II. Investigation of JAMES BUFORD GOSS, Louisiana Probation Officer who Threatened JOSEPH EDWARDS

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JAMES BUFORD GOSS was contacted at his office located at 1403 Fairfield Avenue, Shreveport, Louisiana. At the outset of the interview he was advised of the personal and official identities of the Special Agents. He was furnished a copy of a statement of his constitutional rights and this statement was read aloud to him by SA DIVEN. He signed the waiver of rights section of this form.

He stated that he knew that the contacting Agents were Special Agents of the FBI as soon as he saw them, and indicated that he observed SA DIVEN in that capacity in some prior unrecalled occasion. He stated that he was not particularly expecting a contact by Special Agents of the FBI, but in his line of work as a probation officer for the State of Louisiana, contact by the FBI is an always present possibility these days.

He voluntarily furnished information concerning what he stated was his entire knowledge of JOSEPH EDWARDS and related incidents.

At the conclusion of this interview, he agreed to sign a written statement incorporating this information. Before the statement was completed for his reading and signature, he appeared with JACK KAPLAN, an attorney affiliated with Abramson, Maroun, and Kaplan, 311 Sklar Building, Shreveport, Louisiana, with telephone number 422-3248. GOSS stated that he had engaged KAPLAN to represent him in view of the serious nature of the investigation.

The complete statement was read aloud by SA DIVEN as KAPLAN followed the written statement. GOSS indicated desired changes which were immediately made. He initialed

the corrections, added a paragraph in his own handwriting stating that he had read the statement, and signed the statement with the approval of his attorney.

This statement reads as follows:

"Shreveport, La. "September 12, 1967

"I, James Buford Coss, make the following free and voluntary statement to Patrick R. Cooney and Merriman D. Diven, who have identified themselves to me as Special Agents of the FBI. SA Diven furnished a copy of a statement of my constitutional rights and read this form aloud. I have executed a waiver of these rights.

"I was born on June 24, 1920, in Vienna, Louisiana. I reside with my wife, Kathryn Wolfe Goss at 3236 Sarah Street, Bossier-City, Louisiana. I am employed as a Probation Officer # 1 at Shreveport, Louisiana, by the Louisiana Department of Public Welfare.

"While I was working in the same capacity beginning in March, 1964, in Tallulah, Louisiana, I worked every Monday and Wednesday in the office. On Tuesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays, I was out of the office. I was required to spend every Thursday over-night in either Catahoula Parish or Concordia Parish. I usually preferred to stay in one of the parishes at the following motels beginning with the most preferred:

"I spent every Thursday in one of the above motels. I believe that the first time I stayed at the Shamrock, I met a Negro porter, Joseph Edwards, and I believe that it was his first night on the job too. This would have been around March, 1964. Edwards provided good service and was very friendly. I attempted to get information from him as to the location of persons I wanted to contact. He exhibited a cooperative attitude, but never actually gave me any information. I usually checked in anywhere from 5:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.

"I never heard that Joseph Edwards every arranged any dates for prostitutes. He never solicited any dates for me.

While I was assigned to Tallulah, my wife continued to live in Bossier City except for the months of June, July, and August, 1964, when she lived with me and our son, Steve, (age 16 yrs. at present) in an apartment at 409 N. Mulberry Street, Tallulah. My daughter, Virginia Kay Tarbutton and her husband reside at 1353 Mark Street, Bossier City. Virginia is 26 years of age.

"However, while spending Thursdays at the Shamrock Motel, I met a young girl, Iona Perry, the registration clerk and telephone operator at the motel. She was just about my daughter's age,

but had to wear braces on each leg and use crutches to get around. I was at first attracted by her courage and her determination to work and earn her own way. Later, this interest changed to love and during my association with her from the Spring of 1964 and thru May, 1965, I once considered divorcing my wife and marrying Iona. I gave her an engagement ring that she apparently still has. Since May, 1965, I saw her a few time before the last time, June 24, 1967, which according to my records pertaining to probationer Johnnie Goocher, I stopped by the Jefferson Davis Hospital where Iona is employed and visited her. I was transporting Goocher and went out of my way to see how she was. Her mother and father were also visiting her at the time.

'With regard to my association with Iona during July 1964, I recall that upon checking in at the motel, she started to cry. She refused to explain the reason for this. I picked her up after she got off from work, sometime between 9:00 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. I was driving my 1962 'bluish' Chevy II. After crossing the Mississippi River Bridge, she told me that she had left her switchboard and was passing through a back storage room when Joe Edwards grabbed her arms and kissed her on her lips. She said she screamed and he ran out of the motel office. I do not remember for sure, but I believe that the incident happened earlier that night or the night before.

"I believe that we stopped at the A & W for some refreshments. I took her to her apartment on Jefferson Street, Natchez, Mississippi, and

left about 10:00 to 10:30 p.m. en route to the

Shamrock Motel. I inquired of the registration clerk, either a man or young boy, about Joe Edwards! whereabouts. I was told that Joe had already left the motel. I was very mad at Edwards for his insult to Iona and If I would have found him that night I would have beat him with my hands. I do not believe as a law enforcement officer that I would have killed him.

"I believe that I got a cup of coffee at Jack's Restaurant at the Mobile Service Station. I do not recall who, if anyone, was there; but I suppose Jack was there, working. I did not mention Edwards' insult to Iona, because Iona was too embarrassed about the incident and did not want it discussed.

"I returned to the motel room, most likely the room straight down from the motel office or room # 33. I awoke at 7:30 a.m. and probably had breakfast at the Shamrock. I was usually served by a waitress whose husband had had some difficulties with the law and who had resided in the jail house in back of the Shell Service Station in Ferriday.

"I went to the courthouse because of some cases coming up. While at the Concordia Parish Courthouse, I met Chief Bud Spinks, Vidalia Police Department. I reported the incident concerning Edwards and Iona to him. Spinks was in his uniform at the time. Spinks said he would look into it. Two Vidalia police officers in civilian clothing, because they were in a different jurisdiction, went to Iona's apartment that day or the next day. I do not know if Chief Spinks was one of these two officers or not.



SIMONTON stated that she was never contacted by any police officers who were looking for PERRY and she never heard that any police officers ever contacted PERRY for any reason.

Mrs. SIMONTON stated that she bad no other recollections concerning PERRY during that period in that she herself had a serious health problem in 1963 and 1964 and could not maintain her equilibrium.

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KATIE CARTER, 416 South Union Street, was contacted and advised of the identities of the interviewing Agents. She provided the following information:

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CARTER stated that in 1964, she was working at an answering service for Mrs. SIMONTON, Jefferson Street, Natchez, Mississippi. CARTER stated that IONA PERRY also lived on Jefferson Street with a roommate in an apartment rented from Mrs. SIMONTON.

CARTER stated that she had heard from SIMONTON that some police officers had come one morning to visit PERRY. CARTER stated that she did not know how SIMONTON learned of this visit. CARTER stated that at the time police officers came, she was up town and she did not see the police officers.

CARTER stated that according to SIMONTON, Vidalia Chief of Police SPINKS and two Natchez police officers, one of whom may have been Captain WISNER, paid the visit to PERRY. SPINKS was the one who wanted to see PERRY and the Natchez police officers only went along because SPINKS had no jurisdiction in Natchez. The matter concerned something that happened in Vidalia, Louisiana.

CARTER stated that either the same day or the next day, PERRY was visited by JAMES GOSS, her boyfriend from Louisiana.

CARTER stated that shortly after the visit of the police officers, PERRY left her job at the Shamrock Motel

in Vidalia, Louisiana.

Mr. CURVEY LANDRY, Director, Division of Probation and Parolo, Welfare Division, State of Louisiana, advised as follows concerning JAMES B. GOSS:

GOSS has been employed with the Louisiana State Division of Probation and Parole since August 21, 1961. He was first employed as a welfare visitor out of the Shreveport, Louisiana, Office. He transferred to Tallulah, Louisiana, to position of Probation Officer 1, on March 9, 1964. He remained at that location until May 3, 1965, at which time he transferred to New Orleans, Louisiana, as Welfare Case Supervisor in the Public Assistance Division. He returned to Tallulah, on June 14, 1965, as Probation Officer 1. He transferred to Shreveport, on November 15, 1965, and has remained at that location since that date.

GOSS has always driven his own car while on duty as he was not assigned an automobile by the department where he was employed. He furthermore, was not issued a firearm, emergency light, or siren for his car. He is allowed to use his cwn sidearm while on duty. There is no record maintained of the type or description of the sidearm.

GOSS was formerly employed by the United States Atomic Energy Commission as an administrative assistant from October, 1954, until December, 1955, at Bossier City, Louisiana. He was assigned as Material Coordinator with the United States Atomic Energy Commission, Bossier City, in December, 1954, until September, 1955.

From October, 1958, until January, 1959, GOSS operated a service station at 2201 Benton Road, Bossier City, Louisiana.

He was employed with the United States Post Office in Bossier City, from February, 1959, until September, 1959, at which time he transferred to the Texarkana Terminal with the United States Post Office (not further identified). He remained

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there until October, 1959, at which time he moved back to Shreveport, Louisiana, as Sub-distribution Clerk with the United States Post Office. He left the Post Office in August, 1961, and became employed by the State of Louisiana, as previously stated.

The personnel file relative to GOSS does not show that any disciplinary action has been taken against GOSS while employed by the State of Louisiana.

Periodic rating forms indicate GOSS to be a conscientious employee, although supervisor's comment on last rating, 1966, stated that GOSS should not let his personal life affect his employment.

LANDRY advised that he does not know GOSS well. He recalled that GOSS talks with a low voice and seems to be very easy going. He did not know GOSS' feeling regarding the racial situation.

GOSS is described as follows:

PETE MORALES, Star Route, Box 95, Ferriday, Louisiana, resides northwest of the Dixie Lanes Bowling Alley on the opposite side of the railroad tracks.

MORALES was advised of the identities of the interviewing Agents and the nature of the contact. He stated that he is currently working as a laborer for the Joseph Freund Contractors, Vidalia, Louisiana.

During 1964, he was employed as a porter at the Dixie Lanes Bowling Alley, Vidalia - Ferriday Highway. He finished his work at the bowling alley at approximately 6:00 p.m. and usually retired early.

He stated that JOSEPH EDWARDS was unknown to him and EDWARDS was not known to be an employee of the Dixie Lanes Bowling Alley. MORALES advised that he has no recollection of seeing a car with a flashing red light halt another vehicle on the Vidalia - Ferriday Highway in the proximity of the bowling alley. Neither does he have any recollection of observing a white over green Buick which had been abandoned in the same area during July, 1964.

MORALES stated that he is acquainted with JAMES GOSS, Louisiana Probation Officer, as a result of being on probation for non-support charges.

MORALES stated that GOSS usually drove a 1958 blue car with a white top which was believed to be a Dodge and a 1962 Chevy II which was white in color. He advised that GOSS was never observed driving a 1963 or 1964 white Oldsmobile, nor did he ever contact MORALES with a female companion.

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MORALES advised that WARDELL TURNER was known to we worked at the bowling alley during 1964 and usually ked from 6:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. TURNER resides on Dody ad, Ferriday, and currently drives a school bus.

Deputy Sheriff THOMAS N. SMITH, Madison Parish Sheriff's Office, advised that he is personally acquainted with JAMES GOSS as a Louisiana Probation Officer but because of GOSS' personality, he had reservations concerning his opinion of GOSS. He could cite no specific basis for his evaluation of GOSS except that he observed GOSS in the Holiday Capri Motel Lounge on a number of occasions drinking; however, GOSS was never drunk.

SMITH stated that GOSS never gave him any reason to believe that he was affiliated with any Klan-type organization.

GOSS was known to drive a Volkswagen and a Chevy II but was not known to own or operate a 1963 or 1964 Oldsmobile.

SMITH stated that the only white 1964 Oldsmobile with whip antennae on the rear with no red dome light nor police decals in the area around July 4, 1964, was one owned by the Sheriff's Office and operated by the Sheriff. SMITH stated that no one except the Sheriff or SMITH ever drove that vehicle. GOSS never had access to that vehicle.

SMITH stated he had no knowledge of JOSEPH EDWARDS nor any violation involving EDWARDS at Vidalia, Louisiana.

SMITH advised that DURWOOD WYLHIDE, Route Two, Talullah, Louisiana, employed by the Metropolitan Life Insurance Company, is a known member of a Klan-type organization. WYLHIDE had a white 1963 or 1964 Oldsmobile during 1964 but this vehicle did not have any short-wave radio equipment or antenna.

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JACK HEAD, Supervisor, Juvenile Section, Probation Division, Department of Public Welfare, Talullah, Louisiana, advised that GOSS spent approximately three days of each week in Talullah, Louisiana, during the period that GOSS was employed as an Adult Probation Officer in the Talullah Office. He was known to have first lived in an efficiency apartment and later a larger apartment on North Mulberry Street, Talullah, both apartments believed to be owned by Mrs. ROY DALE.

The only unusual activities which GOSS was known to have attended were stag dinners sponsored occasionally by the personnel of the Department of Welfare. According to GOSS, he was reluctant to eat fish at these dinners because he had to exist solely on fish during World War II when he was separated from the rest of his unit on some Pacific Island.

HEAD stated that while GOSS owned a variety of automobiles, he was not known to have owned or operated a 1963 or 1964 Oldsmobile.

VICTOR MATTHEWS, Juvenile Probation and Parole Officer, Talullah, Louisiana, advised that he was acquainted with JAMES GOSS as a co-worker for approximately one and onehalf years. He had formed the impression that GOSS was easy going and not prone to violence. He had no unfavorable knowledge concerning GOSS and was much impressed with GOSS' activities with a scout troop in Bossier City, Louisiana.

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MATTHEWS advised that GOSS had a number of cars but was not known to have owned or operated a 1963 or 1964 white Oldsmobile.

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WILL STOTHART, Ten Caledonia Street, Tallulah, Louisiana, was interviewed at the office of the Probation and Parole, Tallulah, Louisiana, and he was advised of the identity of the interviewing Agent as well as the nature of the investigation. He voluntarily furnished the following information:

He stated that he was acquainted with JAMES GOSS, as he formerly worked with him at the Probation and Parole Office in Tallulah and further that they had both worked the same area, that is, Concordia and Catahoula Parishes, Louisiana.

He advised that almost immediately after he started to work at the Probation and Parole Office, he began to stay overnight with GOSS at Vidalia, Louisiana. He stated that as he can best recall, he started his employment in October of 1964.

He stated that he does not ever recall GOSS talking about his knowledge of a Negro man being killed in the area, although he does recall some person at an unrecalled place, either the Shamrock Motel or the King Hotel, saying something about a Negro man and a white woman going together, but he did not pay any attention to the exact nature of the remarks. He stated that he could not ever remember about what month or time of day these remarks were made, but he believed that he was with GOSS when he heard the remarks. He stated that he has stayed with GOSS on several occasions at the Shamrock Motel in Vidalia, Louisiana, and they stayed at the motel on Thursday nights as their work schedule called for them to be out overnight on Thursday nights.

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He advised that the name JOE EDWARDS means nothing to him and he does not recall GOSS ever mentioning the name to him. He stated that he did not know that GOSS was going with a girl who had been employed at the Shamrock Motel as GOSS usually kept his personal affairs to himself.

STOTHART further advised that he does not recall GOSS ever owning or having access to a 1963 or 1964 white Oldsmobile. He stated that GOSS had several automobiles but none such as a white Oldsmobile.

He stated that GOSS was the type of person who did not get close to any of his associates and none of the men at the office were very well acquainted with his activities after working hours. He advised that he certainly knew of no extra activities of GOSS while they stayed together on Thursday nights at Vidalia, Louisiana.

He further stated that he did not know GOSS to be friendly with any of the law enforcement officers of Concordia Parish and he never saw GOSS associate with them after working hours. He stated that he did not know GOSS to be friendly with Chief BUD SPINKS of the Vidalia Police Department.

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HOWARD S. WILLIAMS, Supervisor, Adult Probation Office, Department of Public Welfare, Talullah, Division, advised that he was acquainted with JAMES GOSS while GOSS was employed at that office as Probation Officer No. One.

WILLIAMS stated that GOSS never discussed his personal life but it was generally known that he was having some marital difficulties.

The most unusual thing about GOSS, according to WILLIAMS, was his affinity for having numerous cars. During the time he was associated with the Talullah Probation Office, he had approximately six different vehicles but none of them was a 1963 or 1964 white Oldsmobile.

GOSS was not known to belong to any Klan-type organization; however, he was a member of an international fraternal organization.

WILLIAMS stated that the only unusual thing that GOSS ever told him was that an FBI Agent had followed him one night while working. He stated that he was making a night call on a probationer and noticed a car following him. After a while, he stopped and went back and talked to the FBI Agent who indicated that they were interested in cars operating in that area but the reason for their interest was not stated.

WILLIAMS advised that JAMES GOSS worked under his direction from early 1964 through early 1965 when GOSS was transferred to a better position in New Orleans. After a few months, GOSS, at his own request, was returned to the Talullah Office and a short time later was transferred to the Shreveport Office.

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WILLIAMS stated that neither his knowledge of GOSS' personal life nor his official duties gave him any reason to question GOSS' character.

WILLIAMS advised he recalls going to New Orleans with GOSS and picking up a probation violator by the name of CHARLES H. BROWN. Records show that the first trial for BROWN was held October 16, 1964. BROWN's wife, LEOPOLDINE, was employed at the Shamrock Cafe. Records showed that her mother was ULESTRA TRIBUS of Vienna, Austria. Her father, KARL HEJKOL, was deceased. Mrs. BROWN had two children and resided at 408 South Spruce Street, Vidalia, Louisiana, as of December 14, 1964.

WILLIAMS stated that CHARLES BROWN was found guilty of probation violation and non-support. He was returned to jail and GOSS made several efforts to have him removed to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Biloxi, Mississippi, for acute alcoholism.

WILLIAMS advised that Mrs. DONNA THOMPSON, Court Clerk, Vidalia, Louisiana, may be able to furnish information concerning LEOPOLDINE BROWN.

WILLIAMS stated that the file shows that GOSS corresponded with Mrs. CALTIE BROWN, Route One, Evergreen, Alabama, concerning the disposition of the case involving CHARLES BROWN. GOSS showed in the file that he offered to take BROWN to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Biloxi, Mississippi, at GOSS' own expense.

WILLIAMS also recalled that GOSS related an incident that he saw or was reported to him by Mrs. RICHARD VAN MATRE of Winnsboro, Louisiana. According to the information furnished by GOSS, a crippled employee of a motel in Vidalia, Louisiana, was picked up by probationer RICHARD VAN MATRE and transported to Winnsboro where the probationer

confronted his wife with this girl. The girl became hysterical over her involvment in this marital difficulty. WILLIAMS did not have any additional information concerning this incident.

WILLIAMS made available the following personnel and official records concerning JAMES GOSS:

Mr. WILLIAMS stated that the Daily Travel Logs are destroyed after three years. All travel logs for June, 1964, and prior thereto have been destroyed. He was advised that such records may be of interest at a later date and he was requested to preserve all GOSS' records. WILLIAMS stated that he would maintain these records for at least one more year and if additional time is required, he would keep them longer if so instructed by the FBI.

LAMAR LOE, Owner and Operator of Lamar T. Loe, Inc., Talullah, Louisiana, stated that his agency sells Chevrolets, Oldsmobiles, and Pontiacs in Talullah. His Vicksburg, Mississippi, auto company also sells Buicks and Cadillacs. LOE pointed out that the decals identifying the automobile agency selling the vehicles were red in color and glued to either the left side of the rear bumper or the lower left side of the trunk. The decals of his agencies show the name Lamar T. Loe, Inc., and either Talullah, Louisiana, or Vicksburg, Mississippi, depending on the location of the selling agency. LOE stated that his agencies stopped using chrome metal agency identification emblems around 1960.

He advised that his records concerning the sales of 1963 and 1964 Oldsmobiles could not be checked on that date in view of the fact that the instant date was the first public showing of all new General Motors models and his office and staff were extremely busy. He stated that making a search of his files on that date would impose an extreme hardship on his operation. LOE stated that he would have his personnel start to search his records for this information in a few days.

LOE stated from his recollection, he knew that LLOYD H. PERKINS, Waterproof, Louisiana, purchased a 1964 white Oldsmobile but this vehicle had been wrecked sometime since 1964.

LLOYD H. PERKINS, Box 415, Waterproof, Louisiana, telephone number 3982, was interviewed at the Sheriff's Office, Talullah, Louisiana.

PERKINS stated that during 1964, he owned a Dynamic Oldsmobile Eighty-Eight, white in color, with a single AM radio antenna on the right rear. He advised that the antenna was the usual type mounted on pleasure cars and he had no short-wave radio equipment.

PERKINS advised that JOSEPH EDWARDS was unknown to him and he had no knowledge concerning any missing Negro porter in the vicinity of Vidalia, Louisiana. PERKINS stated that if an Oldsmobile were involved and the incident occurred at Vidalia, Louisiana, it is his opinion Chief BUD SPINKS, Vidalia Police Department, would have been involved in the incident. PERKINS stated he believed SPINKS to be capable of any violence to a Negro.

PERKINS also suggested that H. T. "TATE" POOLE, a former Vidalia Police Department Officer, around 1964 had a white Oldsmobile and has the propensity for violence. In addition, POOLE is the arch enemy of Chief SPINKS and may furnish information in the event SPINKS is involved.

PERKINS further advised that he himself was acquainted with JAMES GOSS around the end of 1964 and early 1965. He recalled that GOSS and he had attempted to assist J. M. FORMAN, a former Deputy Sheriff, who currently resides in Jonesville, Louisiana. At that time, FORMAN was attempting to obtain the position that GOSS held at that time and was relinquishing to obtain a supervisory position in New Orleans. PERKINS advised that he did not know the degree of the association between GOSS and FORMAN but he knew that GOSS had expended

In connection with the investigation currently being conducted by the Jackson Division in the case entitled "Unsub, Joseph Edwards, aka., Victim, C. R., "the Laboratory has been requested to determine the availability of a device to conduct further searches under water for a large metal container about the size of a refrigerator or steel barrel. Based on information furnished to the Jackson Office, skeletal remains are in a container of this description.

The Radio Engineering Section, through established contacts, thas determined that there is available a device called the "Pinger," which is a small hand-held sonar unit designed to be operated by a scuba diver while under water. Further inquiry reveals that there is a company in Morgan City, Louisiana, Ocean Systems, Inc., which will provide a diver equipped with this at \$150 a day. It was also determined that the U. S. Navy Salvage Division is equipped with these devices. Captain W. F. Searle, Jr., is the officer in charge of this division and in his absence, Lt. Commander Howard S. Placchi can be contacted.

The above type of equipment appears to be the most feasible approach to this problem, and if the facts warrant further effort in this regard, assistance by the U. S. Navy could be explored by the Liaison Section of the Domestic Intelligence Division, or authority could be given the Jackson Office for an expenditure of funds to contract for this service. stated that the water level at the river has receded about five feet and will reach the annual low point of approximately a 17 foot depth around <u>9/28/67</u>. Based on prior information furnished by BOOTH, suspected skeletal remainings are in a refrigerator cabinet or a steel barrel.

The scuba diving team that assisted in prior explorations on the river bottom suggested that the search for a metal container could be enormously accelerated by employing a large magnet which would affix itself to metal objects on the river bottom, and that diving would only be necessary in those spots where the magnet attached itself to objects on the bottom. Magnets of this type are advertised in surplus stores from time to time according to the divers.

It appears possible that the FBI Laboratory has had prior experience with searches requiring the use of magnet detectors which could be suspended from ropes to work a river bottom or similar water-filled areas. The Laboratory is requested to furnish such a device to the Natchez Resident Agency of the Jackson Division if one is available for use in further searching for the container we are seeking. Securing this device will permit a maximum study of the area we are interested in with a minimum expenditure of Agents' time.

He assumed that someone in the Vidalia, Louisiana Sheriff's Office or Vidalia Police Department "got hold of the boy".

The former source advised that the crippled girl thereafter married the youngest son of GEORGE SEWELL (phonetic), former operator of George's Boat Camp on Deer Park Lake, Louisiana. He could not furnish the first name of the girl's husband nor any name for the girl, and does not know where they could be located.

STEPHENSON then continued stating that the Buick remained along the side of the road for several days. Then he noticed that the vehicle had been moved to the road alongside the bowling alley parking lot. This car had a solid white exterior and a blue interior. JOURDAN further advised that the Vidalia Police Department is currently obtaining their patrol cars from McPhail Motors on a lease basis. After consulting with other personnel of this office, he ascertained that the Vidalia Folice Department also obtained Oldsmobiles from them under a lease agreement during 1964. He advised that all of their vehicles were white in color and are currently displaying blue emergency lights mounted on a bar across the top of the vehicle. He stated that it was his recollection that the 1964 Oldsmobiles formerly used by the Vidalia Police Department had a red top mounted emergency light. He advised that he is reasonably certain of this feature in that there was an additional charge made for the installation and removal of this equipment.

STEPHENSON stated that he had no additional information concerning this event.

He was advised that a check of the 1963 Louisiana vehicle registration records, the last year that Louisiana used all numbers in the license plates, showed 892-482 was issued for a 1954 Mercury registered to ESPY ENCALADE, General Delivery, Ponte a la Hache, Louisiana.

STEPHENSON advised that ESPY ENCALADE was unknown to him and the vehicle observed by him on the Vidalia -Ferriday Highway was definitely not a 1954 Mercury.

STEPHENSON was further advised that the 1963 Louisiana License Number 892-428 was issued for a 1963 Plymouth Valiant registered to Reverend A. G. TAYLOR of Jena, Louisiana.

STEPHENSON stated that he was acquainted with Reverend TAYLOR but he had no recollection as to why he would record Reverend TAYLOR's license number on a piece of paper in his wallet. He advised that apparently this number has no relationship to the incident involving EDWARDS' vehicle.

STEPHENSON stated that he is certain the vehicle which had the flashing red light and forced EDWARDS' vehicle to pull over was not a Valiant, in that he is almost certain that the vehicle, in fact, was a 1964 Oldsmobile, possibly a Model 98.

With regard to JOSEPH EDWARDS, the missing porter from the Shamrock Motel, OGDEN stated that he recalled having met EDWARDS near the swimming pool at the Shamrock Motel where a young child had drowned. He advised that his recollection of the incident was rather vague and he may have met EDMARDS the day of the drowning or two days after the drowning. He advised that his office did not investigate the incident since it happened in Vidalia, which city has a police department and personnel for such investigations, and furthermore he did not wish to get involved with Chief BUD SFINKS nor his personnel inasmuch as there is friction betwen their respective departments.

OGDEN stated that in regard to EDWARDS' abandoned vehicle, he recalls that some unknown person reported the continued presence of the vehicle in the vicinity of the bowling alley on the Vidalia--Ferriday Highway. OGDEN stated that he did not investigate the presence of the car, but merely dispatched CECIL BEATTY, operator of the Gulf Service Station in Ferriday, to tow the vehicle. However, BEATTY was unable to locate the abandoned car on his first trip and subsequently located the car on a side read near the bowling alley. No record was made of this complaint concerning the abandoned car and OGDEN made no search of the vehicle. He understands that Purvis Motor Company later claimed the

OGDEN stated that he has only been in the Shamrock Restaurant on a few occasions, and he knows of no commercial prostitution being carried on either in the restaurant or motel at this time or during 1964.

With regard to a report from one of the BOOTH boys of Harrisonburg, Louisiana, concerning flesh obtained from the Old River near Deer Park, Louisiana, OGDEN stated that he recalls that one of the BOOTH boys found some substance in the water near Deer Park and reported the matter to the Harrisonburg Sheriff's Office, In some way this report was brought to the attention of the Concordia Parish Sheriff's Office. OGDEN stated that he is not one of the big wheels in the sheriff's office and does not know how or to whom this report was made; and he had no knowledge of the incident until he was told to get the sheriff's boat and told to accompany the sheriff and Deputy IKE COMAN to investigate the incident. Even before arriving at the lake, he had concluded from his personal knowledge that the operator of an establishment known as Jugheads Restaurant was running a sausage business. It was further known to him that JUDHEAD was taking deer meat, which he was apparently poaching, and mixing this meat with pork which not only made the sausage better tasting, but also more profitable.

JUCHEAD was then faced with the disposal of the intestine, head, and unwanted deer parts which he apparently disposed of in the water of Old River. It was OGDEN's opinion that the flesh located by BOOTH was really parts of discarded deer meat taken illegally.

After arriving at Deer Park, he stated that they had only one drag line and in order to effectively probe for submerged objects, they needed two. Therefore, they made no attempt to locate any submerged objects. Furthermore, they did not see any floating material which appeared to be meat.

A day or two later, TAYLOR noticed EDWARDS' Buick parked across the road from the Dixie Lanes Bowling Alley. TAYLOR noted that there was nothing unusual about this and TAYLOR did not inspect the car. When the Buick continued to remain there for a number of days, TAYLOR stopped and inspected it. TAYLOR stated that he observed a necktie hanging from the mirror. TAYLOR stated that he saw a little spot of blood under the steering wheel. TAYLOR indicated the size of the spot by making a circle with his right thumb and right index finger. This circle made by TAYLOR appeared to be a little larger than a silver dollar.

TAYLOR stated that he did not observe any belt in the car. Subsequent to the inspection, TAYLOR learned that the car had been towed to a Gulf Station in Ferriday.

TAYLOR advised that he had no idea if EDWARDS had any missing teeth. TAYLOR could not recall the description of any jewelry that EDWARDS wore. TAYLOR did not know of any white preachers who had known EDWARDS or his family.

TAYLOR advised that the only thing he knew about the police cars in the Vidalia -- Ferriday area in 1964 was that people use to wonder why the Vidalia Police Department had Oldsmobiles while the Ferriday Police Department had Fords when in fact Ferriday was much larger than Vidalia at that time.

TORGERSEN denied any knowledge whatsoever of the JOE EDWARDS disappearance and stated that he had only heard from an unrecalled source that EDWARDS had moved to Chicago, Illinois, sometime during the Summer of 1964.

In response to questions concerning a crippled waitress at the Shamrock Motel during early 1964, TORGERSEN advised that there was a Mrs. CROWE who lived between Vidalia and Ferriday, Louisiana, employed as a waitress during that time at the Shamrock Motel. He stated that Mrs. CROWE had slipped and hurt her back and was compelled to wear a brace while working as a waitress at the Shamrock Motel during early 1964. TORGERSEN advised, however, that he knew of no relationship between EDWARDS and Mrs. CROWE.

The results of the FBI Laboratory examination is as follows:

Examination of specimen Ql disclosed a stamped marking "-tsman" on the left side of the knife blade at the fractured edge. The marking appears to be the latter portion of a trade name or a company name, possibly Sportsman." A company which utilizes the "Sportsman" label is the Utica Cutlery Company, Noyes and Wheeler Streets,

There were no markings present on the Q1 specimen which might identify the owner of the knife. No blood, tissue, hair or fiber was found on specimen Ql. 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J. O. THORNTON, SR., after being apprised of the identity of the Special Agent and the nature of the contact, stated that he purchased a 1964 white Dynamic 88, fourdoor sedan, from Loe Motors around December, 1963.

Mr. THORNTON stated that his son, JUNIOR, has never purchased an Oldsmobile from Loe Motors nor anyone else.

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He pointed out his Oldsmobile and the fact that the vehicle, bearing current Louisiana License 85F484, had a regular AM radio antenna on the right rear. The vehicle had rectangular taillights and a red Loe Motor decal on the bumper.



A Sheriff JOHN W. GILBERT, East Carroll Parish, advised that during 1964, he had several white Oldsmobiles as patrol cars. These cars had only one short wave radio in them and therefore had only one whip antenna.

THORNTON drove one of the Oldsmobiles during 1964, and was also believed to have personally owned a white Oldsmobile at that time. However, THORNTON's personally owned car did not have any short wave radio equipment nor whip antennae.

She exhibited the vehicle which by her description and by observation was a 1964 Oldsmobile Eighty-eight, white in color, with a red Loe Motor decal in the center of the rear bumper. The vehicle had only one short antenna near the trunk. The vehicle had rectangular tallights.

nature of the contact. PERKINS stated that he purchased a 1963 white, four-door, Eighty-Eight, Oldsmobile during October, 1963, and wrecked the vehicle during late July, 1966.

PERKINS was unable to furnish any basis for his conclusion, except that the general reputations of the Concordia Parish law officers indicated them to be capable and inclined toward a crime against a Negro.

He volunteered information that he purchased a 1964 Oldsmobile 98, two-door, sport coupe, medium blue in color, during October, 1963. This car was used only by his wife CAROLYN W. NOSSER. He explained that he divorced his wife at that time and the purchase of the automobile for her was part of the agreement.

NOSSER advised that he definitely was not using the Oldsmobile on July 12, 1964. He stated that he knew of no reason for the Vidalia Police Department to make an inquiry about the license registered to that vehicle.

He stated that he is not a member of any Klan type organization and has never been affiliated with any such group.



KENNETH R. STEPHENS, Official, Bank of Jena, was recontacted and reminded of the identity of the special Agent and the nature of the contact.

STEPHENS, after viewing photographs of the former Vidalia Police car, stated that he did not believe the former police car to be identical with the white Oldsmobile he observed to stop the Buick owned by JOSEPH SDWARDS. STEPHENS stated that he recalled seeing the Vidalia Police car, a week or two following the incident when EDWARDS' car was stopped and abandoned. He said that it was his conclusion at that time that the white Oldsmobile involved in the incident was not identical to the Vidalia Police car.

At the present time, he said he cannot recall whether the Oldsmobile taillights were rectangular or square. He recalls with certainty that the vehicle had two whip antennae mounted in the vicinity of the rear trunk deck and He feels confident that the red revolving light was on the dashboard and not on the roof. He said he cannot be certain that his prior thoughts on the existence of a Loe Motor emblem on the rear were accurate.

STEPHENS concluded the interview by saying that he has not been contacted by anyone other than FBI Agents concerning his knowledge of the incident when EDWARDS' car was stopped. He added that he hoped he would not have to testify in court concerning the matter.
