted] or who might know her whereabouts. They claimed they knew nothing of the subjects in this matter or the Marville Lounge or anything connected with it.

The [redacted] immediately went into a loud accusatory conversation about how "sorry the local law is in Lake Charles", pointing out their son, [redacted] is falsely accused of everything in the world and others who do worse things go free because of the dirty politics.

YELLOW CAB OF NATCHEZ MESSENGER  
SYSTEM FOR THE MARVILLE LOUNGE

Date 2/8/67

[redacted] was advised of the identity of the interviewing agents and the nature of the interview. He was interviewed in front of the Southland Service Station in Vidalia, Louisiana. At the outset, SA [redacted] read to [redacted] a written statement of his rights and waiver of his rights. [redacted] read this same statement of his rights, advised that he understood these rights, and signed a written waiver of these rights. He furnished the following information:

About November 2, 1965, he was hired by the District Supervisor of Southland Oil Company, Yazoo City, Mississippi, as a Southland Oil Company dealer. From about that time, he has run a Southland Service Station in Natchez, Mississippi, at Pearl and Franklin Streets, until that location was torn down in about September, 1966, and has also operated the Southland Service Station on Carter Street in Vidalia, Louisiana, located nearly opposite the Shipley Donut Shop.

In addition, he runs the Yellow Cab fleet in Natchez, Mississippi, which also operates in Vidalia, Louisiana, and which is serviced out of his Southland Station in Vidalia. The radio equipment is leased on a monthly basis from [redacted] who runs the Shadyside Grocery in Natchez, Mississippi, and has the franchise for the Yellow Cab.

[redacted] was operating the Yellow Cab fleet when he, [redacted] took over the Southland Station in Natchez the end of October, 1965, and continued to operate it until January 13, 1966, when [redacted] took it over from him. During that time, [redacted] had the Yellow Cab dispatcher radio located in [redacted] Southland Station in Natchez; sometimes [redacted] did all of the dispatcher work, sometimes using others for short periods as dispatcher. During this time, [redacted] learned from [redacted] that there was extra money to be made by the Yellow Cab drivers by delivering messages to the Marville Lounge, a house of prostitution in Deer Park, Louisiana, which was operated by CURT HEWITT. He learned this was a necessary service because there were no phones at the Marville. He learned from [redacted] that the service worked in this way:

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A prostitute would telephone the Yellow Cab in Natchez at phone number 442-7323, giving a message either for "CURT" or for "the Marville." [ ] would then call a Yellow Cab driver to the Southland Station, give him the message he had received over the phone, and the cab driver would deliver the message to the Marville Lounge. He believed that [ ] got \$4.00 per trip for such services.

When [ ] left the business in January, 1966, he, [ ] ran this service the same way and for about the first three months was dispatcher. At that time, he received instructions from various women, who usually gave him only a nickname like [ ] that they would be arriving at a certain time, that they needed to be picked up at the bus station in Natchez, that they needed money sent to them, or that their car had had a breakdown and they would be late. [ ]

he received and passed on to CURT HEWITT about six or seven such messages a month. He then began to hire dispatchers to do this work until about September, 1966, when he discontinued at the Southland Station in Natchez and hired [ ] in Natchez to set up a dispatcher service for him at her answering service, the Mis-Lou Answering Service, Room 201, Eola Hotel, Natchez, Mississippi.

He started by paying [ ] \$80 a month for this service, but she has since raised the fee to \$175 per month. Her service works in this way:

A prostitute or customer for the Marville Lounge will phone number 442-7323 in Natchez, which is still listed to the Yellow Cab, and will be connected with the phone of the Yellow Cab operator at Mis-Lou Answering Service. She will take down the message, then she will call a Yellow Cab driver over the dispatcher radio located in the same room and tell him to telephone the answering service. (The Marville has never been mentioned over the radio, because he, [ ] was certain the Federal Communications Commission would cease operation of the dispatcher at once if they heard it.) The dispatcher then gives the message over the phone to the driver, who delivers the message to CURT HEWITT or the Marville Lounge.

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Mis-Lou Answering Service keeps a log of all messages, including these, which he advised he would notify [redacted] to let Bureau Agents review. In addition, each driver keeps a trip log, and each such trip would be shown as "the Marville" under destination. The fee shown would be until about January 1, 1967, when he had to raise the fee to \$5.00.

Since many customers, some of whom are intoxicated, phone the Yellow Cab to inquire about houses of prostitution, and the Marville Lounge in particular, [redacted] has determined to run her service in a "lady-like manner." If a customer calls and asks for a cab to the Marville Lounge, she will dispatch him one. However, if he calls and asks where he can get a prostitution date or makes similar coarse remarks, her operators are instructed to decline to furnish any reply.

Each cab driver is on a rotation list on trips to the Marville, so that the cab driver cannot make two trips to the Marville unless all of the drivers have made one trip. [redacted] has such a list for her dispatcher to use.

He cannot recall any of the prostitutes asking to be picked up anywhere except at the bus station in Natchez while he was dispatcher, nor have any of his drivers mentioned any other places they picked up girls for delivery to the Marville. No one ever asked him to send or have any of his drivers send anyone any money for CURT HEWITT or anyone else connected with the Marville Lounge. He does not know how money was sent to the girls who requested it.

He has never had any discussions with HEWITT about this message system, although HEWITT at times has stopped by the Southland Station and told him that he will be gone for a few days and if anyone calls the Southland Station, which is telephone number 336-9925 in Vidalia, and leaves a message for him, that he, [redacted] should take the message down and give it to him when he returns. He

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has never charged HEWITT for this service anymore than he would any other customer and cannot recall the content of any such messages he may have received.

HEWITT has a Southland Oil Company Credit Card in his own name and is an excellent customer, frequently getting gas and other services for his several automobiles. J. D. RICHARDSON also is a regular customer, but RICHARDSON has never had him take or deliver any messages for him. Another regular customer is [redacted] who also has his own Southland Oil Company Credit Card.

The last time [redacted] was in was about a week and a half ago. He had a young woman with him then who was supposed to be his wife, and he was driving a [redacted]

[redacted] is the nephew of [redacted]  
[redacted] who also resides with [redacted] behind [redacted]

The last time CURT HEWITT was in was earlier this same date, at which time he was in a wrecker truck with the winch on the back being driven by a Negro male. CURT usually is in alone or with this same Negro during the past several months. CURT had the truck filled with gas and left.

The previous week, on about a Wednesday, CURT had brought in a light blue pick-up truck, with 1966 Louisiana truck license, 432-349 and a Gulf emblem on the doors. CURT told him he would sell him the truck for \$395, nothing down, and \$50 worth of gas per month. He agreed to this, although he learned that the truck was bought by CURT from Bluff City Motors in Natchez for little over \$200. CURT told him that CURT had put a lot of money into the truck to get it in good shape. The same day, CURT had spent about \$65 to get a pink Cadillac and a green Cadillac put in shape at his Vidalia Station.

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The next day, a Thursday, CURT had delivered him the bill of sale and the pink slip for the truck. He advised he could not locate the bill of sale but produced the pink slip, which reflected that a 1957 Ford pick-up truck, 1966 Louisiana license 432-349, Motor number F 10 K 7 D 17065 (no serial number listed) was sold used on January 20, 1967, to [redacted] Southland Service Station, Vidalia, Louisiana, by CURT HEWITT Auto Sales, Vidalia, Louisiana. The prior license was listed as F/5-738 Mississippi.

On that same day, the Vidalia police had come to his station and arrested HEWITT and tried to confiscate the pick-up truck.

He has known CURT HEWITT since [redacted] possibly earlier, and for about that same period of time has known that the Marville Lounge was supposed to be a house of prostitution in Deer Park, Louisiana.

Before [redacted] he got word in early summer, 1966, to take a message to the Marville Lounge. He decided to get a look at the place, for he had never been there himself, and called his wife to ask her to go with him, which she did. CURT HEWITT and [redacted] were there and running the place when he arrived, leaving his wife in the car outside. He gave CURT the message, for which he was paid \$4.00. Also there was a blonde girl who had driven a [redacted] to his Southland Station in Vidalia the previous week with another girl, a brunette, accompanying her in the car. At that time, the blonde had told him the car needed to be fixed at once and that "he should spare no expense." His men fixed the car and were paid \$50 by the blonde, including about a \$15 tip.

While at the station, the blonde and the brunette told him and his men to come to the Marville Lounge for a "good time," by which all of them understood a prostitution date.

This same blonde at the Marville Lounge tried to proposition him for a prostitution date after he had



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been paid by CURT for delivering the message. He told her he was married, had his wife outside, and could not have a date with her.

That was the only time he went to the Marville Lounge, but he cautioned his drivers after that to hold onto their money when they made a trip there, because the prostitutes would try to get it back.

He advised he had the driver logs for his drivers and his old dispatcher log, which he would maintain in case they would be required for court.

He advised that CURT and the prostitutes used his phone at the Vidalia Station so much that the monthly take would range from \$90 to \$100 for his phone number [REDACTED]

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He advised he could recall one message from memory that he received while working as Yellow Cab dispatcher himself. It was a message for CURT HEWITT phoned in by a girl who said she was in [REDACTED] Louisiana, and that she [REDACTED] She gave him a phone number, which he was to give to CURT, and instructions to have CURT call her back.

He was shown the photographs of several prostitutes, pimps, and others and advised that the only ones he could identify was CURT HEWITT, although some of the photographs of the females looked "familiar."

He advised that three weeks ago, J. D. RICHARDSON asked him if he would like to take over the Shipley Donut Shop, but he refused.

His drivers all had to get cab licenses from the City of Natchez, which were approved by the Chief of Police, and that the drivers he presently had were as follows:

1. Mr. (First Name Unknown) VOUGH, a retired Baptist preacher, who drives cab number one and who lives on N. Rankin, Street, Natchez, Mississippi.

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2. [redacted] who lives with [redacted]  
[redacted] and who has driven for him for about one  
year.

3. [redacted] who lives at [redacted] rooming  
house, [redacted] Natchez, Mississippi, and who has driven  
for him about three months.

4. [redacted] who also lives at [redacted]  
and who has been driving for him about one year.

[redacted] has driven for him for about three months,

[redacted] Vidalia, Louisiana, was interviewed at his place of business. He was advised of the identities of the interviewing Agents and the nature of the investigation. He thereafter furnished the following information:

He has heard of nothing concerning persons who might be responsible for the bombing in Natchez, Mississippi, on February 27, 1967. He has heard a few unconfirmed rumors about this incident, such rumors as that the victim was a Communist and he tried to leave the Party, thus he was killed. He stated some people have mentioned this theory, stating, "once a Communist always a Communist." He could not recall who told him of this theory and where he might have heard the rumor. He also heard that the victim was killed by the NAACP or other Negroes but he could not recall who told him this particular story.

He knows of no present Klan activity in the area of Vidalia, Louisiana, and has not heard of any acts of violence on the part of the Klan. He was a member of the Ku Klux Klan about five years ago, never recalls any violence that was advocated while he was in the Klan and he got out of the Klan after attending only about 5 or 6 meetings.

He was asked where he attended meetings of the Klan and indicated that it was at Ferriday, Louisiana, and that the particular organization was the Original Knights of the Ku Klux Klan, Realm of Louisiana (OKKKK). He stated that he attended meetings in a tin shack on the levee in Ferriday and at the time there were a lot of prominent people in the Klan; such as doctors, lawyers, and even a Deputy Sheriff of Concordia Parish, Louisiana. When asked if he recalled the names of any of these persons and if he knew the name of the Deputy Sheriff, he stated that he could not recall the names of any persons who were in the Klan with him at that time.

[redacted] mentioned that there was a leader in the OKKKK from Monroe, Louisiana who came to the meetings and

when asked if the leader might be [ ] he stated that it was not [ ] and he could not recall this man's name.

He left the area after attending only 5 or 6 meetings and went to California. He stated that when he again returned to the area, the Klan was involved in the violence around Philadelphia, Mississippi, and he decided, along with his wife, that he would not belong to any organization that associates with violence.

[ ] stated that the Chief of Police in Vidalia, Louisiana, has a grudge against him about the Marville Lounge operation. The Chief took away his cab license in the area of Vidalia merely because he noticed several females around his station. He stated that most of his customers are females as he gives out three different types of stamps and on Saturdays, he gives out two pound boxes of sugar with ten gallons of gasoline.

He never did take girls to the Marville Lounge although there were some girls who live in a trailer behind his station and who frequently used the outside pay telephone in front of his station. He believes that the Vidalia Police Department thought that these girls were "whores," but this was not true. He stated that he was not involved in the Marville operation, never took girls to the lounge, however some of his cabs had taken customers to the lounge for \$5.00. He stated that any cab, yellow or otherwise, would have taken a customer wherever they wanted to go and that the cab has no control over the destination of the customer.

He again stated that he had not been involved in any illegal operation, or if so, it was through his own ignorance of the law. He was asked if he had received a subpoena to testify in Lake Charles, Louisiana, concerning a Federal Grand Jury on the matter of the Marville Lounge and he stated that he had not received such a subpoena.

[ ] stated that he was acquainted with [ ] of Vidalia, Louisiana, and that [ ] had worked on his cabs in the past, indicating that he was a good mechanic. He does not know RED GLOVER of Vidalia, Louisiana, and knows nothing about any work done on the truck of GLOVER by anyone in his station.

[ ] additionally mentioned that he got along well with the Negroes in the area, pointing out that the Negro who was burned to death at Ferriday, Louisiana, a few years ago was one of his best friends. He stated that this Negro, named FRANK, owned a shoe shop in Ferriday and evidently his shop was burned with gasoline. He stated that the FBI came to his station and showed him a five gallon gas can that was found at the shop and he told the FBI that it was an oil can of a particular brand because it had the impression of an oil tower on the can. He stated that FRANK was one of his good friends and that before he left for California, FRANK told him, "If you go broke out in California, just remember old FRANK, he always has a few dollars around."

He stated that he had been employed by the Yellow Cab in Natchez, Mississippi, for an approximate two and one-half months period at the end of 1965 and the beginning of 1966. He said that the Yellow Cab was operated by a [redacted] who also owned the Southland Service Station in Vidalia, Louisiana. [redacted] stated that he left the Yellow Cab job in either January or February of 1966.

[redacted] stated that the circumstances surrounding his leaving the job at the Yellow Cab in Natchez stemmed from an argument he had with [redacted]. He stated that his wife, [redacted], also worked for [redacted] and that [redacted] and some of the cab drivers had been making complaints about his wife. [redacted] stated that he then got into an argument with [redacted] and threatened to beat the money out of [redacted] if he did not pay him. [redacted] stated that this was in either January or February of 1966 and that he and his wife left their jobs at the Yellow Cab after his argument with [redacted]

[redacted] stated that he did not have any "run in" with Detective [redacted] of the Natchez Police Department when he was working in Natchez and he believes that [redacted] probably tried to get him in trouble by complaining to Detective [redacted]. [redacted] stated that he heard from

another cab driver, whose name he cannot recall, when he went to pick up some of his belongings at the Yellow Cab, that Detective [redacted] had been by the Yellow Cab office and had been looking for [redacted] [redacted] stated he told the cab driver that [redacted] knew where he lived and that if he wanted to see him he could easily stop by his house. [redacted] stated, however, that [redacted] never did come to see him. [redacted] stated that he does not have any direct information concerning any illegal activities on the part of Detective [redacted] but that it is common knowledge in the Natchez area that [redacted] is regarded as a "dishonest and crooked cop". [redacted] stated that he does not know if [redacted] has any connection with the Marville Lounge outside of Vidalia, Louisiana.

[redacted] stated that he recalled that the Yellow Cab in Natchez had the "account" for delivering messages to CURT HEWITT at the Marville Lounge. He stated that on several occasions the Yellow Cab office would get calls from unknown people from cities such as Shreveport, Louisiana, Bossier City, Louisiana, Baton Rouge, Louisiana, New Orleans, Louisiana, and that the callers would leave a telephone number and ask to have the telephone number delivered to HEWITT at the Marville Lounge. [redacted] stated that as far as he knows the only messages left for HEWITT would be telephone numbers in various cities and that HEWITT was to call the number left. [redacted] stated that on several occasions he traveled from Natchez, Mississippi, to the Marville Lounge outside of Vidalia, Louisiana, with a telephone number and city for HEWITT to call. [redacted] stated that the instructions from [redacted] were that the message was to be delivered to HEWITT only at the Marville Lounge and that if HEWITT was not at the Marville Lounge then the message should not be given to anyone else.

[redacted] stated that he delivered such messages containing a telephone number and a city on several occasions to HEWITT and that HEWITT would pay \$4, which covered the round trip fare from Natchez to Vidalia and to return.

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[ ] also stated that he made several trips to the Marville Lounge with male customers for the lounge during the two and one-half months period that he worked for the Yellow Cab in Natchez. He stated that he did not pick up the customers for the lounge at any particular place and that he picked customers to take to the Marville Lounge from various places in the Natchez area. [ ] stated that usually the customers that he took to the lounge would make arrangements with him to return at a given time to pick them up and return them to Natchez. He stated that as far as he knows there was no telephone at the Marville Lounge and that is the reason the customers would make arrangements with him to pick them up at a given time.

[ ] stated that he took only one female passenger to the Marville Lounge and that this was probably in December of 1965 or January of 1966. He said that he picked up the female passenger at the Southland Service Station in Vidalia at approximately 5:00 a.m. and he noticed that the passenger got out of a [ ] and that there was another female driving the [ ]. He said that the passenger told him to drive South along the levy and finally she told him that she wanted to go to the Marville Lounge. He stated that this passenger was described as approximately [ ] years of age, [ ] feet [ ] inches tall, [ ] pounds, [ ] hair, and [ ]. He stated that he believes he would be able to recognize this female passenger if he saw her again. He said he recalls that this female told him that she was from [ ] Louisiana.

[ ] stated that he never received an assignment to go to the Western Union Office in Natchez and wire money to anyone when he was employed with the Yellow Cab. He stated that he had never heard of any of the other drivers having assignments to go to the Western Union Office and wire money to anyone. [ ] stated that if any driver had received such an assignment he would suspect that it would probably have been [ ]. He stated that [ ] appeared to be trusted

most by [ ] and also that [ ] was responsible for obtaining the "account" of delivering messages to CURT HEWITT at the Marville Lounge. [ ] stated that [ ] reportedly has a brother on the Natchez Police Department.

[ ] stated that [ ] once told him about delivering a telegram to HEWITT at the Marville Lounge. [ ] stated that [ ] told him that a girl was in jail in [ ] Mississippi, as a result of a mix-up over the license on the car that she was driving. [ ] said that [ ] told him that the girl was asking HEWITT to wire her some money so that she could get out of jail. [ ] stated that this is the only instance he can recall of having heard of a Yellow Cab driver delivering a message to HEWITT with information other than merely a city and telephone number to call.

[ ] stated that he did not know any of the employees at the Marville Lounge and stated that usually when he went with just a message to the Marville Lounge he would not see any girls in the lounge. He stated, however, that when he took customers to the lounge, he would frequently see girls in bikini bathing suits at the bar and around a black jack table and a crap table, which was in the front of the lounge. [ ] stated on one occasion when he delivered a message to HEWITT he saw Sheriff NOAH CROSS of Concordia Parish sitting at the bar with a bottle of Old Crow Bourbon in his hand. [ ] stated that this was in the afternoon and was the only time that he ever saw CROSS or any other law enforcement officer at the lounge.

[ ] stated that he has no direct information concerning any payoffs that CROSS or any other law enforcement officer might have received as a result of the operation of the Marville Lounge. He stated, however, that it was generally common knowledge in the Natchez and Vidalia area that Sheriff CROSS and his Chief Deputy, FRANK DE LAUGHTER, were being paid off by the operators of the Marville Lounge. [ ] reiterated, however, that this was just hearsay and he has no direct

[ ] stated that during the two and one-half months period when he worked at the Yellow Cab that he made at least twenty trips to the Marville Lounge to deliver a phone number message to HEWITT. [ ] advised that he has been operating a one man taxi in the [ ] Louisiana area for the past [ ] months. He stated that he calls his taxi operation [ ] but stated that this does not have any connection with the Yellow Cab Company in Natchez, Mississippi. He stated that he has one taxi, a 1960 Chevrolet which has Louisiana taxi license 3-706.

[redacted] was interviewed at his place of employment, [redacted] and advised as follows:

From [redacted] to 1966, [redacted] was employed off and on as a cab driver at the Southland Service Station at Natchez, Mississippi. He stated that in 1965, [redacted] and a partner unknown to [redacted] took over the operation of the service station and the Yellow Cab business in Natchez which they dispatched out of the service station. [redacted] stated that [redacted] had an arrangement with the operator of the Marville Lounge, who was known to [redacted] as "CURT" at Deer Park, Louisiana, to accept and deliver messages to the lounge. [redacted] recalls delivering a number of messages to the lounge and on one occasion in March, 1966, he received a long distance telephone call at the dispatcher's office from [redacted] Louisiana. The caller, who was unknown to [redacted] told [redacted] to deliver a message to the Marville Lounge that someone was coming to Natchez by bus on a date unrecalled by [redacted] and to have someone meet the person at the bus station in Natchez. [redacted] stated there was no mention as to whether the person was male or female. [redacted] advised one of the other cab drivers delivered this message to the Marville Lounge and he could furnish no additional information as to whether or not the person ever arrived in Natchez.

[redacted] advised he does not recall ever transporting any of the prostitutes employed at the Marville Lounge to Natchez or elsewhere. He advised the cab drivers felt they would be violating the Federal Law if they took the prostitutes across the state line; therefore, they avoided any such transportation.

[redacted] stated he never took part in any of the activities at the Marville Lounge and was never hustled by any of the prostitutes working at the lounge. He advised he knows [redacted] inasmuch as [redacted] spent a considerable amount of time at the Marville Lounge during the time [redacted] was employed as a cab driver at Natchez. [redacted] stated that since he has been employed in Baton Rouge, he has seen [redacted] hanging around various bars in an area known as "The Strip" in West Baton Rouge Parish; however, he stated he was unable to furnish any information regarding [redacted] hustling activities.
