and entered a guilty plea to the burglary charge without protesting his innocence or informing the sentencing judge that he had been forced under pain of death to admit his guilt. It should be noted that Roy S. Halcomb, Assistant District Attorney, 7th Judicial District, when interviewed. stated he had talked privately with Harris, Henderson and Davis before they were taken into court and that neither made any complaint to him about being beaten or showed any visible signs of a beating. He further stated that each of the defendants told him he desired to plead guilty to the charge. The court records indicate no irregularities in the handling of the three defendants and in the final disposition of the case. Based on the facts submitted, we are forced to conclude that the statements of both Harris and Henderson are untrue and that the statements of complainant Harris are not entitled to credence or belief.



Cellmates of HARRIS at Concordia Parish Jail observed spots of blood on his shorts and that his clothes were torn. One observed HARRIS to have swollen buttocks. ALBERTA HENDERSON, wife of victim HENDERSON, Ferriday, who visited HENDERSON in jail at Vidalia, was not told of beating and saw no signs of mistreatment. NELLIE HARRIS, Clayton, La., sister of victim HARRIS was told by HARRIS of beating and advised shorts contained blood spots. HENDERSON and DAVIS admit participation in burglary for which sentenced and implicate HARRIS. HARRIS claims innocent. Records, District Court, Vidalia, reflect HARRIS and HENDERSON, on 4/6/62, sentenced seven years for Simple Burglary on guilty pleas. DAVIS on same date, received sentence of 3 years on guilty plea. They stated they were making the rounds visiting SDG members.

GLOVER mentioned he had been to see JAMES SCAROBROUGH.

GLOVER asked to see the box MORACE was building to store explosives and MORACE showed him the box, which was completed.

GLOVER was very impressed and said they needed another box just like it.

GLOVER said he has a friend who runs a store at Kentwood, Louisiana, and an FBI Agent had been to the store asking questions about him, GLOVER. According to GLOVER, his friend ran the Agent off. GLOVER asked MORACE to accompany him to Kentwood, Louisiana, soon to visit some of GLOVER's friends there.

GLOVER gave MORACE two pieces of Minutemen literature, which he said Minutemen Network Commander DON WILKENSON sent by him to MORACE.

He stated he was trying to see KENNETH NORMAN HEAD, but was unable to locate him. GLOVER said he would be by to see MORACE soon and bring him something to keep.

GLOVER drove up to the MORACE house in Vidalia, Louisiana. GLOVER asked for his M-2 Carbine which he had left with MORACE about two weeks previously. MORACE went into his house and returned with the carbine. GLOVER and MORACE went to GLOVER's old Ford pick-up truck and obtained a cardboard box from the front seat of the truck. GLOVER said there was lots of dynamite in the box and that MORACE was to keep it safe and not to drop or jar it.

The cardboard box had printing on it, showing it originally held General Electric Sealed Beam Lamps. A shipping tag on the box showed it had at one time been shipped by NAPA, Memphis, Tennessee, to Genuine Parts Service, Vicksburg, Miss., for Fayette, Mississippi. MORACE later confided to—a friend that the box was, no doubt, the property of JEWEL BURT, as he though BURT was from Fayette, and BURT has recently promised GLOVER some dynamics

and a green-colored one. Inside of the clear bag were seventeen sticks of dynamite and the green bag contained twenty-one sticks of dynamite. All of the dynamite sticks were identical in appearance and printed on each stick were the words, "Hercules Ditching Dynamite." Each stick was about eight inches long and one-inch in diameter and the outside waxlike paper on each stick was a faded light brown color.

to spend the weekend out his wife could not get off from her job at a drug store on Franklin Street in Natchez, Mississippi. GLOVER said he could be reached in Natchez at the home of his relatives with whom he is living, JAMES WATTS, telephone 442-3078, and SMITH, telephone 442-3154.

On Monday, April 14, 1969, GLOVER drove up to MORACE's house about 6:00 PM and asked MORACE to accompany him on Silver Dollar Group business. The two men entered GLOVER's car and drove to Natchez, Mississippi, and southward 35 miles to Woodville, Mississippi. At Woodville, they turned eastward about 15 miles to Centreville, Mississippi. On the way GLOVER told MORACE that one of the SDG members had been shot and was in the hospital in Centreville and he needed to check into it to see if they should revenge the shooting. The two men entered the hospital and GLOVER introduced MORACE to a brother of the wounded man and a tall man who was previously a deputy sheriff at Woodville.

was shot in the head and side by a neighbor while hunting turkey on April 13, 1969, or April 14, 1969. He said the shooting was an accident and no revenge was necessary. GLOVER then told MORACE that the wounded man was a member of the Silver Dollar Group as was his brother, and the former deputy. At that time, both the brother and the former deputy exhibited silver dollars to MORACE.

The former deputy is a white male, age 36 or 37; 6'1", 225 lbs, and with brown hair. The brother of the wounded man is a white male, 5'8 or 5'9"; 230 lbs, stocky build, with brown hair and a dark complexion. Either the former deputy or the brother lives in a house, which is the third house on the right from a service station on the right, turning east on the Centerville road in Woodville. Turning off of Highway #61 in Woodville eastward, the above-mentioned service station is immediately on the right side.

While at the hospital, GLOVER asked about the finances of the man who was shot. GLOVER said that both this man and his brother worked with him at the Armstrong Tire Co. in Natchez. GLOVER asked MORACE if he had twenty dollars and MORACE gave GLOVER a twenty-dollar bill. GLOVER took a one-hundred dollar bill from his own billfold and gave the wife of the wounded man the one-hundred and twenty dollars. GLOVER said he would not have had the money except he obtained a loan from the credit union to pay off his debts.

On the way back to Vidalia, Louisians, GLOVER talked of what a good man the former deputy sheriff was and that he used to cover up any evidence in any Klan violence. MORACE mentioned that the former deputy must not be so good, as he had heard that several years ago GLOVER and his crew failed in an effort to burn a Negro Masonic hall south of Woodville and north of St. Francis-ville, Louisiana, and in Louisiana.

MORACE would not say. GLOVER then said the attempted burning was messed up by TOMMIE JONES and TORGENSON, both of whom were Masons. These two men went inside the Negro Masonic ball with five gallons of gasoline and spread it all around. GLOVER, JAMES SCAROBROUGH and JAMES F. LEE stood shotgun guard outside. JONES and TORGENSON were frightened when some lights went on in a nearby house and ran out without setting the fire. GLOVER said it made him doubt that white Masons could be depended on to burn down a Negro Masonic hall.

GLOVER told MORACE not to mention this matter, as something else happened that same night and if authorities knew of this incident, it would give them a lead on the other thing.

B. J. GLOVER contacted E. D. MORACE at MORACE's home at Vidalia, Louisiana, on January 23, 1969, and inquired if MORACE had the explosives handy. MORACE said he could get the explosives very quickly. GLOVER said he had talked to DON WILKENSON of Natchez, Mississippi, who had been in contact with SAM BOWERS of Laurel, Mississippi. If BOWERS were to be convicted on the murder charge in the DAHMER case that week, he wanted several explosions throughout Mississippi, including the Natchez area.

GLOVER said that he would be watching for the verdict in the BOWERS case. It is noted that BOWERS was not convicted.

MORACE asked GLOVER if DON WILKENSON had actually quit the Minutemen and GLOVER said he was going to see WILKENSON that night. He said WILKENSON had evidently decided to remain active as Minutemen Network Commander.

E. D. MORACE and TOMMIE JONES met at the Moose Lodge in Natchez, Mississippi, on January 24, 1969. JONES said he was inactive in the SDG, but was available if they ever needed him to barbeque a "nigger".

SONNY TAYLOR contacted E. D. MORACE on January 22, 1969, and inquired about his Minutemen application. MORACE told him he still had not heard anything from Minutemen headquarters. TAYLOR asked MORACE to be his alibi in the event he decided to burn his home to get out from under the mortage. MORACE said he was very busy right then and TAYLOR said R. J. GLOVER could be his alibi.

KENNETH NORMAN HEAD

Address on Lake Concordia, Ferriday, Louisiana. He sold or was selling his 1959 white Ford station wagon and now owns about a 1965 dark blue car, probably an Oldsmobile.

HEAD no longer works for the D and D Drilling Company and works Hughes and New Oil Company, Natchez, Mississippi.

HEAD is inactive in the klan and SDG, but is a member of the Minutemen Unit 1733, and intends to become active in that organization.

The following is a coorlation of information contained in Jackson file 157-613:

On 2/6/68 FOIA(b) 7 - (D) advised the first abortive attempt to kill METCALFE took place during the late Spring of 1965. Generally, the plan called for L. C. MURRAY and JAMES "SONNY" TAYLOR to station themselves behind the Armstrong Rubber Company Plant in Natchez and GLOVER would then get METCALFE out behind the plant where he would be kidnapped, carried away, and killed by TAYLOR, MURRAY, and TOMMIE LEE JONES, who stayed in MURRAY's car to render assistance when METCALFE was brought to the car. MURRAY, TAYLOR and JONES took their positions at the appointed time but METCALFE failed to appear.

Serial 158. On 2/8/68, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised JAMES FREDERICK LEE came to his house on 2/7/68. LEE commented that he knows TOMMY LEE JONES is furnishing information to the FBI. He told the source that once JONES went to see ERNEST FINLEY's wife and asked her if he could look at the Silver Dollar which had been given to her deceased husband. LEE told source some few months ago when word was spread around Natchez that he and RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER contemplated taking some action against JONES and at that particular time they had contemplated taking action against him. EEE stated that he, GLOVER, and one other individual whom he did not name, had met in LEE's home on one occasion and also met in his car on one occasion where they talked about taking some action against JONES. LEE stated when he heard the information that he and GLOVER were thinking about taking action against JONES, he at that time thought that either his car or his house had a microphone in it because the information that had been spread around Natchez, was actually true.

Source stated that JONES told him that he had never heard of this plot. Source stated atated that JONES told him that he thinks JAMES FREDERICK LEE is talking to the FBI because in the past he had caught him in a couple of lies. JONES did not explain to the source what lies he had caught LEE in.

Serial 161. On 2/21/68, POLACE TO advised subject has been a member of most of the Klan graps in Miss., and he is employed at the International Paper Company in Natchez, Miss.

Serial 163. On 3/8/68, and 3/14/68,

LEE SCAROBOROUGH considered subject to be a close friend of his and will attempt to recruit him either into the Klan organization in La., or the Minutemen. In 1967, JAMES LEE SCAROBOROUGH was convinced that TOMMIE LEE JONES was an informer for the FBI. SCAROBOROUGH did not trust subject because he thought he was "shooting off his mouth too much" and that he was spending too much money. SCAROBOROUGH has stated he found out where JONES was getting his money from and that he was no longer worried about JONES being an informer for the FBI. SCAROBOROUGH will more than likely attempt toget JONES into either the Minutemen or the Klan organization.

Serial 164. On 2/26/68, FOIA(b)7-(D) advised that the BLANEY brothers --BILL and GERALD, who are both SDG members-- called on E. D. MORACE, asked him to contact RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER and Mississippi SDG member TOMMIE LEE JONES and call a meeting so that some action could be taken against DRANE and his men.

Serial 165. On 4/16/68, FOIA(b)7-(D) advised R. J. GLOVER and E. D. MORACE met on April 15, 1968, and discussed the Klan and the Silver Dollar: Group. GLOVER talked of TOMMIE LEE JONES again and went over the whole story of the possibility of JONES being an FBI informant. GLOVER said he has made up his mind that JONES is not an informant. GLOVER stated JONES "has been there with me", indicating JONES and GLOVER were together on a serious crime, and that if JONES had talked he would have already put the finger on GLOVER.

While the meeting was going on SDG member THOMMIE LEE JONES came into the lounge with another man. GLOVER went over to see who the man with JONES was and while he was gone MORACE remarked he did not trust JONES. WILKENSON and JONES was without work for two years and during the time had money and bought a house. WILKENSON said he would like to know where JONES got his money.

Serial 172. On 12/11/68, FOIA(b)7 - (D) advised E. D. MORACE and TOMMIE JONES met at the Moose Lodge at Natchez, Miss., on the night of November 30, 1968. JONES said he did not trust JAMES LEE as LEE or his wife had told the FBI a lot about JONES. MORACE said he trusted LEE, but knew why LEE did not trust JONES as he had reason. JONES denied there was reason for LEE to not trust him. MORACE said that he observed JONES riding i a car with the FBI Agent in Natchez, Miss., and that JACK SEALE saw JONES in the Eola Hotel in Natchez, with an FBI Agent to show him some cars at the JONES place and that he was passing through the Eola Hotel when an FBI Agent asked him to join him at his table to ask: him some questions.

Review of file on 11/19/68, fails to reflect any activity on the part of the subject. On 11/15/68, FOIA(b) 7 - (D) (Prob) advised subject no longer active in any Klan or hate type organization.

Inasmuch as subject no longer meets criteria for investigation as set forth in Section 122A, Manual of Instructions, no further investigation is being conducted at this time. In the event that he becomes active again, case will be reopened.

On 2/17/68 this source was asked if he had ever heard anyone planning to kidnap GEORGE METCALFE prior to the time that he was a victim of an explosion on 8/27/65. He stated he had never heard anyone plot to kidnap METCALFE.

On 2/22/68 this source was contacted and advised that information had been received by this Bureau that he, RALEIGH JACKSON GLOVER, TOMMIE LEE JONES and JAMES HCRACE "SONNY" TAYLOR, had in the past, planned to kidnap GEORGE METCALFE at the Armstrong Tire and Rubber Company. This source vehemently denied having ever been connected with such a plot or hearing of such a plot. He stated that in 1965 he was not close to these individuals and had he contemplated committing any act of violence, he would not have done it with these individuals. He stated he did not know SCNNY TAYLOR by name when he saw him at the fish fry at the residence of JAMES FREDERICK LEE in the Summer of 1965. Source stated he did not know TAYLOR'S name until the Agent showed him photographs of TALOR and asked him if he knew JAMES HORACE "SONNY" TAYLOR from Harrisonburg,

Source stated that someone either lying about him in connection with this plot or someone has had an honest mistake in placing him on the plot.

Source stated he is concerned about this allegation and he will undergo a/polygraph examination in order to resolve the question.
